Rentals on Farm Property Better Land Bank Avers

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Rental collections from farms acquired by the federal land bank in Oregon were approximately 26 per cent better in the first seven months of the year than for the same period of 1933. E. M. Ehrhardt, president of the credit institution, announced today. Payments of installments on long term land bank and commission mortgages were approximately 27 per cent better during the same period, Ehrhardt said. A total of about 4000 new mortgage loans—many of them refinancing for pressing obligations—were closed in Oregon during the past seven months. The value is nearly \$10,000,000, Ehrhardt continued.

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SPEED IN WARFARE IS PRESENT TREND

Tanks, Airplanes Take Most Of Armament Funds in Europe Is Report

LONDON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Confident the "next" war would be fought at high speed, Europe tonight was grooming fast iron soldiers to do the job. While London and Paris army men tended to differ with the opinion Italian military authorities expressed today to the effect that trench warfare was obsolete, Great Britain and France nevertheless went forward with Italy in efforts to speed up the movement of troops.

The League of Nations' armament yearbook published at Geneva today estimated the world spent between \$3,471,000,000 and \$4,399,000,000 gold for armaments in 1933. A great part of this, army men agreed, went for tanks, airplanes and other fast fighting machines designed to wage war at maximum velocity.

Calculating the results of the recent army maneuvers, Premier Benito Mussolini's military experts asserted the first onslaught of tanks and fast moving troop detachments would break through trench lines, force fighting out into the open and make the movement so rapid that nothing would be gained by digging new trenches.

While willing to admit the speed of highly mechanized modern armies would radically affect the old stalemate of trench warfare, French military leaders said they still believed that trenches would continue to play an important part in warfare.

They indicated their belief that the 100,000,000 fortified trench system built along the German border would turn back the first shock of an attack and give time for mobilization. They held to their theory that the infantry is still the backbone of an army.

Nevertheless, France, like Italy, has concentrated on speed. At the last maneuvers Marshal Petain, minister of war, stressed the importance of cooperation between tanks and fast armored cars on land, and airplanes.

Great Britain's conviction that another war in Europe would be more open led to the creation this summer of the first permanent tank brigade.

NEW NEEDHAM DRIER PROVING SUCCESS

Frank Needham is rightfully enthusiastic about his new automatic hop drier which he has just installed and started operating on his Brown's Island place. The drier is an oil burner that turns them out in five and a half hours, evenly baked and ready for market.

It is the speediest hop seasoner on the market, he states, and the beauty of the contraption is that a siren blows when the batch is all baked. A mercury indicator does the trick and turns on the whistle at the proper moment. Needham said he tried a platinum needle indicator for a few days but the sulphur fumes from the processed hops gummed the instrument, making it inaccurate. Mr. Needham has 160 acres of hops and a crew of over 200 picking. He reports that quality is good this year but yield a bit light. His chief worry now is that the river will rise up and flood his property, taking the prize drier with it. Every year the backwash gets closer and unless some damming is done, he reports, high water will engulf hops and all.

FLOOD SURVEY IS MADE NEAR EOLA

River Bank There Eroding Away, Fear Slough May Again Be Channel

Congressman James W. Mott, Hedda Swart, county engineer and head of the local flood control committee, and a number of interested property owners inspected the farming district along the river a mile south of Eola yesterday with a view to determining whether or not the inland wash is threatening the land as farmers declare it is.

For the last 35 years, the men reported, the river has been gradually crumbling away the soil and pushing farther to the east toward the slough which runs parallel entering Salem at Schindler's dairy. This slough marked the main river channel back in 1882 and the property owners fear that high water will again engulf the intervening land.

Most of the property is cultivated in hops and orchard. Frank Needham has 300 acres in the threatened area, with 160 acres in hops which he is now harvesting. Miller McLaughlin has 160 acres and Gust Heyden about 100 acres in the section. Others who have land in the district include Henry Klender, Joe Bresler and J. P. Blankenship.

All these men were present at the inspection and declared that the water must be redirected into the proper channel in order to save their property. A rise of eight or nine feet above low water level, they stated, would flood the area which gradually slopes up for some 400 yards to the east then abruptly recedes to the slough.

Mott indicated that he had written to the district engineer, Robbins in Portland in regard to the matter and planned to have him personally inspect the area when he comes to Salem. Then whatever the engineer finds feasible will be incorporated in a bill which Mott will place before the next congress. The property owners stated that wing dams at the point where the river breaks its regular channel would be the logical means of checking the back flow.
