WILL ESTABLISH EGG DEPOT HERE

Establishment of an egg depot in Salem for Oregon-Laid Eggs and Poultry, Inc., is announced by E. B. Reed, Portland, president and general manager. Salem's Petland, 175 South Commercial, has been designated as the station here, and will start receiving eggs Monday, July 16.

Portland prices for eggs delivered here, I. E. Lopley, who will be in charge here, states. Shipments will be made out of here each Friday and Tuesday, Mr. Lopley and a representative of the central office will visit the larger flock owners in this section the first three days of the week to interest them. A depot has also been established in Eugene.

E. B. Reed, manager of the concern entering this field, was for several years general manager of the state poultry growers' coop.

Egg purchases are made on a graded basis, and to encourage poultrymen to produce a superior quality, a premium paying basis for eggs grading a state percentage of top-quality has been adopted. Shippers are not required to sign any marketing agreement or to subscribe to stock.

Salem Broker Is Sued Over Trade

PORTLAND, Ore., July 14.—(AP)—Damages of \$5,000 for alleged fraudulent real estate representations were demanded in a suit filed in federal court here Friday by Arthur F. Walls, Mabton, Wash., against Jesse C. Campbell, Salem, Ore., real estate broker.

Walls alleged that he employed Campbell in 1933 to dispose of house and lot in Dallas, Ore., and his interest in a house in Salem. He further alleged that Campbell made a trade for one acre of land on the Pacific highway eight miles north of Salem, that the property was not worth more than \$2500 and that the holder of one of the mortgages was demanding his money, which was due.

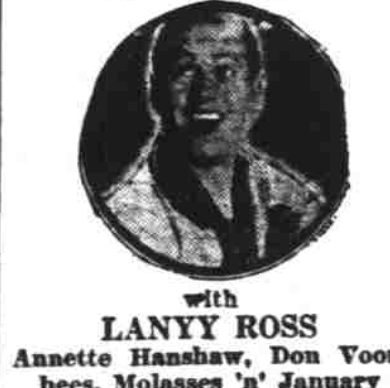
