28 Leading Detroiters Indicted by Federal Grand Jury, Second Report

holiday, Robert O. Lord, of the Guardian group, which had units in a score of Michigan cities, and E. D. Stair, of the Detroit Bankers' company, whose units were confined to Detroit and vicinity, are among those indicted. Stair, publisher of the Detroit Free Press, became president of the holding company in 1932, serving without salary.

Also under indictment are John Ballantyne, dean of Detroit bankers, former president of the Detroit Bankers company, now president of the Manufacturers National bank, and Wilson W. Mills, former chairman of the First National bank, Detroit, largest unit of the Detroit Bankers company. The transactions upon which the indictments against the former Detroit Bankers' officials and directors are based consisted of the purchase by the Peoples Wayne County bank, a holding company unit, of notes allegedly given by officers and employees of the bank to a mailer outfitting banks from which they had borrowed money, using Detroit Bankers' company stock as collateral. The government charges that this was done at the instigation of the holding company and that it cost depositors of the First National, with which the Peoples Wayne subsequently was merged, a half million dollars.

Fourteen former Peoples Wayne directors and officials are charged with misapplication of the \$544,221.35 used in buying these notes.

Wilson river roads, the commission, said, in part:

"In the opinion of the commission the Wolf Creek road is more important to the people of Oregon, than the Wilson river road. The construction of the Wolf Creek highway through its entire length should have priority over all laterals, including the Wilson river highway.

"Considerable study was given to the request of the people of the City of Tillamook and the Tillamook county court for the building of the highway up Wilson river to serve as a logging road for the salvaging of the burned timber between Mills Bridge and Falls Creek, a distance of seven miles, with prospective later extension to McNamara Camp. The initial project would cost \$350,000, and the next extension \$750,000.

"The highway commission has never constructed logging roads or any other road for special use for private parties, having held to the broad principle that highways should be constructed for the motorist and the general public."

west of hot springs, Mont., on the cabinet forest, was reported to be "under control."

Cheering news came from British Columbia, where more than a thousand men have fought huge blazes since Saturday. Scattered rains visited the area during last night, and more were in prospect today. Strong winds which have defied the efforts of the firefighters to hold the blazes within fire lines moderated today, removing temporarily the danger of destruction of Salmo and Grand Forks.

The Trout Creek fire in Montana was reported to be burning fiercely this afternoon, but crews of civilian conservation corps members had been able to work their way around to the "hot" end of the blaze to build fire lines. The blaze was reported to have a perimeter of seven and a half miles.

England Expects Dearer Prunes, Says Market Note

Oregon prune prices are on the English markets with even higher values anticipated shortly, according to a cable received by the U. S. department of agriculture this week from F. A. Mott, fruit specialist in Europe. The Mott cable stated:

"Prunes, London, California steady trade both spot and shipment. Prices very firm. New crop Oregon dealer with higher values anticipated in near future.

"Liverpool, good spot demand, for stocks all sizes low. Forward quotations old pack steady, not much business reported. New crop California quoted at ruling values, old fruit with no sales reported. Business new crop Oregon fairly heavy with slight advance in prices."

HINDENBURG IS CALLED IN DEATH

86-Year-Old President and General Dies at Neudeck Early This Morning

hastened back to Berlin for the cabinet meeting retorting that von Hindenburg's condition was serious but that his mind still functioned perfectly.

He said when he told the president that the entire nation honored and prayed his condition might take a turn for the better that von Hindenburg seized his hand warmly and shook it in grateful acknowledgment. Soon afterwards, said the chancellor, the president fell asleep.

The chancellor and official news agencies declined to give details of the cabinet session. It was said to have lasted into the early morning hours. About an hour and a half after the startling report that the reichs president was in the death throes, at 9:50 p. m., his physician, Dr. Ferdinand Sauerbruch, telephone from Neudeck that he was amazed at the president's powers of resistance and said he might linger for some time.

RECOVER PURSES STOLEN AT PARTY

Seven of nine purses stolen from Beta Chi sorority girls during a party at the R. W. Craig home July 23, were recovered by local police last night through the help of Rev. The theft occurred about 10:30 p. m. when Margaret and Edna Savage were entertaining their sorority sisters. A large window in a side room was open and finger prints found there indicated it was used to entrance to the house by the thieves. The Craig home is at 1320 Court street.

Police were without any clues last night to the identity of the thief or thieves. Apparently the purses had been rifled and then tossed into the vacant lot near the church where Rev. McCallum yesterday accidentally found them.

TELLS HISTORY OF MODERN MEDICINE

Tracing the history of the science of treating disease, Dr. Frances Ford of the Salem general hospital staff, held members of the Salem Rotary club fascinated with her story Wednesday noon. Little was known of scientific medicine or anatomy before the time of the Italian renaissance, she said, although there were some facts known.

For instance Hippocrates learned of the value of diet in pulling an ulcerated tooth.

The modern science of medicine was launched in Italy in the 14th century, the University of Padua becoming an early seat of medical learning. Leonardo da Vinci was the first modern student of anatomy. The invention of the microscope opened new fields and its application to medical science was first made by Pasteur and then by Koch and others. The whole field of bacteria and their relation to disease and health was exposed by the microscope and now this is a vital part in modern medicine.

Through discovery of anti-bodies and serums, germ-borne diseases are combated and no longer are there epidemics of smallpox, scarlet fever, typhoid, black plague.

Dr. Ford is pathologist, her specialty being the study of the effect of bacteria on the blood stream and on the tissues. These microscopic studies are relied on to determine the existence of cancer and other diseases. These studies are made at the time of operations so no mistake may be made or ailments overlooked.

Gets Permit to Exhume Body

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 1.—(AP)—John Dillinger, Jr., today sought and obtained permission to disinter the body of his son: "Wooden Gun John."

