STATE BATTLES ON 'PLAGUE' SUCCESS

Dr. Bellinger Tells Kiwanians of Lowered Death Rate in Twenty Years

Oregon is waging a successful battle against the white plague of tuberculosis, Dr. Grover C. Bellinger, superintendent of the state tuberculosis hospital here, told the Salem Kiwanis club Tuesday noon.

Salient points from his address were:

The death rate from tuberculosis, in Oregon, is only one-third as large as 20 years ago. Oregon is 12 points ahead of Washington in checking the disease in a comparison extending over the last eight years.

The key to control of tuberculosis is to teach every person proper hygiene and to isolate and cure, if possible, active carriers of the disease.

Dr. Bellinger said the oft-repeated theory that everyone has some tuberculosis was untrue. He scouted the theory that a "little tuberculosis" in a person enabled one to defeat the major dangers of the disease.

Dr. Bellinger praised the Salem school board for its insistence that all teachers be tuberculosis tested before obtaining a contract to instruct here. He said extensive tests in Oregon had proved conclusively that as high as 90 per cent of the children in certain schools had tuberculosis where their teacher was a carrier.

Twenty years ago Oregon pioneered in the gas treatment method of handling the most severe cases, Dr. Bellinger told the club. As a result the state is being looked to by other commonwealths for data accumulated on methods of handling the disease.

Dr. Bellinger said the state with \$75,000 invested in its two state tuberculosis hospitals was a fairly well equipped in its handling of cases. He said more beds were needed, however, and recommended that some be provided for Portland. He said he did not favor, however, the setting up of a third tuberculosis hospital unit.

The speaker cited figures to show the growth of tuberculosis in certain areas, notably Japan and South America.

T. A. Windishar, Kiwanis chairman, thanked Dr. Bellinger for his address and promised him the club's support in the development of adequate hospital facilities here.

Surveys Planned For 3 Cities in State by League

Three cities in Oregon, to be chosen for their reputation as well governed municipalities, will be surveyed by experts under the direction of the League of Oregon Cities, as part of the organization's program of maintaining a clearing house on municipal affairs. It has been announced at Eugene by Herman Kehrli, executive secretary of the league and director of the University of Oregon's bureau of municipal research and service.

Oregon City will be the first to be surveyed, and Charles McKinley, professor of political science at Reed College, will be in charge. Mr. McKinley is also a member of the Portland city planning commission, and is an expert in this work.

Selection of two other cities, one of a population from 8,000 to 12,000 and the other from 2000 to 2500, will be announced later.

One firm said it was advertising for listings of houses for rent since the call for dwellings for rent was far exceeding the supply. By fall, when the school influx comes, realtors believe there will be great difficulty for renters to be accommodated.

Realtors said yesterday that the shortage of houses was due to several causes. One was the fact that families are not doubling up as they were a year ago. Another reason is the steady growth of the city. The third is the lack of new houses, only a very few being constructed the last two years.

12 DIVORCES GIVEN IN DEFAULT CASES

The divorce mill ground rapidly and effectively here yesterday, Judge L. G. Jewelling awarding 12 couples their freedom. In each case plaintiff won his or her decree by default, not a defendant coming into court to register a protest.

Bonnie Lee Tope was awarded a decree from Edgar Stuart Tope and the right to resume her maiden name of Bonnie Lee Meeks.

Sarah B. Rhodes was awarded a decree from John F. Rhodes and the right to resume her former name of Sarah B. Stone.

Josephine Lantz won a decree from Frank Lantz and was awarded her maiden name of Josephine Rebsom. The court approved a privately made property settlement.

The court awarded Olive Regan a divorce from Stephen Regan. Mary Hinges was awarded a decree from Karl E. Hinges. She was granted the custody of their minor child. The defendant has the right to object to the school plaintiff selects for the child and if an agreement cannot be reached the court retains jurisdiction to choose the school.

