"HUMAN BONDAGE" NOW AT ELSINORE

Maugham Novel Brought to Screen With Notable Cast; Plot Strong

DALLAS ROUTE TO COAST FULLY OPEN

DALLAS, Aug. 25.—For the first time in several months the Wallace bridge road from Dallas to the McMinville - Tillamook highway is open to all kinds of traffic without detours, although the work of graveling the road will not be completed for a few days. The road will not be oiled until later but it is reported to be in excellent shape at present.

The road has been under construction for several months due to the work of widening and straightening between Salt Creek and Buell. Several bad curves near Salt Creek were eliminated and the road over Butler hill was straightened and made into an easy grade. A new bridge is in use across Mill creek near Buell.

Another unit on the reconditioning of this secondary highway is expected to be started sometime this fall and will include the road from Buell to the Yamhill river. This section of the road will also be straightened and widened and a new bridge will be built across the Yamhill several hundred yards east of the present covered bridge. Improvements on this route to the coast have shortened the distance from Dallas to the coast highway slightly and has cut several minutes off the driving time to the coast.

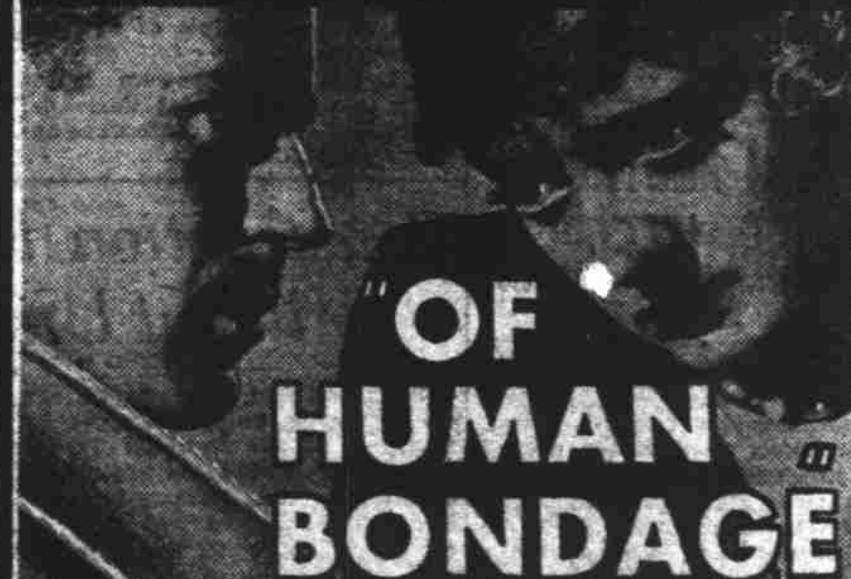
