archdiocese of Oregon City: Rt. Rev. Henry Rohlfman, D. D., Bishop of Davenport, Iowa; Rt. Rev. Magr. James H. Black, of Portland, and Rt. Rev. Magr. Achternagel of Seattle, Wash.

Rt. Rev. Magr. Arthur Lane of Portland preached the sermon, in which he expounded the rule of St. Benedict and paid tribute to the new abbot by saying he was what St. Benedict required "a lover of his brethren." He also addressed the venerable Abbot Bernard Murphy who for the past 13 years has been head of the monastery and who was awarded the privilege of an assistant abbot by the Pontiff, Pius XI, because of his falling eyesight.

Abbot Choir Sings Gregorian Chant
The abbot choir under the direction of Rev. Cyril Lebold, O. S. B., sang the Gregorian chant of St. Lawrence and the Ordinary of the third Gregorian Mass "Kyrie Deus Semper," composed in the eleventh century. Rt. Rev. Phaedrus Fuerst of Portland played the organ.

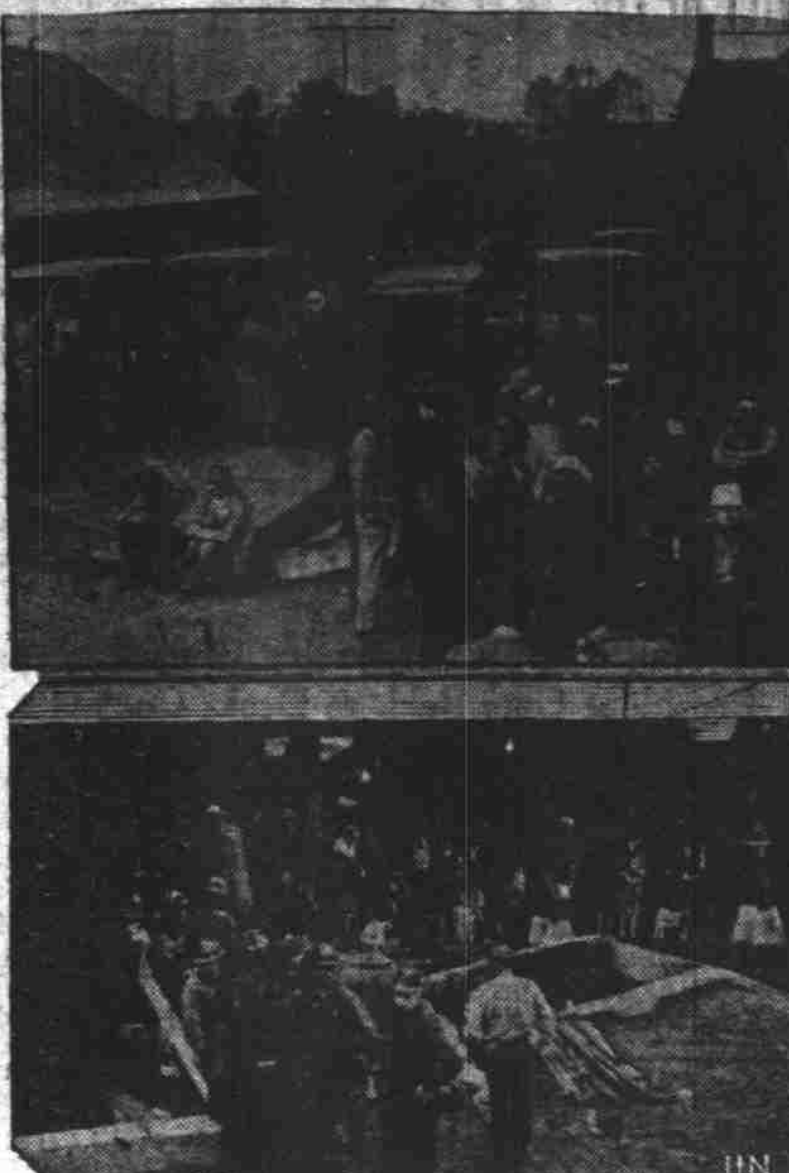
At noon an informal dinner was served in the monastery refectory to all the visiting clergy. Rev. Louis Sanjers of Portland acted as toastmaster. Rt. Rev. Magr. Hillebrand spoke for the clergy of the diocese. Rev. Joseph Heesacker, president of the M. A. C. alumni association represented the former students. Rev. Michael Earle, vice president of Columbia university, Portland, voiced the sentiments of the Catholic educational institutions. Most Rev. Edward J. Kelley, D. D., Boise Idaho, spoke for the provinces and Rt. Rev. Bernard Murphy represented the Fathers of St. Benedict. Archbishop Howard and Abbot Thomas Meier also spoke.

