

ENFORCEMENT AIDS STATE LIQUOR SALE

40 Arrests, Revocation of
Licenses Bring About
More Compliance

The policy of clamping down on the bootlegger and the beer dispenser who has refused to operate his establishment in compliance with the provisions of the Knox liquor control law, is being reflected in increasing receipts of the state liquor commission, officials declared Tuesday.

Records of the liquor commission for July show that approximately 40 arrests were made by three investigators for the department operating under the direction of Eugene Kelly. In many of these cases the offenders were fined while in other instances their licenses were suspended or revoked.

"Our investigators do not intend to deal leniently with violators of the state liquor laws," an official said, "and persons arrested will be prosecuted without fear or favor." Revocation of licenses was said to have had a beneficial effect in the law enforcement program.

During July net revenues of the liquor commission aggregated \$81,090.27. This included store sales of \$51,654.30, including permits; revenues \$28,181.26 and license fees of \$12,144.71. License fees showed a marked falling off during the month while the other receipts showed an increase.

In cases where law violators have more than five gallons of liquor in their possession they are turned over to the federal officials.

fications has there been change over the February announcement. There are now one less listed as "distributor of grade 'A' milk pasteurized in other plants" and three less as "grade 'A' milk bottled by distributor but produced by another."

"There has been considerable improvement in the physical equipment of the various dairies," Blunkhorn stated. "One producer-distributor is building a complete new milk house and obtaining new equipment. Four producer-distributors have built new barns and milk houses, several others have built new milk houses or altered old ones and some have improved their water supplies."

Purity and safety to the consumer are assured only through purchase of grade "A" raw or pasteurized milk, the inspector advised. The consumer living outside the city limits, in particular, should be certain that the "A" label is carried on the caps of the bottled milk he buys, he added.

The Salem milk ordinance is similar to those in effect at Portland, Eugene and Medford and in line with the United States public health service program.

Larceny Case Is Continued When Five Arraigned

DALLAS, Aug. 21. — Sentence of the five defendants in a petty larceny case from Pedee was continued until October 1 here this morning by Justice of the Peace Gregory. The five men, Frank and Louis Quigley, Earl Rich, Clayton Warner and George Letley were arrested Saturday at Creswell and state police and returned here for trial.

Following the release of these five men the county jail here was empty but it is expected that this would only be temporary due to the boy picking being started. Hop yard cases usually serve to keep the sheriff's office and other officers busy during the picking season.

Not until next June will the curly haired school teacher exponent of the "New Deal" attain his senate majority. Political observers however, recall that Henry Clay, "the millboy of the ashes" orator from Kentucky more than 100 years ago was seated in the upper chamber though he lacked several months of being 30. Young "Bob" La Follette, senior senator from Wisconsin, now seeking re-election, was a shade over the eligible age when he was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of his father "Old Bob."

income under \$10,000. This combined net income totalled \$3,732,101, with a total tax assessed of \$28,900.32. This tax included intangible tax assessed of \$20,793.40 and personal income tax of \$5,106.92.

There were 729 returns showing combined net income ranging from \$2000 to \$3000. This combined net income aggregated \$17,585,119, with \$171,997.54 tax assessed. The intangibles tax assessed was \$78,271.70 and personal income tax assessed \$98,725.64.

Collections Will Drop, Result of Staff Reduction

The recent reduction of 21 persons in the staff of the state transportation division of the state utility commission, will decrease the collections of that department between \$5000 and \$10,000 a month, Herbert Hauser, superior of state transportation, estimated Tuesday.

Hauser said it had been necessary to curtail the office operations and that six auditors previously employed in the field had been eliminated. Reduction of the operating personnel was necessary because of the refusal of the state emergency board to authorize a deficiency appropriation of \$30,000 for the remainder of the biennium.

900 Pickers at Lachmund Yard

F. B. Gwyn, superintendent of the Louis Lachmund hop yards north of Independence, announced yesterday that he was using a crew of 900 local pickers who are driving daily to work on early hops. Camping facilities will not be available for the first pickings, he reported, but will be set for the late harvest starting September 3. The long stretch this year between the two harvests makes camping for the early short run impractical, he stated.

English walnut meat on top of each square and set on waxed or buttered paper to cool. This is fine and easy to make.

Raisin and Potato Cake
1-3 cup butter
1/2 cup sugar, brown or white
2 egg yolks
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup hot mashed potato
1 square unsweetened chocolate
1/2 cup milk
1 cup sifted flour
2 level teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon each cinnamon and nutmeg
1/2 cup chopped walnuts or prunes
1 cup seedless raisins
Sift flour, baking powder and spices. Cream butter and add 1/2 cup sugar gradually, beating until creamy. Separate eggs, beat whites stiff and fold in. Add 1/2 cup sugar to yolks. Add potato and chocolate, then flour and liquid alternately, reserving a little flour to dredge raisins and nuts, which should be folded into the batter with the beaten egg whites. Bake in 3 layers and cover with chocolate fudge icing.

