

PRUNE HARVEST ON FULL BLAST

Canners Buy at Prices Set by Board; Quotation at Wholesale Raised

small fruit, the quality of the prunes was generally agreed to be good.

Reports reached the code committee here yesterday that one canner in the state was still selling fruit at 95 cents a case. Officials of the code committee planned today to see the canner to urge him to stiffen his price to enable him to meet the code price to the producers. The code executive committee expressed its appreciation for the cooperation shown by the canners and said its desire was to see all branches of the prune industry receive a better deal.

The newly established code prices for prunes follow:

Green prunes, 12 or larger to pound, \$20 a ton.
Prunes 12-15 pound, inclusive, \$17.50 a ton.
Prunes 12-15 pound, inclusive, \$15 a ton.
Prunes over 17 to the pound, \$12 a ton.

DEBT ADJUSTMENT COMMITTEES HELP

In the opinion of L. R. Breithaupt, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college and secretary of the Oregon agricultural advisory council, few farmers will resort to the Federal bankruptcy laws designed to enable a farmer to go into bankruptcy in order to retain debt-ridden property.

Rather, the farmers will still find the farm debt adjustment committees to be the best bet in adjustment and refinancing their indebtedness, Breithaupt avers. The work of the committees is expected to increase rather than decrease as a result of this amendment.

According to statement in the National Grange Monthly these debt adjustment committees during the past year have provided solutions for more debtors than conflicts than any other means of settlement.

In spite of the attractive features of the bankruptcy provision, there are serious dangers for any farmer who tries it, the article continues. A six-year purchase plan and a rental plan offer two means of settlement, but farmers who take the bankruptcy road might find themselves operating under jurisdiction of a court. This would involve heavy payments of interest and principal of annual rental and taxes.

Ulrich told state police that the accident occurred while he was passing a stage.