Coadjutor Abbot Thomas was elected Wednesday, August 1, when the monks of St. Benedict met in chapter. The Rt. Rev. Philip Ruggie of Conception, Mo., presided at the election. The Rt. Rev. Bernard Murphy had been abbot since 1921 but for the last few years has been greatly troubled with failing eyesight until he finally became totally blind some months ago. He then petitioned Rome for a coadjutor which request was granted by the Holy Father. Abbot Bernard will continue to reside at the abbey.

Boyhood Days of Abbot Spent Near Salem
The Coadjutor Abbot Thomas Meier came to Oregon at the age of one year and spent his boyhood days near Salem. After completing his classical studies at Mt. Angel, he joined the Benedictine monastery in 1905. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1910 and then took up post-graduate work at the University of Washington. Since then he has been an active member of the Mt. Angel college faculty. He was rector of the college from 1917 to 1920, was sub-prior for eight years and for the past 17 years he held the important position of novice-master.

Archbishop Howard has announced six clerical changes in the Catholic churches in the diocese of Portland. Rev. Theodore J. Bernards of St. Patrick's church, Portland, will replace Rev. J. R. Buck, pastor of St. Joseph's church in Salem, who has retired. Rev. Louis J. Sander, of Anthony's parish has been appointed to St. Patrick's. Rev. John D. Nelson, pastor of St. Mary's, Corvallis, was appointed pastor of St. Anthony's. Rev. John J. Mitchell, pastor of St. Edwards church, Lebanon, will be pastor of St. Mary's in Corvallis and Rev. Theophile Elsiele, has been appointed temporary pastor of St. Edward's church in Lebanon.

Lively News From All Parts of State

PLAN DALLIES TERMINAL
THE DALLIES, Ore., Aug. 10.—(P)—Terminal facilities at the time the Bonneville dam is finished, chamber of commerce directors and port commission members have declared. One set of plans has already been received for the construction of docks and warehouses, and application for a PWA loan to finance the construction has been made. If it is refused, a bond issue is contemplated.

BIG JOB LOOMS
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 10.—(P)—Bids for partial relocation of the Union Pacific railroad between milepost 35.58 and Cascade Locks, 943, the first of two units in the relocation of tracks made necessary by the Bonneville dam, will be advertised August 14, Major Charles E. Williams, United States district engineer, announced today. The work will cost the government approximately \$1,000,000 and will give employment to about 300 men over a period of eight or nine months.

DRIVE COOS BAY PILING
MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 10.—(P)—The first piling for the \$2,250,000 bridge to span Coos bay were driven today near the south approach. The Northwest Roads company, contractors, said about 200 men will be employed by the last of this month.

29 CCC BOYS DEPORTED
CASCADE LOCKS, Ore., Aug. 10.—(P)—After striking for higher wages, shorter hours and better food at the Wyeth CCC camp near here, and attacking the camp commander, Captain Boender, 29 Chicago youths were dishonorably discharged and put on a train for Chicago here today. The boys were placed under guard. Two hundred other CCC men at the camp refused to join the mutiny.

