ern Lane counties, where entry by permit will be allowed, and 89,000 acres of old burned land and fern hills in western Lane county, to which admittance under any condition is forbidden.

A total of \$31.1 million, logging and road construction operators in western Oregon forest areas have stopped work as a result of the closing order issued early this week and applying to the area north of Douglas county and west of the Cascades, including 13 counties, Crosemiller reported. The closure order, which included construction contractors using gasoline or diesel engines, affects Multnomah, Columbia, Clackamas, Tillamook, Lincoln, Lane, Washington, Yamhill, Benton, Polk, Marion, Clatsop and Linn counties.

All road operations in the national forests have also been ordered discontinued until the return of normal weather conditions, C. J. Buck, federal forester at Portland, informed the state highway department yesterday. The order made it necessary for the highway commission to suspend widening operations on the Mt. Hood loop and in other areas of the federal forest.

ALCATRAZ CONVICTS STRICTLY ISOLATED

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Any possible contact with the outside world for Scarface Al Capone, former Chicago gang leader, and 52 other prisoners brought from the Atlanta prison, was cut off today by Warden James A. Johnston of the new federal penitentiary on Alcatraz island in San Francisco bay.

Strict orders to prevent the prisoners from communicating with their former underworld associates were issued by Warden Johnston in carrying out the orders of Attorney General Homer S. Cummings. On a recent inspection of the island prison, said it was the plan of the department of justice to "segregate" the so-called incorrigible convicts, thereby preventing outbreaks of trouble in other penitentiaries.

"They are not even going to have an opportunity to know what goes on outside," Warden Johnston said. "These men were sent here because the government wants to break their contacts with the underworld. That is going to be done."

5-Goat, 3-Cow Dairies Barred From Portland

PORTLAND, Aug. 23.—(AP)—If you have a four-goat dairy, you can stay in business. If yours is a five-goat enterprise, you'll have to get out of Portland.

This momentous decision was made by the Portland city council today in an ordinance approved for the regulation of dairies. Two-cow and four-goat dairies now in operation will be allowed to continue in business, but will be required to undergo sanitary inspections.

\$2 Hundred Paid, Hannchen Barley

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 23.—(AP)—A new peak price for barley in the current harvest was reached today when six growers in the Tule lake country sold a pool of about 100,000 sacks of Hannchen barley at two dollars per 100 pounds. About 500,000 sacks of barley have been raised in the Tule lake area this season.

KNIFE THAT KILLED FAY NEW IS SOUGHT

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 23.—(AP)—To scores of detectives and volunteers, Police Chief Luther Hollums tonight gave the terse order "find the knife" that was plunged twice into the throat of Fay New, slain co-ed of Howard college.

Coincident with the renewed intense drive to locate the weapon, Coroner G. M. Evans said his autopsy and a reconstruction of the crime showed the college student fought to ward off her assailant.

"But Miss New," he said, "was not criminally attacked before a knife was plunged twice into her throat."

A minute search of the path from the Ironside-Trussville road to the secluded ditch in which the 19-year-old co-ed's body was found failed to turn up the knife.

Harold Taylor, in county jail charged with the 19-year-old co-ed's murder, continued denials that he had harmed Miss New, and told officers he did not have a knife when he took the girl on an automobile ride Monday night.

Josephine Fair Has Fire Scare

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Aug. 23.—(AP)—Important buildings at the Josephine county fairgrounds were barely saved tonight when fire destroyed the laboratory and showered burning brands on roofs of other structures.

City and state fire companies, working with a pump truck and even with individual water cans, extinguished all the small blazes without serious damage.

1 small can tuna, flaked
2 hard cooked eggs, sliced
1 tablespoon vinegar
6 green stuffed olives, sliced
6 sweet pickles, sliced
½ cup chopped celery
½ teaspoon salt

Make lemon gelatin mixture using vinegar with the second cup of water. Add all other ingredients and allow to set. Serve garnished with radish roses, celery curls and lettuce. Use mayonnaise if desired. Serves six.

Liver Loaf

1½ lbs. liver
1½ cups bread crumbs
2 eggs, beaten slightly
1½ cups milk
2 tablespoons bacon drippings
1 teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon celery salt
½ teaspoon pepper
1 tablespoon parsley, minced
1 tablespoon onion
½ green pepper
sliced bacon

Wipe liver, cut into slices and parboil for five minutes. Remove any loose skin and membrane and put through chopper together with green peppers and onion. Add other ingredients, mix thoroughly and mold into shape. Put into a well-greased baking dish and set in a pan of hot water. Cover top of loaf with slices of bacon. Bake one and a half hours. Garnish the platter with slices of broiled bacon and serve with tomato sauce. Makes six portions.
