

ASK COMMISSIONER FOR STATE POLICE

Law and Order Issues Eyed
by Legion Committee;
Report is Filed

Provision by the legislature for a state police commission by the governor, with the approval of the state senate, to supervise all activities of the state police and to eliminate the possibility of political considerations interfering with efficient performance of duty and reward for services given, was among the outstanding recommendations submitted to Harold J. Warner, department commander of the American Legion, by a statewide committee on law and order, in a report issued here Saturday.

The committee was headed by Major General White of Salem and is composed of prominent legionnaires representing virtually all sections of the state. The report will be presented for ratification at the state convention of the American Legion which convenes at Astoria next Thursday.

Other important recommendations follow:

More vigorous enforcement of state laws and, if necessary, the provision of more stringent legislation dealing with those who teach sedition and treason, openly advocating the overthrow by violence of constituted authority.

Elimination of politics in the selection and promotion of city peace officers, through establishment of municipal police commissions with civil service regulations divorced from those affecting clerks, janitors and other public servants.

Clarification of that section of the state law which has been interpreted as restricting the state police from enforcement of law in certain contingencies, notably in connection with illegal acts of violence which may accompany a labor dispute but have no relation to the employer-employee issues involved.

Stiffening qualifications for police work and encouraging courses in scientific crime detection.

Establishment of nation-wide system of universal registration and finger-printing, requiring every resident of the United States to submit to such identification.

Months of study and survey of crime conditions in Oregon were represented by the report which contains specific recommendations for legislation to be sponsored by the American Legion at the next session of the Oregon legislature.

Commenting on activities of radicals in connection with the recent longshoremen's strike, the report read:

"It is our belief that an amicable settlement of that disaster, which entailed suffering and inconvenience, would have been encompassed within a reasonable period except for the efforts of radical groups, not sympathetically or legitimately identified with either side of this dispute. The so-called public and subversive groups attempted to exploit the waterfront controversy in an effort to precipitate revolution on the Pacific coast and openly preached and secretly promoted mass violence in defiance of law and order."

The magnitude and importance of the work of the committee is such that a further recommendation was made that the start which was launched this year be carried on by a permanent law and order committee of the American Legion.

ROAD CONDITIONS CHANGE SLIGHTLY

Little change in the condition of roads commonly used by Salem residents on Sunday trips took place last week, Mrs. Claudia Benson, manager of the Salem office of the Oregon State Motor association, reported yesterday. With a few minor exceptions, all roads in this vicinity are in good shape.

Chief exceptions are the Dallas cut-off to the coast, which is gravelled but not oiled and has a detour about a half mile long, and approximately two and one-half miles of construction in the four-mile stretch between Dolphin and Castle Rock on the Williamina-Hebo highway.

Travel is slow over the Brunks corners-Independence secondary highway, which is freshly gravelled. Due to construction operations on the new bridge at Mill City, motorists cannot cross the Santiam river there but instead may take either the east or west side route at Mehama.

The road to Willhoit springs is in good condition although there is a detour between Silverton and Marquam occasioned by construction of the Abiqua bridge.

KLAN, WHITE SHIRTS AND HUEY AT OUTS

ATLANTA, Aug. 17.—(AP)—An attack by the Ku Klux Klan here today on Huey Long was made public almost simultaneously with an attack on the Klan by George W. Christians, commander-in-chief of the "Crusaders White Shirts."

The garb of the Klan is a white robe, but the two organizations are in apparent conflict. At Baton Rouge Senator Long spluttered and used incoherent invectives when asked to comment on the Klan attack.

Virtually dormant since its debacle from the political heights of ten years ago, the Klan, through its imperial wizard, Hiram W. Evans, announced it had sounded a "bugle call" to remove Senator Long from power and to retire him. The announcement said the work would be left to the Louisiana Klan.

Christians said that "I am inclined to think" the new Klan has "merely stolen part of our program for sucker bait."

Detroit-Albany Loop Attractive

A suggested day's round trip drive from Salem that offers exceptional scenic values, although part of the way is rough, is the loop from Salem through Detroit, Cascadia, Albany and return, according to Mrs. Claudia Benson, manager of the local office of the Oregon State Motor association. The distance over all is approximately 200 miles. In order to avoid having to drive up the seven-mile hill above Cascadia, it is suggested that the trip be started via Detroit.

RIFLE CHAMPION IS G-3 TIRE INSPECTOR

Israelson's Keen Eye Looks
Over Goodyears as Well
as Peep Sights

One of the important phases of producing the new Goodyear "G-3" tire is the final factory inspection, according to Frank Doolittle, local Goodyear dealer.

"Men with keen eyes look for the tiniest flaw," says Mr. Doolittle "and no tire is permitted to leave the factory unless it is perfect in every detail."

"An interesting example of the type of man who inspects the new 'G-3' tires, is Merle Israelson, of Akron, Ohio. In a recent rifle match of national interest, conducted in Akron, Israelson's keen eyes and steady nerves won for him the title of small bore champion; the Litchfield trophy, the Goodyear trophy, three medals and a place on two international teams."

"Naturally," says Mr. Doolittle, "all 'G-3' inspectors are not expert riflemen, but every one of them is selected for the excellency of his vision and mental alertness. They must not permit any accidental flaw in the product to escape them."

"Many of the small imperfections for which tires are rejected by the inspectors would never be detected by an untrained observer. But the rigid policy of inspection of the Goodyear factories makes it unnecessary for the consumer to sort over a large group of tires in order to find a perfect product."

"On the contrary, the imperfect tire is never permitted to reach the dealer's establishment, if the defect is detectable by human ingenuity," Mr. Doolittle says.

DROWNING APPEARS AS TOTAL MYSTERY

DAYTON, O., Aug. 19.—A baffling mystery confronted county officers tonight in their investigation of the drowning of pretty Mrs. William H. Nell, 28-year-old wife of an insurance company executive, whose body was found shortly after last midnight in the swimming pool of the Northmoore country club here.

An autopsy disclosed Mrs. Nell had drowned, but beyond that fact her death was an enigma. She was not a member of the fashionable club, and the investigators were unable to learn whether she had entered the swimming pool secretly alone or had been accompanied there.

Her clothing was found piled neatly at the end of the pool but a diamond ring, valued at nearly \$2,000, which she customarily wore, was missing. Near the clothing an empty glass, which had contained beer, was found.

Mrs. Nell's husband told the officers they had been living apart for several days, and he did not know with whom she might have been at the time of her death.

HARVEST OF EARLY HOPS WILL START
