serving potatoes sent in next week. Following are this week's winning menus:

August Special

1 medium sized green tomato (just turning) per person
Generous helping buttered corn per person
Generous helping rice potatoes per person
Garbanzo, minced onion, minced green pepper
Enough of clean and daintier corn husks from next the cob to form a boat for each plate
Grated cheese
Wash and slice tomatoes from 1/2 to 3/4 inch thick, dip in flour and fry to a nice brown. When they are turned the first time, salted and peppered, sprinkle into the surplus butter a minced onion. Just before lifting out of pan, sprinkle a teaspoonful of grated cheese over the top of each slice.

Arrange a helping of corn, held in corn husk boat through the center of the plate. Sprinkle a bit of green pepper on the corn.
On one side put a mound of rich potatoes, topped with butter. On the other side arrange the slices of tomato.
Fried cucumbers, summer squash or eggplant in the same manner are good in place of tomatoes.

Brown stock Riced potatoes Pitted olives

Seed peppers and garbolls for five minutes. Combine, serve, garnish and seasonings and pack into pepper cases. Bake in moderate oven for 30 minutes, basting with stock. Serve on riced potatoes and garnish with olives if desired. Serves four.

Lima Beans Chowder

2 cups lima beans
1/2 pound salt pork
3 cups chopped carrots
3 cups chopped potatoes
2 chopped green peppers
3 cups chopped celery
3 cups chopped onions
1 cup butter
1 cup milk
Salt and pepper
Cut pork in small cubes and fry out slowly for one hour. Add chopped vegetables and lima beans. Add butter and milk and season to taste with salt and pepper. Put in buttered casserole and bake slowly for one hour. This makes an entire meal and makes good use of leftovers. Should make six or eight generous helpings.

CREDIT CONDITIONS IN WEST IMPROVED

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Credit conditions among retailers in the far west appear better now than at any time in the last decade—a fact discernible through the records of San Francisco firms with their distributor customers.

The board of trade at San Francisco, handling cases of difficult collections for wholesalers here, had a 10-year low record of cases in July.

Charles B. Woodruff, president of the trade board, said today wholesalers whose business rami-fies through the region west of the Rocky mountains, had called on the board's services in only 178 instances during the month just closed. This compared with 216 in July last year, and 242 in the like month of 1932.

Collection difficulties were encountered in 1404 cases during the first seven months of this year, compared with 1951 for the 1932 period, and 2321 for the 1933 period.

Arthur Jordan is to be engineer in charge at the Sluslaw bridge at Florence. He supervised construction of the Jefferson bridge, of the Cape Creek bridge at Hecla head and of the Pacific highway bridge at Grants Pass.

McCullough said the personnel of the engineers under these supervisors would soon be determined. The engineers will come almost entirely from the corps of men who last year supervised the bridge part of the \$6,000,000 federal building program carried on in the state.

throughout the afternoon and evening carrying welcoming folks from this vicinity. They got an occasional glimpse of the president on the fore structure but he received no visitors.

The first mail since his departure from Hawaii last Saturday was put aboard and Mr. Roosevelt renewed contact with Washington by wireless tonight.

The president appeared tanned and refreshed as he came on deck early this morning to catch the first sight of continental United States territory since he left the Carolina capes behind a month ago.

The cruiser New Orleans trailed the Houston to anchor and let her cargo of newspapermen and secret service men ashore and departed early tonight for San Pedro.

Mr. Roosevelt departs tomorrow by train shortly after his arrival proceeding first to the new federal project Bonneville dam and then follows the Columbia basin to the power project at Grande Coulee, Wash.

After a first hand inspection of the northwest he is going to make a speech and perhaps several talks along the way and political observers are looking forward to these in the light of the fall congressional campaign, but the president's aides insist he is not thinking about politics just now.

FUNERAL IS TODAY FOR SONG WRITER

Rev. Charles E. Crandall, 74, Springfield, writer of the original "Home on the Range" song, died early Wednesday morning at the Oregon state hospital following a lingering illness.

