

Stayton Co-op Employs 250 People

BEANS, PRUNES BEING CANNED

Six Shifts are Busy Handling
5000 Cases Produce
Every Day

STAYTON, Aug. 15.—The Stayton Co-operative cannery is an especially busy place these days around 250 being employed. Right now they are working on beans and prunes.

For the first time in the 11 years the cannery has been in operation, these two products are in season at the same time. There are six shifts working, due to the fact that this year in addition to handling their regular pack of Kentucky wonder beans for the well known "Santiam" pack they are for the first time canning the Blue Lake bean, a smaller bean than the Kentucky Wonder.

The average pack is between 4000 and 5000 cases per day. It was necessary to secure additional warehouse space to handle the pack, the largest in the history of the cannery, so the large porch on the north side was enclosed making an additional space of 20x67.

The greater part of the beans are from the West Stayton section. It was necessary for the cannery to operate Sunday to handle the crop.

Budget Estimated for Scio Schools
