MONOXIDE IS SUICIDE METHOD

Suicide by means of carbon monoxide poisoning is held responsible for the death early Tuesday near Toledo of Kenneth Whiteaker, 25, truck driver out of the Albany branch of the Swift and Co. produce house. Driving a truckload of supplies for coast points, Whiteaker and Robert Huston, also of the local plant, left Monday for Newport. Huston reported that he last saw Whiteaker Monday night playing cards in Newport. Tuesday morning Whiteaker and the truck were gone but were found later near Toledo with the man dead. A widow and two small children survive.

Health Board Man Says Salem Water Tests Grade "A"

Salem's water supply, provided by the Oregon-Washington Water Service company, is Grade A, or first class for human use. It was declared by Carl E. Green, sanitary inspector for the state board of health, and J. E. Blinkhorn, county dairy and food inspector, who yesterday thoroughly examined the supply, both at the Minto Island intake and at the South Commercial street pumping station. The two inspectors were shown over the scene of dredging operations necessitated by the low river level and held to be the cause of the temporary cloudiness and ill taste of the water. The state board of health was requested to make the examination by Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner, after he had received a letter of complaint from Kenneth G. Thompson, local attorney. Batty Cooper, city sanitary inspector who has taken test samples of Salem water for years, declared yesterday that none of the samples had ever proved below Grade A.

Auto Fatalities Show Increase First 6 Months

Automobile accident fatalities for the first six months of 1934 increased 30 per cent over the same number last year, a report by the secretary of state revealed. Total fatalities were 142 as compared to 106 for the same period in 1933 in Oregon. Persons injured were 2275 as compared to 1730. Accidents reported were 9888 this year and 8953 last year. During June alone the total fatalities mounted to 29 as compared to 16 the same month a year ago. Injuries listed were 397 and the total accidents were 1635. Of the fatalities 10 were pedestrians and nine were killed in non-collision automobile accidents. The secretary of state also reported that during June 64 drivers' licenses were revoked or suspended, of which 54 were for driving while intoxicated, and four for reckless driving.

Salem Boys Have Novel Vacation

UNIVERSITY BUSY FOR NEW STUDENTS

Steady, well-planned new student promotion work is being carried throughout the summer by Willamette university. Dr. Frank M. Erickson, acting president, announced yesterday.

Three university faculty members are spending most of their time this summer in the field interviewing new and old students. Roy S. Keane, Professor Herman Clark and Robert Duncan are these field workers and every part of this state and portions of Washington are being covered.

This week letters are being sent by Dr. Erickson to Methodist ministers throughout the northwest, outlining the work the university seeks to do and asking their cooperation in securing the type of new students Willamette seeks. County Planning Best Fair Exhibit Under Van Trump

The best exhibit at the state fair ever shown by Marion county is being planned for September 3 to 9 by S. H. Van Trump, county horticulturist, placed in charge of the display by the county court. An especial aid to Mr. Van Trump this year is the \$800 estimated receipts to the county from the dog race funds. A portion of this at first was apportioned for use in the state's show at the world's fair in Chicago but when that exhibit was abandoned all the moneys were left for the regular county exhibit at the fair. Max Gehlhar, fair director, has asked each of the 36 counties in the state to have unusually good exhibits this fall.

COPY BAR PAPERS
Nine typewritten copies of the examination papers of each of the 120 applicants for admission to the Oregon bar at the exams this month, are being completed by stenographers at the statehouse. A copy goes to each of the nine members of the examining board who read the exams independently and without knowing who was the writer. Grades are largely dependent upon the legal knowledge and reasoning power of the person examined. Nearly all the questions deal with specific legal problems.

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
