At the reunion, L. A. Jones of Portland, had a splendid exhibit of hand carved articles including moose, oxen teams and covered wagons, two-wheeled carts, horses and wagon, saddle horses, axes, kegs, spades, guns and many other articles particularly representing pioneer days.
