Longshoremen's Angle On Strike Issues Is Given

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The International Longshoremen's association today completed presentation of its case before the national longshoremen's board, which is arbitrating the grievance which brought about the Pacific coast marine strike.

The waterfront employers are expected to start their case Monday with indications they may require a week. The board then intends to move to Portland to hold hearings.

Edward F. McGrady, assistant secretary of labor and a member of the board, was established today as a "complaint bureau" to whom the men and employers can bring their charges of discrimination or violation of agreements pending completion of the arbitration.

Angelus Temple Receives Threat In Askew Kidnap

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Officials of Angelus Temple here turned over to Chief of Police James E. Davis today a letter demanding \$25,000 of Almore Semple McPherson, the evangelist, for the release of R. H. Askew, North Carolina pastor, who is a kidnap victim.

The letter threatened to blow up the temple if the money were not forthcoming. Police assumed the demand was made on the temple because it is headquarters of the "four square gospel" and because the Rev. Mr. Askew had been identified as a minister of that faith.

Rebate Claim Of County Is \$6399

Marion county's claim against the federal government for the Oregon and California land grant tax rebate is \$6399.20, based on the 1933 tax rolls, Oscar Steelhammer, county assessor, announced Friday. Last year's claim was \$6253.92, of which \$3998.82 was paid.

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VANCOUVER BANDIT SUSPECTS CAUGHT

Arsenal, Cans and Bottles Full of Valuables are Found at 'Hangout'

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 17.—(AP)—Fred Ruhl, 37, and Vernon Callaghan, 20, captured here last night in a spectacular double raid by police officers, were taken to Wenatchee late today to face questioning on charges ranging from bank robbery to jail break.

Ruhl will be questioned about the daylight robbery of the Quincy Valley state bank, 32 miles from Wenatchee, on July 12, officers said after uncovering some \$2500 in cash and several hundred dollars worth of bonds and stocks in his alleged hideout.

Both Ruhl and Callaghan are alleged to have assaulted the town marshal in Newport, Wash., and later to have escaped from the Newport jail.

Ruhl was captured Thursday night in a trap that much resembled the one set for the late John Dillinger by federal officers in Chicago. As he emerged from a Vancouver theater where he had been watching a gangster picture, seven officers, representing local police, the sheriff's office and the state police, closed in on Ruhl with sawed-off shotguns, rifles and pistols. He made no effort to resist arrest.

Less than an hour later, the same officers broke in the door of a small house said to be Ruhl's hideout, and there covered Callaghan before he could reach any of the several guns in the place. Callaghan's mother, Mrs. D. V. Gibson, was also arrested at the house, where officers found dozens of cans and bottles filled with money, stocks and bonds, in addition to a young arsenal.

Frank Atlemand, sought as the third member of the alleged inland Empire "gang", was not located. Callaghan told police he left Vancouver, presumably for Spokane, two weeks ago.

UNCLE KIDNAPS BOY IN ANTONIO AFFAIR

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., Aug. 17.—(AP)—The three-year-old son of Mrs. Anna Antonio, who was executed last week for the murder of her husband, was allegedly abducted today by her brother, Pasquale Capello. A warrant charging kidnapping was issued for him and police started a statewide search.

Friends said Capello was grief stricken because he was about to lose custody of the boy, for whom he has cared since the child was ten months old. He was called from his work today when a representative of Mrs. Mary De Sisto, sister of Salvatore Antonio, for whose murder the state took the lives of Mrs. Antonio and her accomplices, Vincent Saet and Sam Farracel, appeared with a court order giving her custody of Frank.

Mrs. De Sisto waited in a parked car near the home while an Albany attorney, George Rothaupt, and a deputy sheriff went to the home. Mrs. Capello was alone at the time, police say. She sent a message to Capello who arrived shortly afterward. Capello at first was almost hysterical, police asserted. Then he calmed down and asked permission to give Frank a bath before giving him to Mrs. De Sisto. The attorney and deputy sheriff agreed and Capello left them.

More than 20 minutes later when Capello had not arrived, the deputy sheriff searched the house and found he had disappeared.

