would rationalize production to demand."

Oregon and the other states of the northwest have fared handsomely in the matter of federal expenditures, the senator said. While the wealthy industrial east complains about money grants these states for roads and dams and bridges, the senator said such outlay was only fair since so much of the state's wealth went back to the centers of population and since the aim of the federal government was the development of all the union rather than the growth of a few already populous and wealthy states.

Questioned about President Roosevelt, the senator commented that the chief executive was always pleasant to meet and while he had frequently had to disagree with the chief executive in legislation sought by the latter, he had never found Mr. Roosevelt ill-tempered or hostile. He said the president had great political ability. Recovery on Its Way Inevitably, Stated

Senator McNary believes that the element of time, more than any other factor, is slowly bringing recovery to the nation. The next two years will see great progress made, in his opinion. "We are a young, virile, energetic people; nothing can hold us back," he declared.

For a month or so the senator will rest, delighted to be home. Then will come a trip about the state, visiting friends and seeing what the various groups of Oregon constituents need. Meanwhile there will be office hours in the Salem headquarters he has so long occupied. And of course considerable attention to the filibuster and the pruned crop with some tidbits thrown to the trout which have such a lovely time in the spacious pool at Fircone.

Santiam Grading Contract to be Let September

QUINTUPLET GIVEN RADIUM TREATMENT

CALLANDER, Ont., Aug. 6. — (P) — Developments of the first radium treatment to Marie, smallest of the Dionne quintuplets, were awaited tonight in hope of curing a tumorous growth on her right side.

Dr. Howard Kelly, emeritus professor of gynecology of Johns Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, with his son, Dr. Edmund Kelly of the same institution, and his grandson visited the Dionne farm over the weekend and brought the radium.

The radium, in a box, was strapped to the child's leg and left there 44 minutes. Dr. A. R. Dufosse, Callander physician who has cared for the five little sisters since their birth 70 days ago, said there would be no outward change in the appearance of the tumor for about 10 days. He added he hoped this would be the only treatment although it might be necessary to give another application in about six months.

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MERGER OF LOAN GROUPS STARTED

Three Associations to Be Combined, Plan Worked Out by C. H. Carey

Merger of the Federal Union Savings and Loan association, the Prudential Savings and Loan association and the Western Savings and Loan association, was undertaken Monday by Charles H. Carey, state corporation commissioner.

Carey said the three companies, with assets of approximately \$2,000,000 owned by 8800 shareholders, would be merged into the "Consolidated Building and Loan association," to insure a strong organization without danger of overloading at the start. The merger was authorized under a state court order issued July 30. Carey declared that he had taken advantage of the Federal Home Owners' Loan corporation facilities to convert delinquent mortgages into cash to strengthen the quality of the assets.

The corporation commissioner has requested that all shareholders send in their books at once for identification. He said a large number of members already had approved the general plan.

The new consolidated association will be of the "mutual" type, and any increases in values of the assets will belong to the members. The proposal provides that each member or shareholder shall receive participating shares of two series. Dividends will be paid on the first at the rate of four per cent per year. The second group will represent the interest of members in the "recovery fund," and after dividends have been paid on the first, dividends may be distributed to the holders of the second series out of the recovery fund.

IRRIGATION TOUR WILL OPEN TODAY

The annual Willamette valley two-day irrigation tour gets under way from the Ed Prudential farm a mile from Hillsboro at 1 o'clock this afternoon and in order will today visit the farms of:

Warren Roberts in Gales Creek valley, where lunch will be enjoyed; Felix Comyges between Ballston and Perrydale; Robert Mitchell near Perrydale; S. H. Robinson, two miles east of Rickreall and Mrs. Hulda Armstrong in Benton county. Irrigated Landino clover, potatoes, red clover and other crops will be viewed.

Wednesday's tour will start from the college east farm two miles east of the Willamette river bridge near Corvallis at 8:30 a.m., and will also view the W. G. Medler farm southeast of Lebanon, where lunch will be eaten; the H. E. Mullen farm a half mile west of Crabtree where grows irrigated mint; and the Lake Labish community, six miles north of Salem, where irrigated celery and onions will be viewed. Irrigated walnuts will be seen at the Medler farm.

All farmers and orchardists interested are urged to join the tour.

Contract for 250 bales of 1934 fuggles at 32 cents has been made by Walker and Seavey of Independence with Liversley and company, buyers. Buying has been over a week, though within the past two weeks English buyers have made three-year contracts on about 1000 bales at 20-18-18 cents per pound to growers.

FIRST HOP PICKING TO START MONDAY

Gouley Fuggles Lead, Said; Early Clusters Ready Around August 20

First hop picking for the 1934 season in this section will get under way next Monday, August 10, at the Romeo Gouley yard of fuggles in the Brooks area, as near as can be learned. Picking of the early crop in the big Liversley Lakebrook yard north of town will be started a week later, August 17.

Harvest of the early clusters will start around the 20th for most yards, and the late crop will not come on until the usual time, about September 1.

The early hop crop will be only a few days ahead of the usual harvest time, in spite of some talk that these would come on as early as this week. Most other crops, including prunes which usually come on about the time of the late hops, have been nearly a month early this year.

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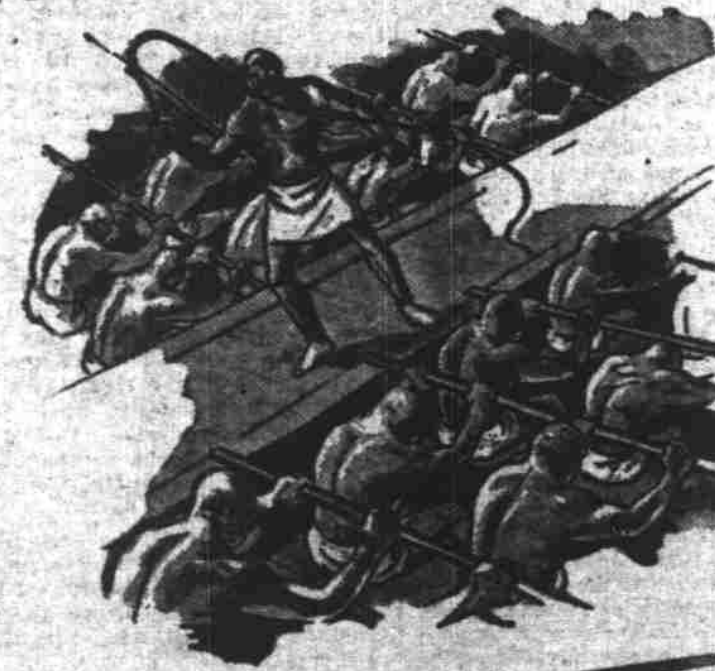
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