Accompanied by his attorney, Samuel J. Mantell, the 70-year-old father of the slain desperado went to the state board of health and filled out forms necessary for exhumation of the body which was buried last week in Crown Hill cemetery here.

He gave no reason for wanting to disinter the body and later between his stage appearances at a local theater he declined to discuss the matter. He would only say his action was taken following communication with some persons in Chicago. He refused to name these persons.

DEMOCRATS PICK WILBUR CHAIRMAN

Gen. Martin Says Oregon Has Followed Cheapshots; Scoffs at Windbagging

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1.—(AP)—The democratic state central committee today selected as its chairman George R. Wilbur of Hood River, who was supported by Walter M. Pierce, national democratic committeeman and candidate to succeed himself as second district congressman.

Wilbur received seven more votes than his opponent, Arthur K. McMahon, of Albany. Favell Temple of Portland was elected secretary on the third ballot, which finally eliminated Floyd Blythe and Vern Williams. E. J. Griffin, financial director for Oregon for the democratic national committee, was elected treasurer.

The party accepted the offered services of the young democratic clubs in such manner as the executive committee of the state committee shall outline. A woman vice-chairman will be named for each county and also a woman vice-chairman for each congressional district. Chairman Wilbur will handle the appointments and also will appoint a woman state vice-chairman.

General Charles H. Martin, democratic nominee for governor, declared Oregon has lacked leadership and has followed "cheap shots" who have been trying to run the state until we are all broke and unhappy.

He declared he was running for governor on his "own decision," but if it required "windbagging, demagoguery and promises I won't pay the price."

He urged support of the democratic ticket for what the administration has done for Oregon. That he outlined, and it totalled \$184,000,000 with Oregon's contribution toward the amount \$10,000,000.

Congressman Martin said he was in a campaign against "reactionary republicans" and a third party of radicals "not content with orderly progress, but is miles and miles ahead;... they are followers of (state senator) Zimmerman and the poor boobies don't realize they may ruin the whole program."

"The third group is the 'great menace' for it is the radicals who have been taking control in the labor movements. I'm sorry we have so many in Oregon."

He said the radicals want to wreck the capitalist machine and ruin free democracy and its institutions. In his expressed opinion the governorship contest is between himself and the candidate of this group.

passenger service from here direct to oriental points.

During the strike all passenger boat service here was suspended, and now the peak of the summer tourist season is over, Agent Gould explained.

However he said he had received assurance from higher officials that the service would be resumed "when practicable."

Meanwhile passengers are being routed to Seattle, which will have two passenger sailings a week.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1.—(AP)—The British motorship Pacific Reliance was scheduled to sail Saturday with the first of the 1934 fruit crop to be moved from here by water. She will take a carload of pears to London.

Movement of fruit from here will increase rapidly as the month progresses, and was expected to reach a high point about August 25 when a full cargo of about

30,000 boxes will be loaded by the Norwegian motorship California Express.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Progress toward formulation of a definite program listing points to be arbitrated was reported here tonight by William J. Lewis, district president of the International Longshoremen's association, whose membership ended their long walkout Tuesday by returning to work.

Officers of I. L. A. Lewis said, will present complete data on which they based their strike demands to employers by tomorrow night.

The announcement by Lewis followed a day of bickering over charges of discrimination made by both sides to the president's mediation board, and which interrupted direct negotiations between longshoremen and the employers.

The two groups had scheduled a joint meeting for 3 p. m. today in the hope of ironing out some of the issues, but the conference was cancelled by the Waterfront Employers' union. Both groups, instead, returned to the board of offices for further argument on the discrimination charges.

The board meanwhile, delayed arbitration procedure, probably until next week, to give the longshoremen and employers the opportunity to "settle as much as possible" among themselves without arbitration, according to O. K. Cushing, board spokesman.

SEATTLE, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Seattle docks boomed again today with activity as 21 ships sailed, some of them for other Puget Sound ports, and two extra gangs of longshoremen had to be brought here from Tacoma for work.

Dewey Bennett, secretary of the Seattle local of the Longshoremen's association, said that 1,600 members of the organization were on the job, nearly the entire roster.

Both longshoremen and seamen leaders were protesting over the failure of certain employers to take maritime strikers back to work. But they expressed willingness to live up to their part of the agreement which ended the strike, trusting the national longshoremen's board to see that justice was done, they said.

Jefferson Grower Delivering Beans to Hillman Plant

JEFFERSON, Aug. 1.—S. Y. Evans of Sisters has leased the 200 acre farm known as the Klamm farm, and moved on to the place this week.

Bean picking has started in the two-acre patch of D. M. Burnett just north of town. He has the Blue Lake variety of beans and he delivers them to the Cleary and Hillman plant in West Salem. About 10 people will be given employment in this two-acre field.

PUNISH REBELS; HANG THIRD NAZI

VIENNA, Aug. 1.—(AP)—With the hangman's rope, a sentence of imprisonment and empty pay envelopes, the government of Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg today pressed its fight against the defeated Nazi rebels of Austria.

Friedrich Wurmig, a Nazi, was hanged at 8 o'clock tonight at Innsbruck, three hours after he was sentenced to death for killing Police Commandant Franz Hiekl in that city last Wednesday.

Wurmig, the third Nazi to die on the gallows in two days, collapsed when he was told that clemency was refused and had to be carried to the gallows.

Although his crime occurred at about the same time that Chancellor Dollfuss was killed by Nazi putschists, it had no direct connection with that outbreak.

An alleged accomplice, Christian Meyer, was sentenced to 50 years imprisonment, receiving clemency, it was reported, because he had revealed Nazi secrets to the government.

Trial of another Nazi is scheduled to begin here tomorrow.