2 c. flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. nutmeg

1 c. milk
Cream shortening and sugar. Add beaten egg yolks and then mashed potatoes. Stir together thoroughly. Add flour which has been sifted three times with baking powder and spices, a little at a time with the first 1/2 cup of milk. Then add last 1/2 cup milk with the cocoa. Now add flour and nut meats and lastly beaten egg whites. Bake in large loaf pan in moderate oven about forty minutes. Frost with any desired icing. This makes an extra large cake and keeps very well.

sources amount to \$411,997. Of these net returns, \$187,919 came from store and agency profits, \$133,469 from the gallonage tax and \$90,607 from licenses.

Officials of the state liquor commission are hopeful store and agency profits will run above \$50,000 a month from now on with the gallonage tax producing another \$30,000 net. Net income of at least \$1,000,000 the first 12 months of operation seems probable.

The stores and agencies last month reported 133,435 transactions. Resident permits now sold total 41,568 and non residence permits 9,422.

The state last month did business at 6.3 per cent of the selling cost and had an average of 27.59 per cent on the selling price. Net profits ran 20.5 per cent of the selling cost.

Reifel Forfeits Bond; Officials Tie up Property

SEATTLE, Aug. 21.—(P)—While the \$100,000 bond of Henry Reifel, Sr., Vancouver, B. C., distillery magnate, was being forfeited today, federal officials announced that the government had tied up under court writs approximately \$1,250,000 worth of property belonging to Reifel and others being sued for alleged huge liquor smuggling operations.

Sam E. Whitaker, special assistant United States attorney general, said the largest item consisted of stock in the Hemrich Brewing company. In the government's civil action against the defendants, it seeks to collect \$17,245,000 in custom duties, penalties, and internal revenue taxes on liquor asserted to have been smuggled into this country, prior to prohibition repeal.

GASOLINE REBATES RACKET DISCUSSED

A sizeable "racket" has developed in connection with gasoline tax rebates according to statement of George Flagg, assistant to Secretary of State Stadelman, speaking before the Kiwanis club yesterday noon. Flagg cited instances of fraud in rebate claims and said that such cases were increasing to the extent that legislative action must be taken to strengthen collection machinery.

In outlining the many duties of the secretary's department, Flagg stated that over 400 claims are daily audited and paid, making necessary the most careful check for fraud. About 200 people are regularly employed in the offices with increased help during rush periods.

Flagg came to his present position from The Dallas where he had long known Stadelman. For several years he was editor of a newspaper in The Dallas.

Farlow Barn Is Total Loss Due To Night Blaze

JEFFERSON, Aug. 21.—Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the large barn on the Lee Farlow farm on the Jefferson-Marion road three miles northeast of here Sunday evening. The Farlows were getting ready to retire, when Mr. Farlow happened to look outside, and saw flames shooting from the roof of the barn; and by the time he reached the barn the fire had gotten beyond possible control.

The barn was full of hay, also some grain; a roadster and set of harness, within the building were a total loss as there was no insurance. The team of horses which were in the barn were saved. A group of men from here went out, to assist in saving the house from catching on fire. This is the second barn Farlow has lost by fire, the other fire occurred 18 years ago.

Surety Company Loses Its Case

In the case of American Surety company against A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks, Circuit Judge Lewelling Tuesday upheld the position of the superintendent who had rejected the surety company's claim for preference on a bank deposit of approximately \$4500. In May of this year the surety company filed with the superintendent his petition asking him to reconsider his rejection of the claim for preference. In the event that he did not reconsider such claim the petition was to be considered as an appeal to circuit court from the superintendent's ruling. Schramm demurred on the ground that if the petition were taken as an appeal it was not then in time, or 30 days after the rejection.

RELIGIOUS TUSSELE EYED IN GERMANY

BERLIN, Aug. 21.—(P)—An outbreak of anti-Christian propaganda from Nazi sources today stirred deeper the troubled church situation in Germany, causing apprehension on the part of Catholics and some protestant groups. Despite Chancellor Hitler's acknowledgment of "positive Christianity" in Hamburg recently, there were indications of a greater tension.

The anti-Christian movement was stressed in a pronouncement of August Hoppe, of the Hitler Youth Press department, published in the periodical "Nordland".

"The time has come," he wrote, "to take up the fight against Christianity. Germans must and shall realize their conversion to Christianity was a crime against the race and the people which put them completely at the mercy of powers outside the state."