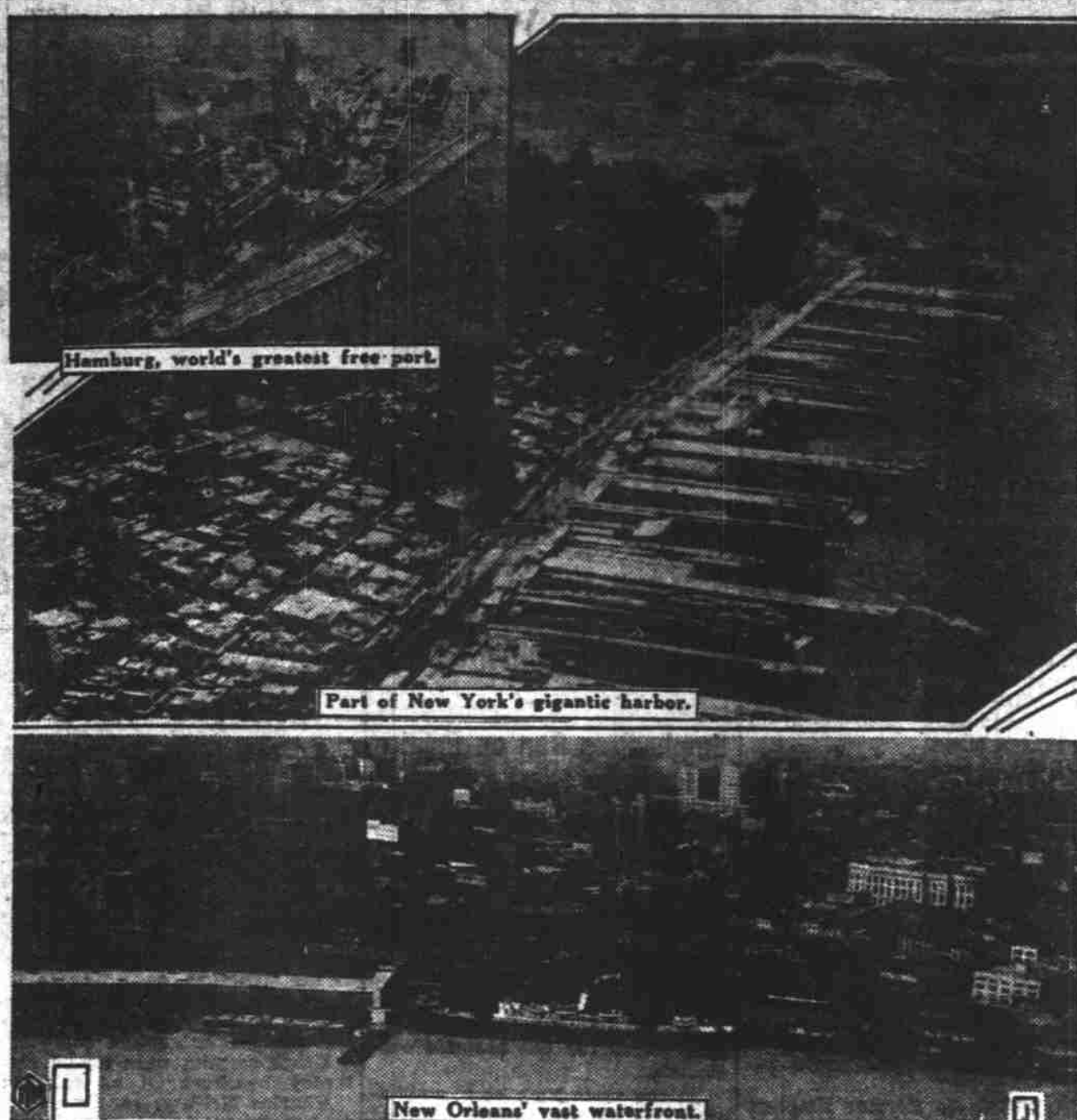

Hail New Free Entry Ports in U. S. A.



Long advocated as a means of building up the revenue at America's entry harbors, "free ports" finally have been given sanction by congress. These "foreign trade" zones, where foreign merchandise destined for other foreign countries is unloaded and reshipped, heretofore have been frowned upon by high tariff wall enthusiasts in the U. S. and penalized by excessive red tape and custom bond deposits. Advocates of the "free ports" declare

that since the U. S. is the strategic transfer point for goods going from Canada to Latin America, and Europe to the Far East, restricted areas should be set aside to reap profit from unloading, repacking and reshipping while in domestic waters. In Europe numerous destination points have made distributing centers economically necessary. Free ports in Hamburg, Copenhagen and Danzig handle enormous tonnage, employing thousands.

Highway Heads Of Washington, Oregon to Meet

A joint session between the Oregon state highway commission and Lacey Morrow, director of highways for the state of Washington, will be held in Portland Friday, August 17, it was announced Monday by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer.

Two matters of vital interest to both states will be considered. One is the request for the two states to join in the operation of the Columbia river ferry at Astoria and the other the establishment of a port of entry between Vancouver, Wash., and Portland. The Astoria ferry is now being operated by a private concern.

The port of entry proposal, advanced by Morrow, would provide that all trucks and busses operating in both states check in at the established station. Officials said they could then determine if the motor vehicles were conforming to all of the laws of both states.

89 Road Projects Up for Bids Next 4 Months, Stated

Contracts for the 89 highway projects, to be constructed under the recent \$2,100,000 federal highway relief allocation to Oregon, will be awarded at four successive monthly meetings of the state highway commission, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced Monday. These meetings will be held in September, October, November and December. Approximately 25 per cent of the work, to be contracted at the September meeting, will get under way this fall.

HAIRY VETCH CROP FOUND PROFITABLE

The story of the phenomenal growth of the hairy vetch industry is told by Joe Sechrist, former grain main, in the Sheridan Sun. Starting seven years ago with one sack the production in territory tributary to Sheridan has grown to 15,000 bags for 1934.

Much of the credit for bringing this profitable industry to Sheridan belongs to one of the local seed concerns, states Mr. Sechrist. Realizing that the seed industry was bound for expansion the company made connections with Salem and Chicago firms thus providing market, means of financing the crop, and installation of machinery necessary for cleaning and preparing the seed for market.

The grain man reports that several years of experience have proved hairy vetch to be one of the best known crops for prevention of soil erosion and as a cover for orchards, vineyards, cotton and tobacco land.

Postoffice Boxes On Grounds Time Savers, Explains

Postboxes at the northeast and southeast corners of the postoffice grounds do not yet completely serve the purpose for which they were established, according to Postmaster Henry R. Crawford. The Salem board still awaits word from the county non-high school board regarding the contract for payment of outside pupils' tuition and final action on the 1934-35 budget is thereby held up. The non-high school board failed to award the contract to this district when the Salem directors held out for inclusion of an item for depreciation in computing its tuition charge.

Other business tonight will include a report of the supplies committee on purchase of materials for the coming year.
