NEWS CONFUSING TOWNAL STREETERS

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Stock resumed a slow downward drift today after failing to hold early gains.

Irregular and uncertain movements in commodities and bonds, as well as stocks, pointed to considerable confusion in the efforts of markets to interpret the day's news, especially Secretary Morgenthau's account of the new deal finances and the apparent swing to the "left" by voters in the California democratic primary.

A clear-cut response to the news also was lacking in foreign exchanges. The dollar eased against the French franc, but was firmer against other European gold currencies. The British pound dropped more than 3 cents.

The government list was steady, but elsewhere in the bond list prices were mixed.

The stock market seemed to find a mild stimulus in the overnight news for buying broadened out considerably. Meat packing and local traction issues were outstandingly firm.

Such prominent issues as U. S. Steel, General Motors, Bethlehem, J. I. Case, American Telephone, Chrysler, Montgomery Ward, New York Central, Santa Fe, American Can, Western Union, Kennecott copper and consolidated gas finished fractionally to more than a point lower.

Canadian gold shares were strong, with dome and McIntyre closing more than a point higher. Armour of Illinois preferred, old sold at a new 1934 top, as did Inland Rapid Transit.

Timothy prices rose to \$761.50 shares, compared with only 404.22 in the preceding session. The Standard Statistics Co., average for 90 stocks dipped five-tenths of a point to 73.6.

The Moody index of spot commodity prices touched a new 1934 peak at 156.3 compared with 155.3 yesterday.

BULLISH INTEREST IN GRAIN REVIVES

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—(AP)—A revival of bullish speculative interest in the grain market today was responsible for heavy advances of prices, although profit taking sales held the upward trend in check.

At the peak of buying wheat had gained as much as 1 1/2 cent a bushel and corn 1 1/2, but closing prices showed selling on the bulge. Wheat registered a net increase of 1/2 to 1 1/2 cent for the day and corn was up 1/2 to 1 1/2.
