

Famous Novel Reaches Screen; Movie Revivals Heralded This Week

'TREASURE ISLAND' AT ELSINORE TODAY

Historically Correct, Film of Stevenson's Great Story Has Charm

Vast technical research, involving years of study and delving into pirate lore, went into the production of "Treasure Island" to insure historical accuracy and authentic atmosphere.

The great Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer production, based on Robert Louis Stevenson's immortal classic of piratical adventures and treasure-seekers, will open Sunday at the Elsinore theatre.

A staff of "pirate specialists", headed by Dwight Franklin formerly of the museum of the City of New York, served as technical experts during both the preparation and filming of "Treasure Island". The costuming, makeup, and arming of the pirates—every detail of their appearance—was supervised by Franklin during the filming of the picture.

A complete arsenal for the pirate crews was assembled by Franklin from famous old collections, and used in the picture, including cutlasses, dirks, old pistols, and small cannon.

"Treasure Island" presents one of the most formidable casts ever assembled for a picture. Wallace Beery and Jackie Cooper are co-stars, Beery as "Long John Silver", and Jackie as "Jim Hawkins", the boy-adventurer. Lionel Barrymore plays "Bill Bones", Lewis Stone is "Captain Smollett", and Otto Kruger is "Dr. Livesey".

Memphis Sleuth Is Also Expert Petunia Grower

TILLAMOOK BLAZE OF 1933 BURNS ON

Hang-over fires of long duration have on rare instances been reported to the state forester.

The most recent is one that has persisted in the Tillamook burn since the disastrous fire in August, 1933. Recently Saddle mountain lookout reported a fire in the old burn and two men were sent to put it out. They discovered a hemlock snag three feet in diameter and 15 feet high with smoke emerging from the top.

The snag was felled and when it struck the ground a glowing mass of red-hot material resembling slag rolled out. The men extinguished the fire and after it had cooled, loaded a quantity of it into a pack sack and carried it to patrol headquarters. It later was sent to the state forestry department here.

Specimens of the material subsequently were analyzed and were found to contain a high percentage of aluminum.

German Consul Sets Date He'll Be in Portland

Word has been received by the Salem chamber of commerce that Consul Lester L. Schuare from Hamburg, Germany, will be in Portland August 27 and 28. His headquarters will be at the U. S. department of commerce, room 215 in the postoffice building.

This announcement has aroused a good deal of interest among Oregon fruit growers and lumbermen owing to Germany's recent announcement of partial embargo on American exports. The consul will be available for discussion of market prospects in the Nazi nation.

Second Cut Clover Now Harvested for Seed; Some for Hay

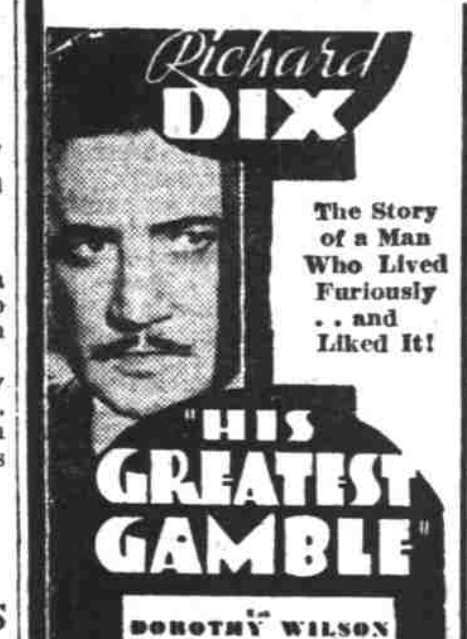