Catholic circles were perturbed by the attack on Christianity, the Catholic publication Kirchenblatt asking the responsible authorities of the state now how these utterances of Hitler youth authorities can possibly be reconciled with assurances of positive Christianity recently emphasized by an authoritative voice.

The Vatican has not yet ratified the new interpretation of the concordat between Germany and the church, indicating a state of strife.

Some felt that the death of President Paul Von Hindenburg had removed a check on the church policies of the ruling party.

The late president, it was recalled, admonished Reichsbishop Ludwig Mueller to "see to it that Christ is preached."

The Reichsbishop, now in complete control of the state churches, has announced a drive to "cover every city and county from autumn to spring."

Hoppe's plea called upon Germans to "liberate yourselves from the cultures of alien priests who want to make you the booty of the Jews."

"Discard the last messages of Christian training," he urged, "abandon the Jewish-Christian conception of sin, pity and loving the enemy."

He called upon youth to be hard, saying, "pity and mercy be damned. Praise that which steels. Christianity's totality claim is a thing of the past."

RICKREALL SCHOOL BUDGET ACCEPTED

RICKREALL, Aug. 21.—A school meeting was held Monday evening in the high school for the purpose of discussing and voting upon the estimated budget for the fiscal year 1934-35.

John Crippen, chairman of the board, presided. Estimated receipts total \$2635.48, while estimated expenditures total \$9,879.50. Amount to be raised by district tax is \$7244.02. Bonded debts including negotiable warrants total \$15,000 and endorsed bonds outstanding \$4990.10. Thus the total indebtedness of the district is only \$19,990.19. The budget estimates were accepted and the assembly voted to tax the district to raise the needed \$7244.02 to operate the elementary and high schools.

GOVERNMENT LOAN ON COTTON OKED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—(P)—Another government loan on cotton to help the southern farmers—12 cents a pound this time—was authorized today by President Roosevelt.

The announcement was made just before Mr. Roosevelt left Washington for the midwest to attend the funeral of Speaker Henry T. Rainey.

The president said in his statement he had "requested the Reconstruction Finance corporation to make funds available to the commodity credit corporation that will enable it to increase its lending from 10 to 12 cents a pound on cotton, classing low middling or better which is and has been continuously in the possession of the producer."

This means that any cotton grower if he does not wish to sell his staple at this time, may borrow 12 cents a pound from federal agencies on the commodity.

Incinerator Is Repaired, \$373

Repairs to the city incinerator, recently authorized by the city council, have to date cost \$373.08, according to a city accounts tabulation compiled this week. Most of the money was spent for bricklayers' services. Portions of the structure's walls were threatened with rapid deterioration if not immediately repaired, the council was informed.

Bohrnstedt Is Sued in Court

A. C. Bohrnstedt, local real estate broker whose license recently was revoked, was yesterday named defendant along with Standard Accident Insurance company in a complaint filed in circuit court by John C. and Dorothy Heffley. Plaintiffs allege Bohrnstedt converted to his own use \$164.58 in funds turned over to him for other purposes.

PAROLED LAD GOES BAD; DIES IN SHOES

Roy Williams, who was arrested in Salem October 27, 1933, pleaded guilty and was paroled, was shot and killed last Thursday in Cleveland, O., according to information received yesterday by the sheriff's office. Williams was shot by a service station attendant while he was attempting to pull a stick-up job.

Williams was arrested here for the theft of an automobile belonging to W. L. Mooreman, a statehouse employee. Two older men, arrested with him, claimed they were merely riding with him at the time of the arrest. The two men, named Craig and Anderson, received six months sentences when they pleaded guilty. Williams, 18 years old, also pleaded guilty and was paroled to Judge McMahon.

Reports later received by the sheriff's office from the division of investigation at Washington, D. C., showed no criminal record against either Craig or Anderson, but that Williams had been arrested and held for investigation in New Orleans under an assumed name on November 23, 1931.

WOMAN HIT BY CAR; LEG IS FRACTURED

"Resting fairly well" was the report from Salem Deaconess hospital last night regarding the condition of Mrs. James Imah, route one, who received a broken leg and severe bruises Monday night when hit by an automobile driven by John Burmeister, route one.

Mrs. Imah was walking across the Wallace road in Polk county when struck. Burmeister said he tried to avoid hitting Mrs. Imah. She was taken to the Salem Deaconess hospital.

City Pays \$36 on Rents for Needy

While the city has stopped rent payments for needy families in the case of bills contracted after July 1, it is still paying rents for periods prior to that time, a city recorder's report prepared this week shows. During the past two weeks \$36 in rent bills and \$9.60 for water service in relief cases have been paid, listed from the emergency fund, although there is no money left therein. The deficit is to be made up by transfers from other funds.
