DENIAL MADE THAT PROPERTY IS SOLD

Denial that the late Cornelia A. Davis of Turner had ever entered into a contract with Ball Brothers there to sell a 68-acre farm tract was made yesterday by A. E. Schirman as counsel for the First Christian church of Turner in a counter-affidavit filed in circuit court. The trustees for the church seek damages of more than \$7000 from the Ball brothers for alleged improper removal of 2400 cords of wood from the farm.

Schirman's affidavit sets out that S. M. Endicott, executor of the Davis will "in pursuance of a common scheme entered into a purported contract" in which Endicott "purported to sell" to the Ball brothers the 68 acres for \$4000.

Schirman declares that only \$450 was paid of the \$4000 and that Endicott first stated. He declares that Lee C. Ball testified in court recently that timber on the land was worth \$5000 and that the land, with the timber cut off, had a value of \$50 an acre.

The plaintiff seeks an injunction restraining the Ball brothers from cutting any more wood until the pending damage suit is adjudicated.

Audit of Liquor Stores Will Be Made Quarterly

Audits of each liquor store and agency in Oregon by the state department of audit will be made each three months, C. W. Starr, chief auditor, said yesterday. The initial audits are well under way, he reported. Most stores have revealed very little discrepancy between inventory records and a physical inventory of stocks on hand.

Two members of the state auditing department are handling the work. One, E. E. Croust, was formerly with the liquor commission; Claude S. Knight, the other liquor store auditor, has been with the state audit department for some time.

SHELL PRESIDENT GOING TO EUROPE

Announcement has been made that George Leigh-Jones, president of the Shell Oil company, will leave San Francisco shortly for London where he will represent the worldwide interests of the Royal Dutch Shell group. The promotion comes as recognition of Leigh-Jones' outstanding talents as an oil man and his experience in the oil business in the United States. He will be Sir Henry De-Stirling's immediate assistant and will be directly in charge of the Royal Dutch Shell group's interests in North and South America.

S. Belither has been appointed president to succeed Mr. Leigh-Jones. He has been executive vice president the past year.

Mr. Leigh-Jones came to the Pacific coast in 1922 as president of the Shell Oil company, then Shell company of California. At that time the company's interests represented only a small fraction of what they are today. Prior to 1922 the company had oil production only in Coalinga oil fields and refineries at Martinez and Coalinga, California, while its marketing activities were restricted to relatively few of the major metropolitan centers on the coast. Today Shell Oil company has five refineries located at Coalinga, Martinez, Wilmington, Dominguez, California and Shellburn, British Columbia. It has a substantial share of the oil production in every important oilfield in California and its marketing activities extend throughout the states of California, Arizona, Washington, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, Idaho, Montana, Utah, and Wyoming, the Territory of Hawaii, and the Province of British Columbia.

HOLMAN OFFERS AID TO SMALLER CITIES

Before any city in Oregon takes steps to adjust its municipal indebtedness through bankruptcy proceedings or employ under contract any person to formulate a debt adjustment plan, it should ask for the assistance of the state government, insofar as such assistance is available.

This was announced by Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, yesterday, after he had received inquiries from several financially embarrassed municipalities as to whether they should avail themselves of the provisions of the federal municipal bankruptcy act.

"Receivership and bankruptcy proceedings are not only costly to administer, but have a tendency to prolong settlements and adjustments," Holman's statement read.

Holman declared that smaller communities who are indebtedness is not great, may refund their obligations upon a basis of the ability of such communities to pay interest and principal, without incurring costs incident to receivership and bankruptcy proceedings. He said that in several cases in which refunding operations have been handled through the cooperation of the state treasurer's office, the expenses were limited to a very nominal amount.

Highway Meeting Postponed, Word

The meeting of the state highway commission previously set for August 23 in Portland, to consider awarding of contracts under the federal highway aid appropriation of \$3,100,000, has been postponed until such time as the allocation of the fund has been approved by the federal government. The state highway commission allocated the funds a week ago but federal approval is necessary before actual construction operations can begin.
