OUTLOOK DISCUSSED FOR MILL'S STOCK

Local holders of Oregon Pulp & Paper company preferred stock were interested yesterday in the following report in Oregon Voter on the prospects of that company resuming dividends. The Voter's articles was in reply to an inquiry from a Newport citizen pointing out that the company had paid no dividends in more than two years and inquiring about the prospects for an early resumption of dividends. The Voter replied:

"Prospects for resumption of dividends on Oregon Pulp & Paper company 8 per cent preferred stock can hardly be expected to brighten for some time. We wonder if you have overlooked effects of its moratorium on bond maturities effective to May 1, 1937. Oregon Pulp and Paper bound itself not to pay any dividends until bonded debt should be reduced to \$500,000, thereafter to be

permitted to disburse in preferred dividends each year a sum equaling that applied to further reduction of bonded debt. This remains at \$980,000, so \$330,000 must be applied to bond retirements before dividends may be resumed . . . even partial dividends. The moratorium was obtained because the company was unable to earn \$70,000 a year to apply on bond retirements.

"Should the company achieve substantial earnings, it might resume dividends on the preferred shares before 1937. We think they may scarcely be expected."