Leona Mooney secured a decree from Simon Adelbert Mooney and may resume the use of her maiden name of Leona Johanson.

Childs Renamed To Loan Board; Progress Shown

Leo N. Childs was reelected a director of the State Savings and Loan association at its annual meeting held here this week. Holdover directors are Dr. R. L. Edwards, T. M. Hicks, Ed Plasecki, E. A. Miller. Mr. Miller continues as president of the association and Mr. Childs as secretary.

Encouraging progress in the rehabilitation of the association is being made, President Miller reported. During the 12 months ending June 30, 1934, \$57,000 of real property owned by the association has been sold. Income from rentals on owned property the last six months grossed \$2600. Interest on mortgages ran to more than \$5000. Expenses were held low. While no dividend was declared for the last year, the association used considerable of its surplus funds in rehabilitating property it owns. Gross assets of the association approximate \$300,000.

Baar & Cunningham Not Favorable to Wells Gist Of Their Lengthy Report

Baar and Cunningham in their special ten-page report presented at the city council meeting Monday night raise three arguments to refute the contentions of Percy Cupper, engineer retained by the Taxpayers' League of Salem, in his effort to demonstrate the feasibility of wells as a water supply source here. Briefly, the city's consulting engineers argued that:

1. The adequacy of wells as a water supply source is decidedly questionable.

2. The quality of well water here would be objectionable and costly to housewives, industrial plants and laundries, because of hardness, unless an expensive softening plant were installed.

3. The Cupper report attempts to compare the costs of two projects not at all comparable in service. The well system is not even adequate to meet present demands of the insurance underwriters.

The report repeats conclusions given in a supplemental report made to the city in 1931. The gist of these are that:

Single Well Ruled Out
1. "Evidence from past experience is against the possibility of a single large well."

2. "There are enough records of failure, contamination or depletion of well supplies near Salem to indicate the hazards in this direction."

3. "Leaving out the process of filtration, the plant and machinery first cost for many small (well) units will exceed that of a single supply from the Willamette."

4. "The well supply will be hard and may become polluted."

5. "Power cost for pumping is a big item of expense" because "for a well supply the water must be raised from many feet below the river level up to the reservoir level" in contrast with either a gravity or a Willamette river supply.

The Cupper figures on consumption of water here are contested by Baar and Cunningham as being taken from a depression period in which "many people have curtailed their use of water, particularly for sprinkling" and "industrial use has declined."

In regard to quality of well water available, the report states that "actual tests of water from the water company wells shows from 80 to 110 parts per million of hardness" whereas "for comparison, Bull Run water has 10 parts per million and Willamette river water 26 parts per million of hardness."

"If five per cent of Salem's annual water consumption is for laundry purposes," the report declares, "the annual soap bill will be \$50,000" under a well supply system.

Total Cost \$480,000
First cost of a well system is estimated in the report at \$230,000 to \$280,000 and for a suitable softening plant at \$200,000 additional. Eighteen new wells would have to be drilled and fitted to give a peak capacity of 10,000,000 gallons per day, of 4,000,000 gallons less than recommended by the national board of fire underwriters and 5,000,000 less than estimated for the mountain gravity system.

The life of a well system, it is contended, would be around 15 years, in contrast with 20 years for a Willamette river

system with filter plant and 35 years for a gravity line.

Annual cost of a well system supplying a maximum of only 7,500,000 gallons a day, without a softening plant and looking to a \$62,000 grant and \$188,000 loan from PWA, is estimated at \$56,020, as follows:
Interest at four per cent \$ 7,520
Depreciation 12,500
Power 21,000
Operation, maintenance . 15,000
\$56,020

All eligible for use of the relief cannery should register at the county relief offices before appearing at the cannery stand.

Monday of this week 2500 cans of goods were turned out, and at mid-afternoon yesterday that mark had been reached. Originally it was planned to run only Monday and Tuesday of this week at the fairgrounds here.