The song is one of the most popular of old-time favorites, and represents the best known of his many other famous songs and articles.

Rev. Crandall was born in New York, April 26, 1860. In 1883 he married Miss Minerva Jayne Hayden who became the mother of five children, who still survive, though she has been dead since 1901. His second wife, Mary E. Miller, whom he married in 1902, still survives as do five children of this union.

He was associated with the Oregon Methodist conference for 16 years, but had retired from the ministry.

Funeral services will be held from the Pooles chapel in Springfield this morning at 10:30 a. m., with interment in the Laurel Grove cemetery.

STORE PROPERTIES SLOW PAYING TAX

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The largest amount of delinquent taxes for the year 1932 in Portland, Ore., was owed by store properties, a report by the division of real estate taxation of the bureau of the census revealed today.

The 493 store properties in the city which were analyzed showed an assessed value of \$34,768,974. Of this number 223 were reported behind on tax payments, owing \$73,000.

Director William L. Austin, of the census bureau, said that 8,946 pieces of real property were analyzed in Portland. The property had an assessed value of \$36,618,479 or 34.8 per cent of the assessed value of all real property in the city.

Almost half, or 4319 parcels of the property owed delinquent taxes to the city amounting to \$1,147,698, showing a delinquency of 27.9 per cent. Seventy-one per cent, of 6356, were one-family dwellings and of this number 3,048 were charged with being behind in taxes for 1932, the delinquency amounting to \$21,379.

Trusties Escape As Police With Pistols Look On

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Three city jail trustees escaped from the pistol range at Wasatch Springs, in the outskirts of the city, heretoday despite the fact that 20 policemen, all expert marksmen and each holding a pistol, were present.

The officers took the prisoners, who were serving six months each for automobile prowling, to the range to operate the targets. When firing reached a lull, the prisoners dropped their work and fled.

Although the 20 officers were lined up and within easy range of the escaping men, none fired a shot. The prisoners ran behind the Warm Springs building, through a small park next to it, and escaped.

ARCHER RETIRES AS WARDEN AT M'NEIL

M'NEIL ISLAND FEDERAL PRISON, Wash., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Finch R. Archer retired as warden of the federal penitentiary here today and received a benediction from almost 1000 convicts he has kept in prison.

"It is his credit for making McNeil Island the model penal institution, without walls, it is today," said "The Island Lantern," prison paper which speaks the minds of the inmates.

"His honor system has shown modern penology what can be done when an effort is made to understand the men placed in their charge, and where a respect for the custodial force is the dominating factor in sustaining order instead of fear."

Archer became warden 12 years ago through the late republican senator, Wesley L. Jones, whom he had not supported politically. He found here what "The Lantern" refers to as "a backwoods jail." There was, on this island, what was supposed to represent a penitentiary, in the midst of a savage wilderness.

Today there is a model plant. Gleaming white cellblocks, shining kitchens, spacious auditorium, infirmary, docks for prison boats, an "honor farm" where prisoners who have earned privileges may work with no machine guns staring at them. Most of this was done by prison labor, under direction of Archer.

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THREE ARE KILLED IN EASTERN STORM

DETROIT, Aug. 2.—(AP)—At least three persons were killed, a crowded excursion steamer was driven ashore and property damage estimated at more than \$1,000,000 was done by a heavy wind and rain storm which swept over eastern Michigan late today.

The storm, sweeping southward from Flint, unroofed or demolished buildings, uprooted trees and disrupted communication and power services in four counties.

The steamer Tashmoo, enroute to Detroit with 250 excursionists aboard, was driven ashore on the Canadian side of the St. Clair river near Algoma. Both paddle wheels of the vessel were smashed. Coast guards took off 150 of the passengers. The 100 remaining aboard were believed to be in no danger as the storm had subsided. The steamer Putnam-Bay was dispatched from Detroit to the stranded steamer.
