PAULUS ADVOCATES LOAN LAW CHANGES

Eliminate \$30 Regulation, Reduce Interest Rates on Others, Advice

As a result of a thorough study of financial statements of small loan companies in the state and comparison of interest rates, restrictions on loans in all of the 48 states, Otto K. Paulus, member of the legislative interim committee, made the following recommendations to T. J. Wiers, chairman, of Hood River:

1. That the unsecured loan of \$30 or less with the unlimited interest rate be entirely eliminated from the Oregon statute.
2. That rates on sums in excess of \$100 be reduced from 3 per cent a month to 2½ per cent to \$200 and from 3 per cent a month to 2 per cent on sums in excess of \$200.
3. That the bank examiner be authorized to reduce the interest rates herebefore set forth whenever he deems such action advisable, and that the bank examiner be authorized to fix special rates where the securities are gilded, such as insurance policies, liberty bonds, etc., but where for some reason bank credit is not advisable to the borrower.
4. That the main committee consider the advisability of limiting the operation of the personal finance companies to large cities or counties having in excess of some stated population.
5. That the committee consider the advisability of authorizing the banking department to restrict the number of loan companies operating in any given territory in a manner similar to that used in issuing characters to banks.
6. That the term "interest" be deleted from the act, and that the term "charge" be inserted in lieu thereof for the purpose of preventing unscrupulous demagogues from misleading the people in connection with this type of legislation.

CAMPS ARE CLOSED UNDER STATE RULE

DALLAS, Aug. 22—The two camps of the Willamette Valley Lumber company above Black Rock were closed down yesterday following a state order closing forest activities in several counties in the northwest part of the state due to fire hazard. No fires have been experienced in the holdings of this company this year but present reports are that the men will be held in camp for a few days in readiness to fight any fires that might start.

The past several days have been the hottest experienced here this year but have proved valuable toward the prune harvest as the fruit that was still partly green is ripening fast and nothing short of a heavy rain could affect the harvest now. Hops are rapidly approaching the point where they will be ready to pick and this harvest will probably start in this district within a few days.

Yesterday's temperature here was generally reported as 96 and reports today indicated that the mercury would rise at least three degrees higher.

Troopers Arrest 540 Autoists in July, Pray Says

State troopers arrested 540 persons for traffic violations in July, according to a report issued Wednesday by Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police. Fines aggregated \$7689. Eighty-nine of the arrests were for reckless driving, while in 47 cases the persons arrested were driving their automobiles while intoxicated.

There were 45 arrests in the general law enforcement division and nine in the fish and game division. Twenty six persons arrested were held for other law enforcement departments.

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CANNERIES TURNING TO BEANS, BERRIES

Prune Handling Nears End; Pear Pack Due to Get Under Way Soon

With the last lap of prune canning nearly run, the larger canneries in Salem are starting with berries, beans and other valley products as well as pears from southern Oregon and the Yakima orchards in Washington.

Reid Murdoch reported yesterday that they expected to wind up with prunes either today or tomorrow. Pear canning is now going on there full blast with an 8½ hour shift running through more than 1500 cases daily. Superintendent Yocom stated that the cannery was also putting through sizeable quantities of evergreen blackberries, fruit cocktail and their own brand of maraschino cherries.

Prune canning at Paulus Bros. will hold over for about ten more days, George Paulus reported yesterday. For a few days the cannery was swamped with fresh and stored fruit with long lines of trucks waiting to unload. Work is now caught up, however, he stated and the end of next week should see the way clear for pears which are now in cold storage at the plant. Apples and carrots are also on the canning list at the Paulus cannery to be handled after pears.

Capacity volumes of beans are keeping the Cleary-Hillman cannery busy this week and will continue full swing for at least another week. Tomatoes are also set for canning sometime next week according to word from that plant. Hunt Bros. plan to finish with prunes sometime today and set up for intensive pear canning before the week is over. They have been taking small quantities of southern Oregon and Yakima pears for the past few days, they stated yesterday, and will greatly increase the intake as soon as all prunes are out of the way.

Reports from the Rogue river valley yesterday stated that harvest of the pear crop would be

completed within the next ten days or two weeks. This is one of the most ample sources of supply for the Salem canneries.

INDIAN ARRESTED; DRIVES TAXI AWAY

Victor Edwards, Indian, who claims Tacoma as his home, wanted to see how it felt to ride in a taxi without starting at the meter. Sometime after 11 p. m. Tuesday he took possession of a taxi belonging to the Royal Cab company of Portland and started riding south. State police, warned by a broadcast, picked him up yesterday morning at 3:30 o'clock near Brooks. He was lodged in the city jail here and returned to Portland yesterday.

The cab, which was returned to Portland also, was in the hands of its driver until 11 p. m. Tuesday.

State police also at an early hour yesterday picked up two girls, Edna and Evelyn Leslie, who were out for "a change of scenery." The girls were taken into custody at 3 a. m. near Sunnyside. They said they were going to San Diego. They were held for Seattle authorities.
