Communications with the center of disturbance in Styria and Carinthia were cut off except for the public in doubt as to the extent of the slaughter.

The battles sometimes pitted father against son and brother against brother.

Headquarters of the fascist Heimwehr (home guard) here estimated that 2500 nazis had been killed and wounded.

They said 180 heimwehr men died defending the government of Prince Ernst von Starhemberg up to last midnight, but had no estimates of the toll today. The best available estimates put the dead well above 500.

Mary L. Lisle, 1295 Oxford, reports \$2000 loss in value of her property.

Horse Shoe lake ranch near St. Paul, reports land loss of \$11,000 and \$1000 from drift and if not controlled formation of an island of 700 acres is threatened with a loss of 110 acres.

Mitoma, hop ranch reports a \$2,000 loss in land and \$5000 loss altogether one year losing 40 acres of trestle costing \$100 an acre. The river is cutting back into the ranch each year, the report says.

Durbin & Cornoyer report a loss of \$1200 from loss of 12 acres of trellis one year. No acreage has as yet been lost but is threatened from the Santiam.

W. H. Barber, route 5, Salem, reports fences and bridges washed out.

O. M. Harmer, route 5, Salem, reports loss of fences, bridges, chickens and rabbits.

L. E. Swenewold, route 1, Salem, reports soil washed away and only rocks and gravel left.

Mrs. Matilda Nadon, president Salem War Mothers, 1760 Oxford street, Top ground washed away, fences, wood, lumber and other losses aggregating an estimated \$5000, and she reports she also nearly lost her life in a flood.

G. B. Wyncoop, 425 Oxford, owner of 14 acres of filberts in the country. He reports injury to trees and loss by drift. His property, he states, is in the direct path of the Santiam river.

E. J. and Elizabeth Bettner, 1750 Oxford, loss reported \$3200, land made unsaleable.

C. B. Steward, 1610 Lee street, reports 12 inches of water in the yard last winter.

E. S. Hartman, 1175 S. 15th street, loss \$1050 from effects of flood land lost half its value.

Mrs. Bella Amell, route 1, Portland, loss of \$1500 to land in Marion county, in danger of serious losses from new course of river.

said employers had held off all activity until a vote on arbitration had been counted, fully expecting an immediate return to work by union men if the ballot was favorable.

He explained that when the favorable vote carried by such a large majority and the longshoremen still remained idle, he was forced to take action in the interest of his company and his employees. He declared mill workers and loggers had repeatedly asked to be permitted to load ships.

Loading of the freighter Golden State at the Coos Bay dock was proceeding rapidly this afternoon and the ship was listed to cross out late today. Loading of the freighter Anna at the Coos Bay Lumber company dock started this morning and it was said work on the Heimward would start soon.

Longshoremen have made no attempt to halt operations.

date and said further the matter of an office location was not considered. There has been some talk that quarters will be set up in the Guardian building, temporarily at least.

W. H. Campbell, secretary of the federal home loan bank in Portland, attended the stockholders' meeting last night and outlined objects of the government in assisting in these organizations, stressing particularly the fact that the association is a local institution because the money is invested on houses located within a radius of 50 miles from Salem.

Initial requirements for formation of the loan association here have been more than met, with a minimum of 40 shareholders subscribing \$50,000 in shares.

The government will take shares in the local organization up to three times the amount subscribed by the local shareholders, and deposits up to \$5000 will be guaranteed by the government, just as now prevails in banks. The association will be mutual, and it is estimated interest will run about four per cent. Maximum of the loans to be granted will be \$20,000.

Hop Deals Here
Unusually Few;
Washington Too

Oregon hop markets have been very quiet the past seven days, with only 126 bales sold at 22 1/2 cents per pound; contract business was also dull, with two small three-year term contracts written at 19-18-18 cents.

Washington markets were even duller than Oregon, with only 62 bales sold by growers. These were commons, netting the grower 10 cents per pound. One three-year term contract for 100 bales was written at 20-18-18 cents to grower. A one-year contract for 80 bales was reported written at 20 1/2 cents per pound. Both contracts were on Yakima valley hops.

With the decision Cox slammed Savoldi out of the ring. Savoldi waited for Cox, and slugged him in the eye. With furious yells, the customers ploved into the fray, some 40 of them endeavoring to tear Cox apart. At a late hour, police were still endeavoring to chase several hundred would-be mobsmen out of the pavilion.

FOX BREEDERS WILL
GATHER AT LIBERTY

LIBERTY, July 27.—The annual summer school for fox and fur farmers for the Salem and vicinity district will be held here on the Liberty school grounds, Monday, July 30, starting at 10 a. m. under the auspices of the Oregon Fox and Fur Breeders' association. Picnic basket dinner will be held at noon.

Talks and discussion on problems confronting fur raisers, comparing notes on experiments, etc., will be the order of the day. Out of state speakers representing organizations similar to that of Oregon will include A. H. Crow and E. N. Howard, secretary and director, respectively, of the Rocky Mountain National Fox Breeders' association, of Colorado; Dr. Lenz, president of the California association; Bert Avery, from Pine Knot, Calif. A delegation from Washington state will also be present.

E. M. Walker, president of the Oregon association, will open the meeting. Others on the program for the home organization are Ed Brown, vice president; Eugene Finlay, secretary; C. W. Stacey, director.

Similar schools are being held in other fur raising localities this year, to enable all fur farmers to attend one central meeting. The schedule lists a school at Grusham, July 29; Liberty, July 30; Eugene, July 31; Coquille, August 2. Speakers from out of state associations will attend each of these schools.

Portland Youth
Dies of Injury
Near Woodburn

Richard Archer, 6200 East Burnside street, Portland, died as a result of injuries received late Friday night when he, a pedestrian, was struck by an automobile driven by Dick Pierce, 1610 Fir street, Salem, on the highway near Woodburn. Details of the accident had not been received here from Oregon City state police, who investigated, at an early hour this morning. It was not known whether Archer was a relative of the former Salem family of that name. Pierce graduated from Salem high school in 1933.

OREGON COMPANY
SUED UNDER NRA

PORTLAND, Ore., July 27.—(AP)—Alleging that the Oregon Worsted company and its officers have violated provisions of the national recovery act and Oregon laws giving workers the right to organize and bargain collectively, a suit to enjoin the company and officers from interfering with or intimidating its employees "with respect to their right to self organization for purposes of collective bargaining or other mutual aid or protection" was filed in circuit court here today by the Oregon State Federation of Labor; Ben T. Osborne, executive secretary of that federation; local union No. 2025, United Textile Workers of America, and Charles Reimers, president of the local.

The Oregon Worsted company; Ray T. Bishop, president and general manager; W. Pratt, plant superintendent, and Orville and Clarence Hopp, plant foremen, are named as defendants.

The complaint alleged that six employees of the company have been discharged because of their membership in the union, and also states that efforts to form a company union have been made in order to interfere with the United Textile Workers local. The plaintiffs ask the court to order the company to restore employment to all employees discharged because of union membership, to issue a decree prohibiting further discharges, to restrain the company from forming a company association of employees and from interfering with employees in their right to organize.

PORTLAND, July 27.—(AP)—A total enrollment of 2214 students in the six weeks regular summer sessions of the Oregon state system of higher education was reported today by Alfred Powers, director, as the sessions came to a close.

Powers said the three normal schools had a total enrollment of 539, Oregon State college had 407, and the University of Oregon sessions in Eugene and Portland, 1268. The total represents an increase of 421 over the summer of 1933. Out-state enrollment was 407.
