PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28.—(AP)—No definite word for the arrival of F. H. Fowler, newly appointed as arbitrator in the Salem water controversy. Has been set, C. C. Hockley, state engineer for the public works administration, said tonight.

Fowler is now at his home in San Francisco, Hockley said, and has not indicated when he will come to Oregon. "This appointment is particularly pleasing to me," Hockley asserted. "Mr. Fowler is a widely known civil engineer, a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers and a former director of the body. Though our paths have never happened to cross in the 15 years I have known of him, I have heard hundreds of favorable reports of his work. He has been particularly active in the construction of nearly every dam built in California in the past 15 years."

Warrant Issued For Berg; Does Not Make Appeal

Failure of George H. Berg of Salem to perfect his appeal within the lawful period from his conviction in municipal court on a charge of drunken driving led to issuance of a bench warrant by Judge Mark Poulsen for his arrest.

PEA CANNING SAID DUE FOR REVIVAL

With the Pacific northwest forging ahead as top-pea canning section in the country, Salem appears destined again to become a great center for this industry. Prget Sound has already taken giant strides in this direction, reports indicate.

Rough estimates indicate that the Pacific northwest has canned a million cases of peas this year where five years ago the amount was negligible. All up and down the coast from Elmer Yaquina to beyond the Tillamook flats it is said peas can be grown of fine quality and in great abundance.

Way back in 1901 Salem seemed destined to develop this industry. W. G. Allen, veteran canner of this section, reports, but the eastern situation caused the pea development to wane and practically die on the way, indications are that it will stage a comeback, he states.

PURGING OF LEGAL PROFESSION URGED

MILWAUKEE, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Wellington sentiment for a curb on dishonest lawyers burst over the American Bar association convention today. The president demanded an immediate house cleaning.

Earle W. Evans of Wichita, Kan., head of the association, warned that the public holds the entire legal profession in suspicion because of the activities of some of its members.

He admitted there have been acts warranting the public's distrust, then said:

"We are all suffering. Our influence is minimized, our honesty doubted, and our leadership repudiated, all because of the sins of a relatively few. Let us no longer delay the already too long deferred house cleaning. Let us begin it at once."

The president's proposal put the stamp of official approval on the cries of other bar leaders for a purge of the profession's ranks.

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Soak gelatin in cold water about 5 minutes and dissolve in hot consommé. Pour a thin layer in a wet mold. When it stiffens arrange on it decorations of the peas, beets and eggs. Cover with a little more of the gelatin mixture which has been allowed to stiffen slightly. Dip other pieces of the decorations in the aspic and set them against the chilled sides of the mold. When these have stiffened, fill mold with alternate slices of the ham, chicken and thickening aspic. Serve on a bed of lettuce leaves and garnish with radish roses.

2 lbs. fresh lean pork
1 pint sweet milk
1 cup bread and cracker crumbs mixed
2 eggs
1 cup chopped green pepper, onion and celery mixed
pepper to season

Run the meats and vegetables through the food chopper and mix all the given ingredients. Mold in roaster rack having plenty of water under rack. Roast until well done, about 2 hours. Vegetables such as carrots and potatoes may be peeled and placed around the loaf to steam in last three-quarters of an hour before the loaf is done. The loaf will serve about 25 and makes a fine picnic or luncheon dish.

MEMBER COLUMBIA UNION IS SUSPECT

Grammer Said to Admit He Fired .32 Calibre Shot During Union Fight

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Carl Grammer, gang boss of the Columbia River Longshoremen's association, was served in the city jail tonight with a warrant charging first degree murder in connection with the death of James Conner, 27, slain during a waterfront strike riot here a week ago Monday.

The warrant served on Grammer was the 29th first degree murder warrant served in connection with Conner's death, and the first to be served on a member of the Columbia group, which was besieged in a garage hiring hall by a mob of men as an aftermath of the recent Pacific coast waterfront strike. Twenty-eight members of the International Longshoremen's association, violently opposed to the Columbia group, were already in jail on similar charges. This is the largest group of defendants ever held in a single murder case here.

Grammer is claimed by sheriff's offices to have admitted he flourished a .32 calibre revolver in the case of the bullet that killed Conner during the melee.

Grammer boss is said to have told officers he "didn't know" whether or not he fired the gun during the riot. Officers found the gun in his home, cleaned and with all chambers full.

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Entry list for the Pacific coast outboard motorboat championships to be held here August 30, 31 and September 1, today revealed the names of some 40 of the fastest outboard hydroplane drivers on the coast.

The list is headed by "Bill" Withington, of California, winner of the Hearst medal and the California state championships for the last two years. Others include: Fred McGee, Fresno, winner of the Lake Elsinore class F title; Al Kendrick, California, winner of the east class 3 medal; Tom Redfield, Seattle, northwest class A champion; Mrs. "Set" Ruhland, Alhambra, California Pacific coast class B champion; Val Plue, Portland, winner in the Vancouver regatta, and H. V. Hadfield, Los Angeles, Pacific coast champion in class C.
