

FERA EDUCATORS TO GATHER AT EUGENE

EUGENE, Aug. 9.—The Northwest Training Institute, a nine-day session called to train educational supervisors for the federal emergency relief administration's program for the coming year, will meet on the University of Oregon campus August 8 to 16, it was announced here by Dr. C. V. Boyer, university president.

The federal government has designated 13 institutions of higher education in the United States as centers for these institutes, and the university here will serve the states of Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho. Between 30 and 40 supervisors will meet with an equal number of state administrators and staff members of the university and state college for an intensive study of the work to be undertaken.

The "five-point program" will be the basis of study, starting August 8 at 9 a. m. These "points" are a full education, vocational education, literacy and nursery schools. Experts will also outline the interrelation of the F. E. R. A., the United States office of education, state relief administration, a state department of education, county relief committee, county school superintendent's office and city and town school systems.

Administration of the institute will be under Dr. Boyer and Alfred Powers, dean and director of the general extension division of the Oregon state system of higher education. L. R. Alderman, director of education for the F. E. R. A., and Robert H. Hiseley, regional administrator, will represent the federal government.

Shelburne Farm Shows High Yield Fall Sown Wheat

DAYTON, Aug. 9.—From eight acres on the John Shelburne farm near Dayton 86 bushels an acre of Holland fall sown wheat was received when threshing with a combine was completed Wednesday. This is the highest yield for this locality reported for this season.

CORN CANNING SOON
STAYTON, Aug. 9.—The Marion county portable cannery will begin operation in the Masonic park here August 11 instead of the 17th, as was previously announced. The cannery will be here until the 18th.

U. O. SCIENTISTS PROBE LAKE BEDS

EUGENE, Aug. 9.—Off on an expedition right here in the state of Oregon that may bring forth archaeological, anthropological and geological discoveries important as those made in far-off Asia, Africa or South America, six scientists from the University of Oregon and Stanford university left Eugene last week. They drove from here direct to Lakeview, then took a winding mountain road that after 75 miles of traveling, brought them to Guano Lake ranch, some 40 miles east from Lakeview as the crow flies.

Those on the trip, which will last approximately a month, are Dr. L. S. Cressman, professor of sociology at the university here and a noted authority on anthropology. Major H. H. Back, professor of military science and highly skilled in topography; Howard Stafford and Fred J. Hoffstad, advanced students at the university and Joel Berreman and Carl Reynolds, advanced students from Stanford university. The region in which the scientists will carry on their research work is one of the richest fields for this type of investigation on

the North American continent, declares Dr. Cressman, leader of the group. On previous expeditions he has found a wide variety of Indian rock writings and evidences of races who roamed this section many ages ago. It is hoped to discover how far north the "Great Basin" culture of prehistoric races was established.
