Benefits of Codes
Traced by Gehlar

Gehlar traced the growth of codes, both national and state, and listed benefits derived by agriculture from their adoption.

R. A. Bailey, of Springfield, chairman of the control board, and John F. White, member of the board's executive committee, also spoke briefly.

Following these addresses, the meeting voted unanimously to approve action of the control board in arbitrating difficulties with cannery. Growers also expressed complete confidence in the board and Gehlar.

Events which preceded the agreement were numerous.

Control board members enlisted the aid of local bankers in an effort to get cannery to obey the code.

Some cannery were said to have sold futures "short" and by so doing might take a loss if higher prices than those anticipated at the time of sale were enforced.

Small quantities of green fruit were purchased yesterday at cannery prices. These sales, control members insisted, were from farmers who did not understand the code fully.

Board members and Gehlar lauded cannery for their willingness to submit differences to arbitration.

**CITY'S TELEPHONE
BILL \$99 MONTHLY**

The monthly telephone bill of the city of Salem is \$99.05, a report from H. V. Collins, district manager for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, states. This report was requested by Building Inspector E. C. Bushnell, who is making a survey of the city's telephone requirements in an effort, asked by the city council, to reduce this bill.

The fire department account for nearly half of the entire bill, or for \$44.05. Its services include five separate phones with one or more extensions and three private lines between stations totaling two and one-half miles in length. The police department's bill was listed at \$20.75 for three connections. Other offices with phones are treasurer, recorder, engineer and city barn.

Bushnell believes the single phone at the city library and the one phone each at Leslie and Olinger playgrounds may come under his study.

Under its new franchise the telephone company no longer gives the city free service.

BANCROFT BOND CRISIS IS SEEN

City Has Kept Up Interest

foreclosure suits against properties delinquent on assessments. That these actions never were undertaken is blamed on press of legal business in connection with the municipal water program.

As pointed out by City Treasurer C. Rice yesterday, foreclosures would prove of doubtful assistance in bolstering the bond funds since large blocks of property delinquent on assessments are vacant and at present could not be immediately sold by the city. At the same time foreclosure action would remove property from the tax rolls and thereby injure the financial status of the city in other fields. A flurry of foreclosing, however, might encourage other property owners to make good on their assessments.

The recent call of the council for departmental budget estimates for 1935 also brings the Bancroft bond dilemma into bolder relief. The problem is gradually attracting the attention of the aldermen and may result in an attempt this fall to effect a remedy by a stringent assessment collection policy or an added tax, or both.

**Annual Audits Show
Growth of Deficit**
A study of the city audits for the past three years shows the annual deficit in the Bancroft bond interest account.

At the end of 1930 this deficit amounted to \$56,150.96; in 1931 it rose to \$80,083.96; in 1932, to \$105,798.36, and in 1933 to \$129,836.27.

The condition of the sinking fund is also revealed by the audits as one of diminishing proportions up until last year when the city redeemed none of the bonds.

At the end of 1930 the sinking fund cash balance was \$110,282.12; in 1931 it dropped to \$106,231.07; in 1932, to \$103,831.48, and in 1933, the year of non-payment of bonds, it rose to \$178,327.68.

Bancroft bonds differ from general obligation bonds in that funds for their redemption are supposed to come from property owners' payment of assessments for street improvements. They do, however, bear the city's credit pledge and any default in paying interest or principal would blacken the city's credit standing.

Mix all ingredients with a fork until light. Shape into croquettes. Roll in fine bread crumbs, then into beaten egg which has been thinned with a little cold water. Roll again in bread crumbs and fry in deep fat. Drain on unglazed paper and serve hot. This will make from six to eight croquettes.
