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the two states as a result of the conference today. C. B. McCullough, Oregon state bridge engineer, was directed to meet with the Washington bridge engineer to make a cost survey on operation of ferries at Astoria and Maryhill. The Oregon commission also discussed a communication from Herbert H. Hauser, transportation superintendent, stating that he could not effectively administer the motor transportation act without additional money for checking violations in the field and truck owners records. Highway Engineer E. H. Baldock has estimated the state will lose some \$50,000 in revenue if funds are not provided as asked. Hauser estimated collection costs at 15 per cent.

Leslie M. Scott was reelected chairman of the commission over his protest.

A final "no" was the commission's answer today to a request by Portland and Multnomah county for \$700,000 additional allocation from the federal highway funds. The Portland area has already been allotted \$563,000.

"Contention will delay plans and contracts and cause loss of fair weather employment," the commission added. "The needs of employment and of highway development are pressing in all parts of Oregon. Should the state highway commission neglect the statewide call for a fair distribution, bitterness and strife would be engendered, Portland would be accused of selfish designs and the highway commission would be charged with apathetic neglect of duty, or worse."

Commissioners explained that money to fill the Portland request would have to be taken from funds allocated to Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Washington, Yamhill, Lincoln, Polk, Marion, Benton, Linn and Clackamas counties.

NO MURDER CHARGE IN DROWNING CASES

EUGENE, Aug. 17.—(P)—Sheriff C. A. Swartz today denied rumors that he had demanded the signing of a murder charge against Robert Lund, 13, in connection with the drowning of Stewart Gorski, of Glenada, and Dean Coulter, Florence, in Washouk lake in western Lane county Tuesday.

"I do believe, however, that regardless of whether or not the boy might have pushed the others, he should be put away where he will not have a chance to harm others," Sheriff Swartz said.

District Attorney Brooke today filed a complaint alleging the boy was feeble minded. The hearing will be held Monday. Meanwhile, Lund is in jail here. He is said to have confessed pushing young Gorski into the water, and then to have denied doing so. The drowning is believed to have happened about 2 p. m. Tuesday. The Lund boy returned home about 4:30 p. m. but is said to have made no mention of the drowning until 9 p. m. Dissection of the two bodies revealed that Gorski's eyes had been blackened and his face scratched. The Coulter boy's body was unmarked.

Lund was committed to the W. C. T. U. home near Corvallis last summer, but was released in November.

ROOSEVELT TO TELL POLICIES FOR VETS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(P)—President Roosevelt plans to tell the nation's war veterans in a speech in October just what he proposes to do for them.

The occasion will be the dedication of a new \$2,000,000 veterans' hospital for mental cases at Roanoke, Va.

Reliable sources indicated no drastic change in policy would be announced, but that the president would sum up the present government program for the ex-service men and outline future plans to assure the veterans the administration is their friend.

It was denied in quarters close to the White House that the speech would be a political hot spot—but it will come only a few days before the November congressional elections.

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Mrs. Askew had received a telegram from Washington, signed "Cortez" and apparently from the purported kidnappers, saying: "Have the money ready Saturday."

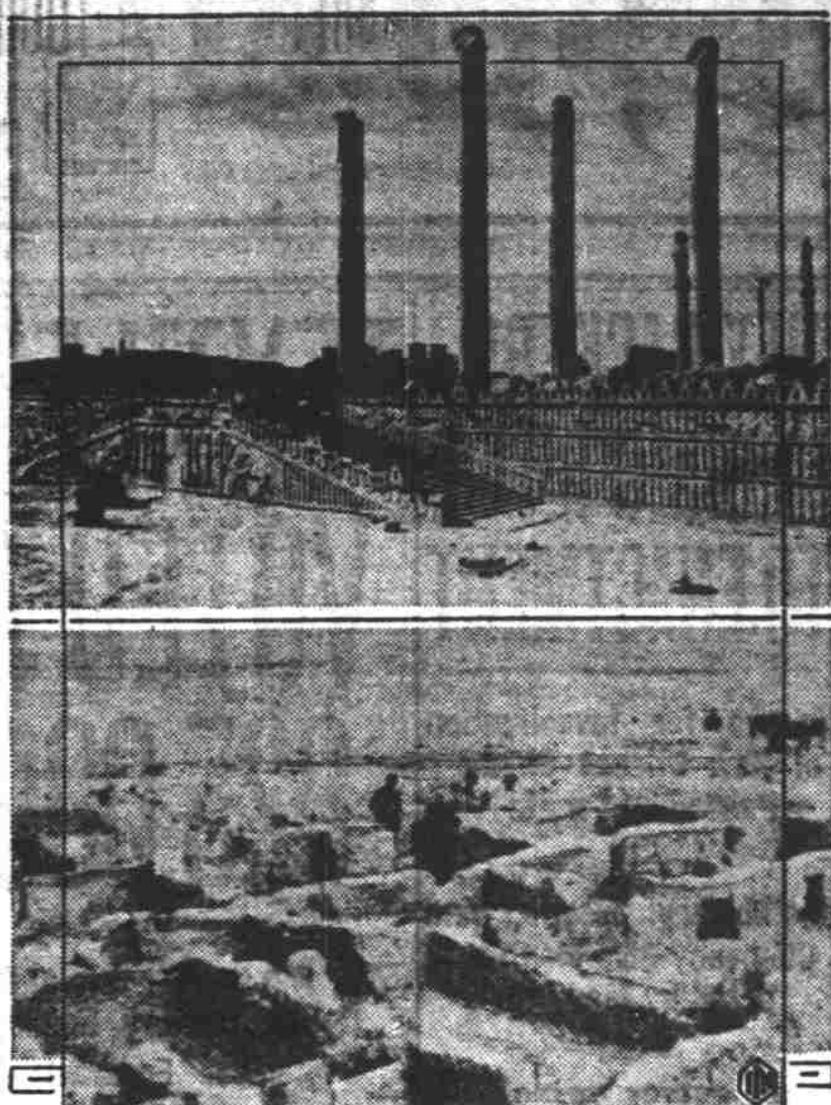
On Wednesday, the day after her evangelist husband disappeared, she received a note, postmarked here the day before, demanding \$25,000 "or you will never see your husband alive again."