Albany Socialist Files Candidacy For Mott's Job

W. S. Richards, socialist, of Albany, filed in the state department here Friday as a candidate for representative in congress from the first congressional district. His nomination was sponsored by the executive committee of the socialist party after G. W. Thompson of Eugene had declined to make the race.

Other aspirants for this office are James W. Mott, republican incumbent, and R. R. Turner, democrat.

The time for filing by committee or assembly expires September 12, while petitions may be filed as late as September 21.

POLICE SAY YOUTH ADMITS ROBBERIES

Following arrest of Lloyd Godkin, 14, 537 North 20th street, Thursday night police believe they are on the way to complete solution of the petty pilfering from houses and parked cars that has bothered them for the last two weeks. Godkin was turned over to juvenile authorities.

Godkin admitted entering the homes of R. W. Craig, 1320 Court; A. C. Zamson, 348 North 20th, and at A and 14th, where he reached through a window with a wire and pulled out a purse. He took the purses at the Craig house while a party was being held there by the Beta Chi sorority. The empty purses were later found in a vacant lot.

He also attempted entering houses on Marion street, east of 13th, and on North Summer, north of Union, police say he admitted. In the first instance he was frightened away by a barking dog which attracted the attention of neighbors.

A number of cases of purses being stolen have been reported to the police. Usually only cash was taken. Police also suspect that the youth, possibly with the assistance of others, has been going through parked automobiles during the softball games on Sweetland field.

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BIG TURKEY HERDS ARE SEEN ON TOUR

12,500 Birds are Viewed by Group in County; Some Almost Full Grown

A cheery Thanksgiving and a like Christmas are the forecasts of the 30 persons who took the Marion county turkey tour Thursday, according to County Agent Harry L. Riches. Visiting three farms where flocks totaling 12,500 birds were seen and discussed, eating together at noon with informative program of talks and conversation were the highlights of the trip, which was declared a complete success.

Already some of the turkeys viewed on the tour have reached marketable weight, a number being tipped the scales at 14 pounds each.

The group met at the C. H. Coyle place near St. Paul where 3000 turkeys and a well-equipped brooder house were exhibited. In Salem they had luncheon together. Among the speeches one by A. Willardson, manager of the Los Angeles sales agency for the Northwest Turkey Growers' association, was outstanding, as was also that by H. E. Cosby, poultry specialist with the Oregon State college extension service.

Other visitors from outside the county included: F. W. Wagner of Clackamas county, Henry Domes of McCoy, J. A. Falk of Rickreall, Charles Lamb and W. G. Micksche. Both Micksche and Lamb represented the Crown Feed miller. Lamb also has a small flock of turkeys.

In the afternoon the growers visited the farm of Frank Wied near Jefferson where 3000 turkeys are on the range. At the R. W. Meyers farm between Jefferson and Marion the largest flock of the day was viewed, 6,500. All the turkeys seen Thursday were bronze.

Legion Chief to Visit in Oregon

DENVER, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Edward A. Hayes, national commander of the American Legion, will visit Portland the morning of Aug. 24, en route to the Oregon state legion convention at Astoria. He will return to Portland for a brief stay August 25.

LOAN ASSOCIATION MERGER OPPOSED

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17.—(AP)—A motion opposing the proposed merger of the Federal Union, Prudential and Western Savings and Loan associations, all now in receivership, was filed in circuit court here today by Wallace C. Peterson, administrator of the estate of A. G. Peterson, who was a shareholder in the federal union organization.

Peterson asked that an amended court order of July 30, approving the state corporation department's plan for the merger in order to form a new consolidated Building and Loan association, be set aside, and that suitable action looking to the liquidation of the Federal Union organization be taken.

Peterson contends that Federal Union shareholders will be harmed by the consolidation plan, in that assets of the Federal Union will be thrown into a fund to pay obligations of the Western company. His motion also alleged that consolidation plan was filed without notice to the Federal Union shareholders.

The original consolidation plan included at least six defunct companies, but liquidation or sale of assets has eliminated three of them.
