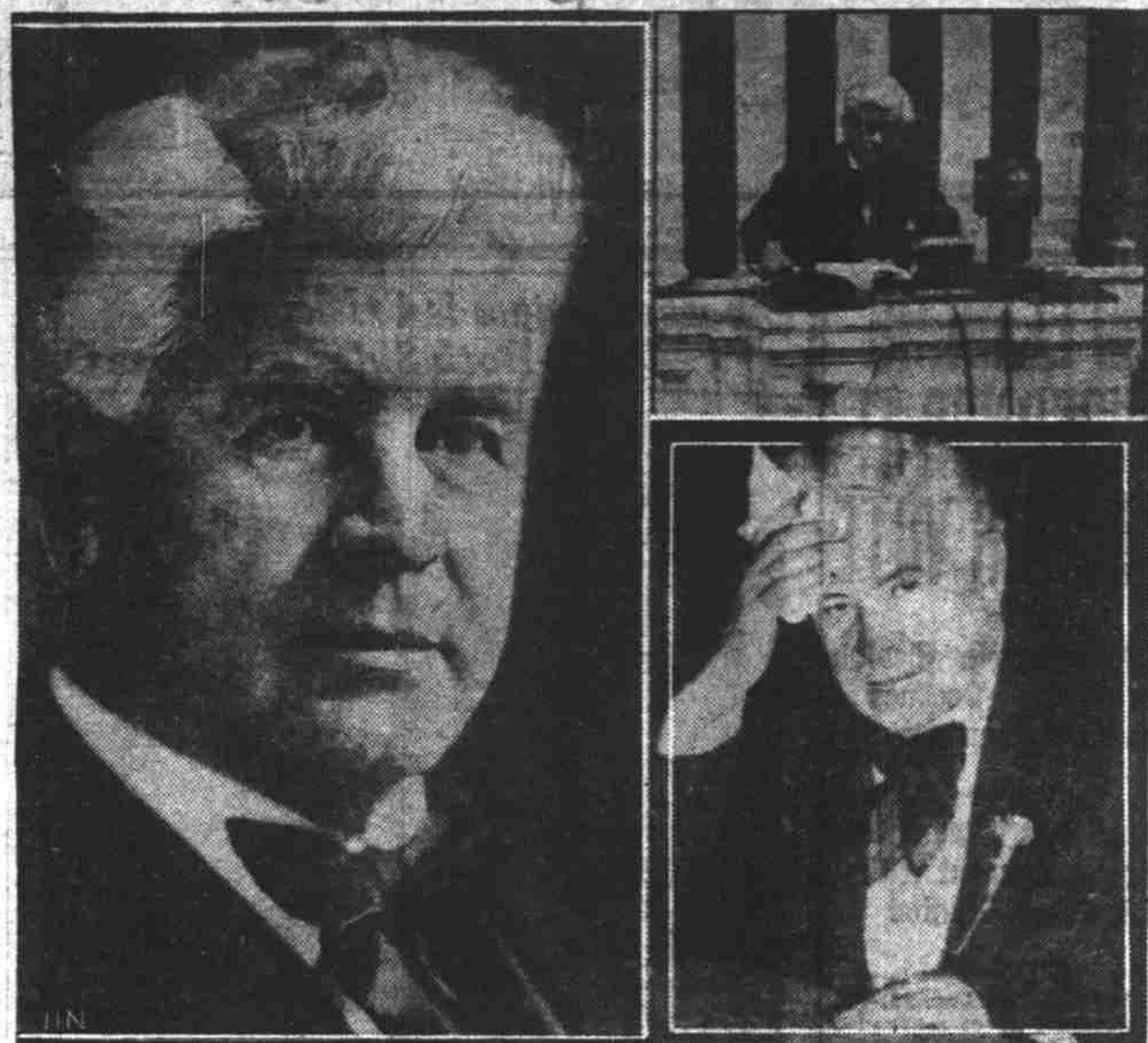

ARBITRATION GETS STARTED, PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Only one of the 14 witnesses called from the ranks of the International Longshoremen's association was heard today by the president's national longshoremen's arbitration board in its first session here. Jack Singer, member of the I. L. A. executive board and prominent strike leader, was in the closed session most of the afternoon.

Members of the board, Archbishop Edward J. Hanna, chairman; Edward F. McGrady, assistant secretary of labor, and Oscar K. Cushing, arrived here last night and this morning planned to remain two days before going on to Seattle and Tacoma.