HITLER PLEADS FOR APPROVAL OF RULE

HAMBURG, Germany, Aug. 17.—(P)—Adolf Hitler pleaded earnestly with all Germany tonight to approve his succession to the powers of Reich president von Hindenburg, an action he asserted was made necessary by foreign hostility toward Germany and economic distress at home.

The chancellor declared that he would have preferred to appeal to the people first and then carry out their decision, but that the leadership weeks which would have intervened would have proved costly to Germany.

Hitler referred to the possibility that some foreign circles which predicted trouble after the death of von Hindenburg cherished the thought that there would be confusion "here and abroad" and the already existing "international uncertainties" would be added to by new intrigues.

His address in this hard-hit seaport was the climax of a whirlwind campaign which will culminate Sunday in the plebiscite on one question—whether the German sanction Hitler's assumption of presidential powers.

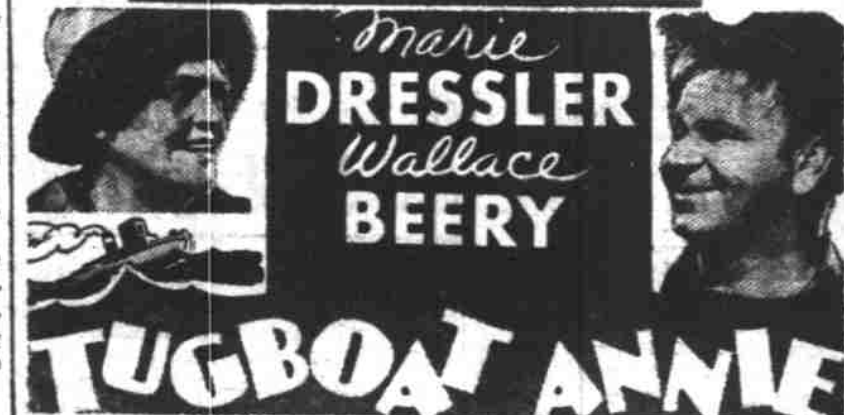
Kansas Resident Killed In Crash, Portland Bridge

PWA FUND ALMOST USED UP IS REPORT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(P)—Allotments of \$24,540,275 today drained all but \$4,551,141 from the public works fund, which once amounted to \$3,700,000,000.

Requests for money running into the billions remain on the waiting list and officials are looking hopefully toward the reconstruction corporation and President Roosevelt for more funds.

The new allocations went to 215 non-federal projects, most of them in the drought states, and a majority for schools, water and sewage systems. New York received the largest share for any one city, \$4,006,000 for hospitals, piers, water works and a laboratory.

As the PWA money supply dropped to the paltry—comparatively speaking—\$4,500,000, it was announced expenditures on projects were bringing direct employment to the anticipated peak of 700,000. Indirect employment is estimated at double that figure in industries furnishing and transporting materials.

The allotments today are expected by PWA to provide 103,483 man-months of direct employment on construction sites.

LUMBER SHIPMENT ABOVE PRODUCTION

SEATTLE, Aug. 17.—(P)—Shipments of lumber by 555 Oregon and Washington mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending Aug. 11 were 117,853,715 feet, 20.4 per cent over a production of 87,854,958 feet, the association said today.

Production was about 21,000,000 feet more than the previous week. Current sales of 93,524,470 feet were 4.5 per cent under production. Orders booked were about 2,000,000 feet under the preceding week of 2.41 per cent.

The unfilled order file stood at 486,920,186 feet, about 38,000,000 feet under the week before.

Drought Menace Is Followed By Peril Of Floods

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 17.—(P)—The threat of local floods today has replaced the menace of the drought, as thunder storms following in rapid succession in the last two days, caused small streams in north-central Missouri to rise abruptly.

Cloudy and unsettled weather was prevalent over most of Missouri, Kansas, southern Nebraska and parts of Iowa. The weather men here said he saw no indication yet of a general rain storm covering any wide section. The rains of Wednesday and Thursday were local in character.