As a result, the department of agriculture crop report said that despite a large increase in plantings this year over 1933, the prospective crop is only about two per cent greater. This year's production is now estimated at a total of 327,251,000 bushels, as compared to the relatively short crop of 320,251,000 bushels last year, 10 per cent below the average production. The production prospect is fully deduction of from 1937 to 1931.

APPLE CROP LESS THAN ANY TIME SINCE '21
WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(P)—The smallest apple crop since 1921—42.5 per cent of normal—was forecast today for this season by the agricultural department. The department said, however, that quality throughout the apple growing regions is good. Production for the season, as of Aug. 1 was estimated at 110,091,000 bushels, 2 per cent below the July 1 forecast. It also is 24 per cent below last year's production and 29 per cent below the five year (1927-31) average production.

Movie Director Shoots Himself

SANTA MONICA, Calif., Aug. 10.—(P)—Ending a notable movie career in which he directed pictures of numerous outstanding players, George William Hill, 39, killed himself today with his automatic army pistol at his Venice beach home near here. Police said they found no note of explanation. The director's physician, Dr. H. H. Blodgett, said, however, that Hill had suffered headaches and mental lapses since he wrecked his automobile against a telephone pole two months ago.

Aid Pledged to Education Plans

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 10.—(P)—Oregon parent-teacher organizations, labor groups, university women, Y. M. C. A., federation of women's clubs and numerous other organizations will cooperate with the federal government in its emergency relief education program this fall, representatives pledged today in a meeting with education supervisors from Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho during the eight-day institute being held at the University of Oregon.

CHILD DROWNS IN WELL
SPOKANE, Aug. 10.—(P)—Bryce Hollenbeck, 8, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Hollenbeck of Hayford, farming community eight miles east of Spokane, drowned today when he stepped into an old well in the center of a shallow pond where he and another child were wading.

SUNDAY SALE OUT
SEATTLE, Aug. 10.—(P)—Sale of beer and wine on Sunday was banned in Seattle under an order issued by Chief of Police George L. Comstock. The order, effective with the coming Sunday, applies to both beer parlors and restaurants.

WILL GRIND OUT NEW SILVER MONEY

shown on the daily treasury statement as such.
Second thought yesterday tempered the reaction to silver's nationalization which sent domestic markets soaring and observers to speculating about a world monetary conference Thursday.

Both inflation and a world parity on gold and silver values still were seen, however, as possibilities growing out of the treasury's call for domestic stocks of the white metal.

Dollar Lower in Paris and London
The psychological effect of the action lingered abroad apparently for the dollar sank lower in both London and Paris.

China's finance minister, H. H. Kung, announced an embargo on shipments of silver from his country would be levied the moment the American nationalization or purchase program threatened Chinese stocks of the metal.

The first market quotation for silver in New York since nationalization was 49 1/2 cents an ounce. This was an increase of one-half cent from the quotation before the call for the metal and compared to the \$0.01 cents the treasury will pay for the silver it acquires.

Aluminum Plant Workers Strike

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(P)—A strike in all plants of the Aluminum Company of America at midnight was called today by the aluminum workers' council after weeks of fruitless efforts to reach an agreement. Officials in the American Federation of Labor, asserting the walkout was decided upon as a last resort, said it was authorized by the federation because "the company has failed to make any concession to the workers' demands."

Forest Fires in This Area Halted

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 10.—(P)—Northwest forest officials had nothing to worry about today except the next outbreak of fires. Virtually all inland northwest fires were reported under control, but extremely hazardous dry conditions made the situation still hazardous. The big burn in Shwain national forest of central Idaho was ringed in by a small army of firefighters.

OFF TO MARRY JOHNNIE LIVERPOOL

LIVERPOOL, England, Aug. 10.—(P)—Maureen O'Sullivan, motion picture star, left tonight for Ireland after stating she expects to be married within a month to John Farrow, writer for the films. Farrow, who had been in Liverpool, went to Canterbury where he will assist in shooting scenes to be used in the motion picture "David Copperfield."