Violence during and after the strike, in which two men were killed here, will have no effect on the board's decisions, Cushing declared after the first session tonight. He said, however, that the board was "learning all we can about them."

3000 REINDEER TO LEAVE, FINAL LAP

SEATTLE, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Despite vicious attacks by roving wolf packs, temperatures far below zero, and the hazards of a 1,425-mile trail over icy mountains and snow-covered plains, a herd of 3,000 reindeer purchased by the Canadian government will leave on the final 75-mile lap to their new Arctic circle home as soon as the Mackenzie river freezes over and snow comes.

The herd, which set out in December, 1929, from elephant point on Kotzebue sound, north of Seward peninsula, was grazing at single point on the Arctic coast, waiting for snow and the freeze-up so that they may get across the delta of the Mackenzie to Kitigazuit peninsula, their goal, Ralph Lomen, of the Loman Reindeer corporation, from whom the Canadian government purchased the herd, said today.

CCC Pilot Lands Plane While He's Unconscious, Say

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—With officers and laymen still wondering how he managed to land his plane when apparently unconscious, Lieutenant Wiston Rosenburgh, 28, of the CCC, was recovering tonight in a hospital from fumes of carbon monoxide gas that overcame him while his plane was still in the air on a flight from Vancouver, Wash., to Medford.

Officers had not determined what caused the gas to escape into the plane's cockpit.

Bilbo Gets Lead In Mississippi Race For Senate

JACKSON, Miss., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Theodore G. Bilbo, the "storm petrel" of Mississippi politics, today had started on the comeback trail. Repudiated three years ago by an overwhelming majority, the former governor won his way into a runoff contest with Senator Hubert D. Stephens, veteran lawmaker, in yesterday's democratic senatorial primary. The incumbent held a slight lead on the face of near-complete unofficial returns tonight.

Free Balloon Up 17.75 Miles In Initial Tryout

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—(AP)—A free hydrogen balloon with a radio transmitter aboard soared into the stratosphere an estimated 17.75 miles today in a test flight planned as forerunner of many others to further man's knowledge about the cosmic ray.

Prof. Arthur H. Compton, Nobel prize winner in physics at the University of Chicago, directed the ascension. He termed it "100 per cent successful" when one of his associates saw the big rubber bag burst after an hour and seven minutes in the air. Signals, transmitted by a short wave wireless set, were received by the ground crew until the balloon reached a height of nine and one-half miles.

Huey's Ready To Go, New Orleans; Maybe With Guns

BATON ROUGE, La., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Senator Huey P. Long tonight was ready to invade hostile New Orleans with a legislative investigating committee possibly backed by the guns of state militia.

The "Kingfish," who will serve as counsel for the committee in its investigation of alleged "vice and corruption" in the city government of Mayor T. Semmes Walmsley, conferred with the group just before he appealed to the governor for "protection."

The committee specifically requested that Governor O. K. Allen take steps to prevent interference by the courts of New Orleans.

BAR ASSOCIATION'S SESSIONS PLANNED

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 29.—A record attendance at the Oregon State Bar convention, which this year will meet jointly, September 6, 7 and 8, with the Pacific Coast Institute of Law on the campus of the University of Oregon, is assured, according to information received here from Ralph H. King, president of the bar association. Mr. King, with Wayne L. Morse, dean of the school of law here, is making up the program for the session, which will not only draw lawyers and others interested from all parts of Oregon, but from the entire country as well.

The session is certain to be unusually interesting, and may even be featured by some warm debates, it was declared by Dean Morse. One of the "headliners" of the institute will be Karl N. Llewellyn, internationally famous for his liberal views on constitutional and other phases of law. He has already clashed verbally with some of the keenest legal minds in the country, and, according to Dean Morse, is ready anytime to "tangle" with his more conservative colleagues.

The field of criminology, one that is drawing an increasing number of outstanding lawyers, will receive considerable attention. Newman F. Baker, professor of law at Northwestern university and managing director of the Journal of Criminal Law and Criminology, will head sessions in this topic.

