

SCHOOL BOARD TO STAND PAT

Insists Depreciation Must Be Included; Woodburn, Silverton Agree

rather than the appraised value of the properties.

The local board took the stand that depreciation, included in the state department's recommendations for cost finding, was a fair charge and should be included in tuition payments made for non-high school district pupils.

Final action on the proposed teacher salary schedule for 1934-1935 was deferred pending the return of Superintendent Gaiser from an educational conference in California. A special meeting of the board will be called upon his return.

Bids for painting the Parish junior high school were deferred and the buildings and grounds committee was authorized to make further inquiry into the advisability of the work. Dr. B. F. Pound said he would not support the proposed job since school funds available, in his opinion, are inadequate.

The board awarded to Nelson Bros. the job of re-roofing the machine shops at a total cost of \$249.50.

Mrs. David Wright, board chairman, was named the school board's representative on the Marion county health committee.

to support democratic nominees at the Oregon general election in November, and to support the administration's program.

"This new deal is a great economic crusade," Farley declared. "We must no longer permit the strong to exploit the weak. . . . We will either all go forward and upward together . . . or be in full retreat before the economic enemy that infested us in the Hoover period of robust individualism."

General Farley said the democratic party is responsive to the will of the people and has fulfilled "virtually every major plank."

Charles McNary, Oregon's senior senator and minority leader of the senate, was praised by Farley for giving only "clean and fair" opposition to the Roosevelt program.

Turning to Oregon's democratic nominees, Farley expressed confidence that Oregon will find General Charles H. Martin "as good and able a governor as we in Washington have found him a loyal and conscientious legislator."

Farley also expressed hope that ex-Governor Walter M. Pierce would be returned to congress. A good word also was spoken for Walter B. Gleason of Portland and R. K. Turner of Dallas, neophyte congressional candidates of the democratic party. "These men would be a credit to your state in the halls of the congress of the United States," Farley said.

MILLION FOR WORK ON BRIDGES READY

The initial million dollars, for construction of the five Oregon coast highway bridges, will be available within two hours after the final papers are signed by members of the state highway commission at a meeting to be held in Portland today, J. M. Devers, attorney for the commission, announced upon his return from Washington yesterday.

The papers were received at the federal reserve bank in Portland Monday, Devers said. As soon as these papers are signed the temporary bonds, securing payment of the federal loan, will be transferred from the state treasury department to the federal reserve bank. The bank will then telegraph public works administration officials in Washington, and the money will be made available to withdrawal by the highway commission.

Low bidders on the five projects have been awaiting this action before receiving final awards from the highway commission. Work on the Alsea bridge was started several weeks ago, but it was not expected that contracts for the four other spans will be let until Thursday or Friday of this week. These are the Newport, Coos Bay, Reedsport and Florence bridges.

Devers has made two trips to Washington in connection with the five bridges.

The remainder of the \$5,602,000 loan and grant will be received later.
