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reformers in Washington" with placing emphasis "upon reconstruction before recovery, since if private business recovers it will be difficult for them to put over their ideas of reconstructing the present social and economic order."

"The brain trust in Washington and other theorists and reformers want to break down private industry, they wish to stifle the element of profit, substituting instead an altruistic form of business designed only to furnish employment," the senator charged. "They are urging that private business fail."

"The day will speedily come when, if they are allowed to continue their theories and throttle private business, they will point to its failure and urge that everything be done by the government."

Ringed echoes of Lincoln's plea for the preservation of government for, by, and of the people were snatched out of history and flung again into the political battle of Oregon by Congressman Mott as he laid down a challenge for republicans to recapture the constitutional functions of congress at the fall elections.

Addressing the banquet of the state association, Congressman Mott declared the great issue today was whether people would allow their constitutional representatives make the laws of the country or whether they would turn all these powers over to bureau chiefs responsible only to the president.

"Within the last few months the issue in this country has been clearly defined by the administration," Mott declared. "The last session of congress saw the abject surrender of legislation, delegated to the congress by the constitution, to the president by the overwhelming democratic majority."

"I feel safe in saying to you tonight that most of this power already is vested in the president who may, at his discretion, order the free coinage of silver, issue paper money in any amounts, take silver as payment for foreign debts and do many other things properly belonging to congress."

"This issue of constitutional governor against government bureaucracy is, in my opinion, the most important issue ever raised in this country since the Declaration of Independence."

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at 8000 feet. Then, he reported to the seventh army corps headquarters at Omaha, Neb., he and his two companions clambered on top of the eight feet by four metal ball as it rushed toward the ground at sickening speed. They attempted to release the gigantic parachute with which the sphere was equipped but their efforts met with no success.

They laughed about their experiences. They had made light of their predicament even when they were swinging in space 60-8000 feet above sea level, hemmed in by intense cold and darkness and the uncertainty that revolved about the tears that appeared in the big bag.

Kepner gave a graphic account of the first drama broadcast from the stratosphere and of the grim battle against death and disaster. He said he first sighted the rips in the enormous envelope at the peak of the ascent—60,000 feet. The cause he attributed to "either strain or inflation."

"We looked through a window and saw a hole 50 feet long," he related. "We sat and sort of waited to see if we were going to come down in the gondola at about a mile a minute and would have to get out."

"At that height a man can not live. At 20,000 feet we opened our gondola and got out on top and looked around and thought then we might be able to land it and save the instruments."

"Any way we thought we would take a chance to save them and try to land, for some of those instruments were very valuable."

"But the speed we were coming down—500 feet a minute although sometimes it was not over 300—had a paralyzing effect which was too much for the balloon. It tore out all the lower part and just left the upper part with a parachute with a little hydrogen floating in it."

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graduate school of theology one year later with the degree of A. M. He was a Phi Beta Kappa. In 1917 he received the degree of S. T. B. (Bachelor of Sacred Theology) from the Boston university school of theology. He was ordained in the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal church in 1918 and became field secretary of the Methodist Centenary movement. In 1919 he was attached to the interchurch world movement.

From 1920 to 1924 Dr. Baxter was professor of English Bible at Mt. Union college, leaving there to become professor of homiletics and chaplain at the University of Southern California. In 1930 he was made assistant to the president of the university and in 1931 the dean of the school of religion. The University of Southern California is operated under auspices of the Methodist Episcopal church.

In the summer of 1925 Dr. Baxter was preacher at Highbury Quadrant church, London, England. He has the honorary degrees of D. D. from College of Pacific and LL. D. from California Christian college. He is a fellow of the Pacific Geographic society and a member of the Society of Biblical Literature and Exegesis. He delivered lectures under the Mat thew Simpson foundation at DePauw university in 1932.

Dr. Baxter is widely traveled having made a trip around the world; one visit to the orient, going as faculty representative with the university baseball team on a tour of Japan and Manchuria; two trips to the near east; one to the South Sea Islands; and is now on a trip to the southern hemisphere.

His personal affiliations are: Mason (Knight Templar), Rotary and Breakfast clubs, and republican party.

In 1924 he was married to Martha Harold. They have no children. Mrs. Baxter is highly praised as a worthy helpmeet for her husband.

LOAN ASSOCIATION REPORT MADE OUT

The annual report of the state corporation department on all savings and loan associations is in process of compilation, Oscar Peterson, in charge of that work in the corporation department's offices, announced yesterday.

Much progress in liquidating associations in state receivership has been made in recent weeks through refinancing of mortgages with the Home Owners Loan cor-

poration. Peterson is hopeful that a greater salvage of assets can be made than seemed probable a year ago. The forthcoming report will cover the 12-months' period ending June 30, 1934. It will include a comparison of operating costs between the solvent associations operating in the state.

WHAT IS A FEDERAL SAVINGS & LOAN ASSOCIATION?

Federal Savings and Loan Associations are local, privately owned and privately managed thrift institutions, strictly mutual and owned by all of its shareholders. They operate under Federal charter and supervision, and are subject to frequent Federal examinations. Their organization is made possible by an Act of Congress approved by the President of the United States on June 13, 1933. Careful investigation is made as to the character and responsibility of

the management of all Federal Savings and Loan Associations. All shares in a Federal Savings and Loan Association are non-assessable. With two exceptions the funds received by an association come almost exclusively from the savings of its own community. The two exceptions are, subscriptions to shares by the Secretary of the Treasury on behalf of the United States and advances from the Federal Home Loan Bank, of which the association must be a member.

Mutual Federal Savings and Loan Association of Salem Now Open for Business

Such an association has been formed in Salem and now has the Federal Government charter, and is ready to serve depositors and make loans in Salem and vicinity.

This association is organized by members and friends of the Mutual Savings and Loan group and will be managed and operated principally by the same officers and in the same quarters.

HOW TO BUY SHARES

Four different types of shares are available in any Federal Savings and Loan Association, to fit the incomes and circumstances of various classes of investors. All four types of shares have a par value of \$100. The main difference between one type and another is in the method of paying for them, which varies from 50 cents a month on installment payments to \$100 in outright lump sum payment.

- Installment Thrift Shares** are bought by regular monthly payments at the rate of 50¢ a share for each share subscribed for.
- Optional Savings Shares** can be purchased by irregular payments of varying sums of money in any amount from \$1 upward.
- Prepaid Shares** have been designed for lump sum investment of less than the full par value of the shares, where the saver wishes the dividends to remain in the account and accumulate over a period of time until the value reaches par.
- Full-paid Income Shares** are provided for lump sum investments of full par value of the shares, where the shareholder wishes to have current dividends paid to him in cash.

MONEY Available for LOANS

In addition to money of the association the Federal Government will assist with funds from the Federal Reserve bank. There will be plenty of money available for good loans.

A loan must not be made for an amount exceeding 75 per cent of the appraised value of a home, or combination of home and business property.

Loans on real estate may not be made by Federal Savings and Loan Associations for a term of less than 5 years nor more than 20 years. All loans on real estate must be paid off through monthly amortization installments sufficient to retire the debt in the agreed period.

Loans will be made for new construction and for remodeling and improving the present home, or for paying back taxes, etc. For instance—your home needs painting, the bathroom or other rooms need to be modernized, a new foundation is required and probably some back taxes should be paid. Any or all of these can be included in your loan and paid off in 5 or 10 years in monthly amounts.
