Either Fresh or Cooked Vegetables in Plate Dish

FRESH vegetable plate lunches are just as popular as those made up of cooked vegetables, but either type is eligible in this week's Recipe Round Table contest. List the ingredients or vegetables which make up the individual plate luncheon or dinner, or the combinations used on one large platter. If the arrangement is attractive and unique, explain it. State how many it serves if one large platter is described.

For luncheon sometime this week, try this crab concoction:

Deviled Crab

1/2 part crab meat
1/2 part bread crumbs
Soak bread crumbs in one cup of cream, or half milk and half cream until soft and fluffy. Add dash of nutmeg, paprika, salt, cayenne pepper to taste. Mix with crab meat. Add a teaspoon of onion juice and lots of melted butter. Put in well buttered large clam shells or ramekins. Fry some bread crumbs in butter and sprinkle over top. Allow to bake in moderate oven for half an hour. Four crabs will serve 12 people. I serve sliced tomatoes, salted water, and coffee with this delicious recipe.

Crab DeLuxe

1 tablespoon minced onion
1 tablespoon minced celery
1 tablespoon minced green pepper
3 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
Salt, pepper, paprika
1/2 teaspoon each mustard and Worcestershire sauce
Dash of garlic salt
1 1/2 cups milk
1 to 1 1/2 cups crab flakes
1 tablespoon pimento
1 tablespoon minced parsley
Make a white sauce by melting butter and frying onion, celery and green pepper until tender. Add flour and seasonings, then milk and cook until thickened. Add parsley, pimento and crab. Two hard-boiled eggs may be used if less crab is desired. Serve on toast. Makes six portions.

Crab Salad Supreme

3 tablespoons granulated gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
2 cups boiling water
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
5 tablespoons lemon juice
1/2 cup chili sauce
1/2 cup chopped sweet pickles
1/2 cup finely chopped celery
3 tablespoons chopped pimento or more
2 1/2 cups crab meat, canned or fresh
2 hard-boiled eggs, sliced.
Soak gelatin in cold water 5 minutes. Add boiling water and salt and mix well until the gelatin has dissolved. Add sugar and lemon juice and stir. Cool. Fold in rest of ingredients and pour into individual molds. Set in refrigerator to stiffen. Unmold on lettuce and surround with mayonnaise.

Three Gypsies Arrested on Pickpocket Charges; Two Identify

Denying vehemently that they took \$48 from R. B. Miller, 1325 Ferry street, but in almost the same breath offering to give it back to him, got a gypsy trio yesterday in justice court yesterday afternoon.

The three, Mary and Rosa Lee and Deey Lee were arrested early yesterday afternoon by Officer Don Nicholson after Miller identified them as the group he saw Monday. One of the gypsies, women, then purporting to be an Indian, posed as a divine healer while she took \$48 from Miller's hip pocket. Miller said yesterday that the woman removed the money, including three silver dollars, from the wallet in his pocket and put the wallet back without his getting an inkling of what was going on.

The gypsies with which the trio practiced their "art" was also told officers by another man, whom the gypsies accosted to ask the way to a church. They asked this man to come closer to the car, as they could not hear him, they said. While he put his foot on the running board of the car, one of the trio extracted \$7.50 from his purse, and put the purse back. The man didn't discover the loss until some time later.

The trio, accused of larceny, will have a preliminary hearing in justice court this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Meantime they are all in jail in lieu of \$500 bail each.

LACK OF TITLE TO LAND, SUIT BASIS

General damages of \$7900 and specific damages of \$500 are sought from W. Winslow and S. M. Endicott, joint defendants, in a suit filed in circuit court Tuesday by E. J. and Mary Edna Gilstrap. Plaintiffs allege that they contracted, October 6, 1932, to buy a house and certain land from defendants, for \$2500. Two payments of \$200 each were made and the remaining \$2100 became due in a lump sum, when defendants provided a marketable title to the property.

Plaintiffs assert that Winslow and Endicott were not able to produce a marketable title and that the general damage they suffered thereby is \$7900. In addition they assert \$500 costs for attorney's fees and other litigation expense over a suit growing out of the transaction.

Winslow, to whom Endicott's interest in the Gilstrap contract had been assigned, sought specific performance on the contract, without success, in the circuit and supreme courts.

Apple Large as Pumpkin Shown

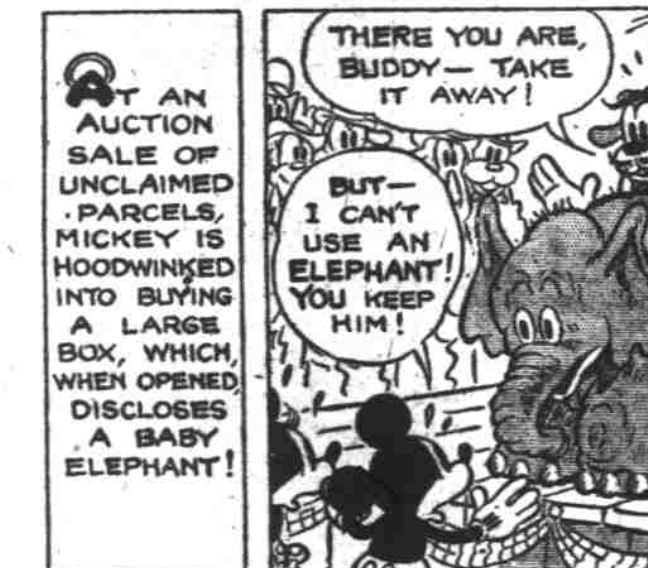

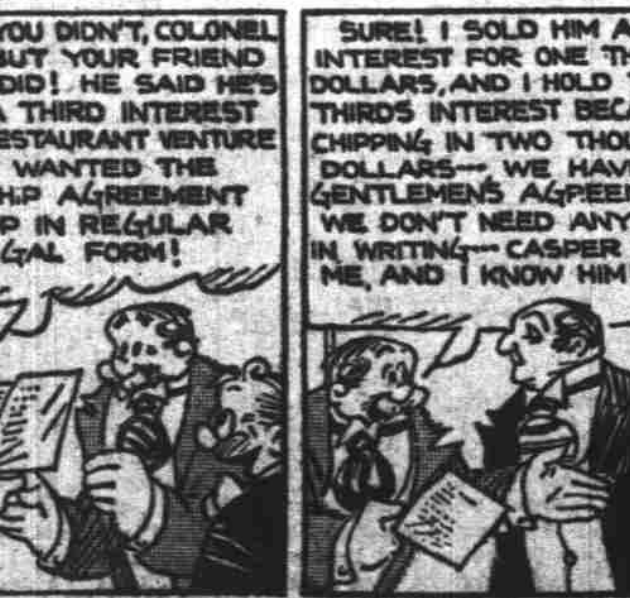
