'HERE COMES NAVY' OPENS AT ELSINORE

Cagney-O'Brien Team Head of Cast in Play Replete With Action, Fun

"Here Comes the Navy," Warner Bros.' smashing drama of Uncle Sam's jack-tars afloat, ashore and in the air, opens at the Elsinore theatre today with James Cagney and Pat O'Brien in co-starring roles.

Based on Ben Markson's exciting story which combines romance, rollicking comedy, rapid-fire action and breath-taking thrills, the picture is said to be one of the most tremendous productions ever put out by Warner Bros.

HEPBURN PICTURE COMES TO STATE

Forging still another link in her chain of outstanding successes, Katharine Hepburn will be seen in this city in her latest, and what is said to be her greatest, screen hit to date, "Spitfire," opening today at the State theatre. In this she appears as Trigger Hicks, an elemental girl of the Carolina mountains, a blend of mysticism, combativeness and loving sentiment. It is indeed a character of the most vivid contrasts, and therefore offers a splendid opportunity for the display of the talent and genius that is Katharine Hepburn's.

Her work in this colorful role presents yet another side of the gifted young actress. The praise lavished upon her work in "A Bill of Divorcement" and in "Morning Glory" and in "Little Women" has not tempted her to carry over any mannerisms from these roles into her present performance.

She brings freshness of viewpoint, honesty, understanding and complete sincerity to her playing of Trigger Hicks, making the character vibrate with all the warmth and emotional power that is Miss Hepburn's, both in her two love affairs and in her madcap moods. It is by far her most difficult role to date, calling, as it does, for lightning-like changes of emotion, and it is self-evident, therefore, that it is not something that could have been accomplished solely by capable direction.
