

Onion Harvest About Ended; Late Hop Picking Begins

EMPLOY MANY TO PULL CROP

"Yellow Danvers" Now Curing in Onion Fields at Labish Center

LABISH CENTER, Aug. 29.—Onion pulling, which has occupied the attention of this community the last several weeks, is practically completed, and hundreds of acres of the Oregon yellow Danvers lie neatly piled in rows throughout the fields undergoing the "curing" process. Early pullings have already been hauled into storage houses, particularly a large share of the crop on the Hayes farms. The work has given employment to a large number of persons.

In general, field yields are going below normal this year, due to the inroads made by pests, such as maggots, cut worms, etc. early in the growing season. A few sales have been made at 90c a hundred, it is said.

BUS CONTRACT LET BY TURNER BOARD

Hops Fine Quality in Sunnyside, Reported

SUNNYSIDE, Aug. 29.—Prune picking is finished on most of the prune orchards in this district. Some driers are through, others taking out the last of the run. A fair crop has been harvested and of good quality in the Sunnyside locality.

The rapid ripening of the prunes caused the hiring of a larger force of workers than anticipated at the beginning of the picking. Some of the orchards report the heaviest yield in recent years, with no brown rot.

Salem Heights to Start Schools on September 10 Said

40 Picking at Lyons Yard; Yield Lighter Than Year Ago
