Heavy Dishes Are For Men And Children

Growing youngsters and hard-working men demand dishes that fill them up. Dainty preparations are appropriate for bridge luncheons and Sunday night suppers, but they don't find favor with the hungry men and children.

All three of the following corn recipes are substantial and filling, as well as attractive:

Baked Macedone of Vegetables
3 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon chopped onion
2 tablespoons flour
1 pint milk
1 pint stewed or canned tomatoes
1 cup cooked corn
1 1/2 cups boiled rice
2 hard boiled eggs, chopped
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
2 teaspoons salt
1 tablespoon Worcester-shire sauce
1/2 cup grated cheese
Peas, lima beans or carrots may be added if desired.
Put onions in butter until tender. Add pimientos, cook three minutes. Add flour and mix well. Next tomatoes and stir until mixture thickens. Add all other ingredients, sprinkle cheese over top and bake 20 minutes in hot oven. This is good either hot or cold and will serve six. All that is needed in addition to this well-balanced dish is bread and butter and drink to make a meal or a picnic luncheon.

Baked Corn
2 cups corn (fresh or canned)
1 lb. ground round
1 small can pimiento
1 onion
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons cream
Chop onion, mix with ground round and brown in frying pan. When browned put in baking dish and pour over this the corn which has been seasoned with salt, diced pimiento and cream. Bake in moderate oven thirty minutes. Serves six. Makes attractive luncheon dish.

Polenta
1 cup cornmeal
3 cups water

1 cup tomatoes
2 tablespoons butter
1 medium onion (less if desired)
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup grated aged cheese
Cook meal in water 45 minutes. Beat butter and add onion. Cook until tender. Add salt, pepper, tomatoes and cook until well blended. Place in buttered casserole first a layer of mush, then tomato mixture, sprinkle with cheese and repeat until the dish is filled. Sprinkle cheese over all and bake until well heated and the cheese is melted. Serve hot. Makes a good meat substitute.

MALING AND LIBBY SPLIT BERRY POOL

WOODBURN, July 19.—Blackberries are being received at the Ray-Maling cannery here in ever increasing amounts. The blackberry crew worked all day Tuesday, and Wednesday a night crew was put to work on the berries. The Libby, McNeill and Libby company has bought 170 tons of the berries produced by the Woodburn Fruit Growers' association, the rest to be handled by the Ray-Maling plant. It has been estimated by the association that it will have about 400 tons of the berries.

Apricots are still being packed by the cannery, but it is expected that the necessary amount of that fruit will soon be put up. Pears will be arriving within a week. It has been estimated by cannery employees.