7000 COMPLAINTS IN WEEKLY, NRA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(AP)—NRA compliance chiefs, estimating the inflow of complaints at 7000 weekly, were reported ready to bear down harder on violators of Blue Eagle code provisions. The pressure to cut down violations will move hand in hand with the reorganization of the recovery administration. This reshaping of NRA, incidentally, was disclosed today to have resulted in some new internal squabbles recently that two highly placed officials offered their resignations to Hugh S. Johnson.

This trouble, however, was quickly smoothed over, and the two principals, Blackwell Smith, assistant general counsel, and Leon Henderson, chief of the planning and research division, are still on the job.

A resume of NRA's compliance work has shown that the recovery organization itself has snatched away blue eagles from about 300 employers.

Bourbon Vote To South is Little Ahead of G. O. P.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—(AP)—With tabulations approximately 44 per cent complete, returns from Tuesday's primary election vote in California tonight showed the democratic vote running more than the republican.

The incomplete tabulation gave 667,683 democrat votes as against 629,830 republicans. Registration of the two parties in the state for the election were: democrat 1,494,111; republican 1,418,826.

Baby Mysteriously Poisoned, Tacoma

TACOMA, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The victim of a mysterious and deadly poison, little Frieda Manweiler, 21-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Manweiler, dropped dead while playing in the yard of her home here today. It was the belief of the child's parents that she had eaten some poisoned meat that had been put out for dogs, a number of which have been poisoned recently in the district.

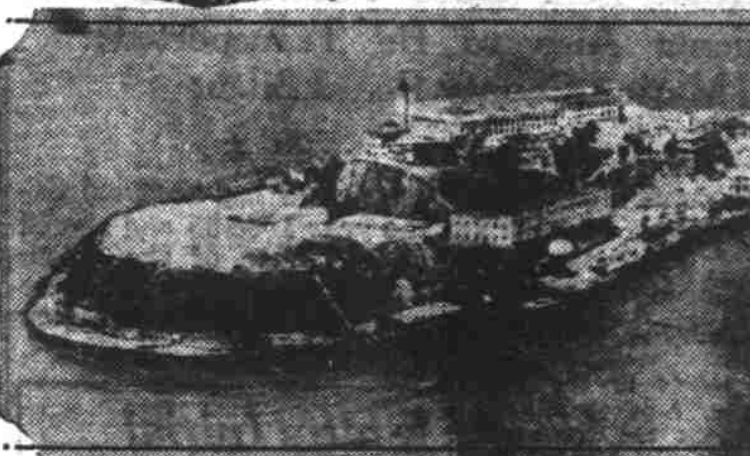

SOUTH CAROLINA'S WET, STRAW VOTE

COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug. 29.—(AP)—South Carolina, one of the two states to reject repeal last fall, today had voted wet in an advisory referendum and had given the only bone dry candidate in the race a substantial lead for the nomination as governor.

Returns from yesterday's democratic primary slowly increased the margin of the wet vote and established that Olin D. Johnston, life-long prohibitionist, and the veteran Cole L. Blease would enter a second primary September 11 for the nomination.

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INJUNCTION ASKED ON ICE CREAM CODE

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—A suit to have the Oregon agricultural adjustment act of 1933 declared unconstitutional, and to prevent Max Gehlhar, state director of agriculture, from enforcing a recent order setting a price of 40 cents a quart for frozen dairy product similar to ice cream was filed in circuit court today by representatives of seven dairies and ice cream parlors.

Plaintiffs included the Ideal Dairy company; Harry Bates and Paul Balmgard (The Butter Hop); Paul Border and Gladys Border (Border's Dairy); W. Elmer (Roseway Dairy); R. J. Roberts (Boulevard Cave); R. L. Blair (Blair's Creamery and Dairy Lunch); and H. Dale Howard (Western Creamery Co.).

A permanent injunction against enforcement of Gehlhar's price order was asked, and a temporary injunction granted by Presiding Circuit Judge Stapleton.

The complaint alleges the state adopted a schedule of prices prepared by the Oregon Ice Cream Manufacturers association, and thereby virtually ruined the package ice cream business because the price was too high.

Seven Criminal Insane Escape North Carolina

RALEIGH, N. C., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Seven criminally insane men who escaped today from the state hospital here were the object of a widespread search over eastern North Carolina tonight.

Four of the seven escapes, led by Ed Deaver, convicted murderer, who was saved by commutation from the electric chair, surprised D. A. Murray and W. B. Abley, attendants at the building, and armed with parts of rocking chairs forced them into the "bull pens" outside the structure.
