

EDUCATIONAL SIDE OF FAIR STRESSED

Gehihar Addresses Lions;
1933 Attendance Was
Record, He Avers

Depicting the state fair starting Monday as in large part a "know your Oregon" show mingling education and entertainment, Director Max Gehihar yesterday urged Salem Lions club members to attend the big exhibition at least four times next week and predicted the largest crowds in history.

An audit, completed this week, of state fair attendance records back to 1927 revealed to his surprise, Gehihar said, that the 1933 fair was a record breaker, double that of any previous fair.

Among the outstanding features of the coming fair, the director mentioned the \$4000 electrified "know your Oregon" exhibit depicting Bonneville dam, its statewide power line system and 40 types of farm industries; the new poultry building capable of housing 4000 entries and held to be the finest such plant in the nation; new multiple livestock judging rings strategically located, and the dairy production display.

Gehihar made much of the free nightly entertainment consisting of fireworks, vaudeville, music and rodeo stunts.

"This will be your last opportunity in your lifetimes to attend what we plan to be a centennial custom, the meeting of governors of the states and dominions that comprised the Oregon territory, in honor of Jason Lee," Gehihar warned. This observance, consisting of programs at the fair grounds and at Champoug, will be held Saturday, September 7.

After a trial meeting on the fifth floor of the Masonic building with Burt Cray as caterer, the club voted to continue holding its Thursday noon luncheons there. Next Thursday it will have a number of Portland Lions as visitors, Portland day at the fair.

Principals to Be In Their Offices

In preparation for the opening of school September 17, principals of Salem's nine grade and two junior high schools will be in their offices the greater part of each day from Tuesday, September 4, on. RURAL MAIL ROUTE REDUCTION FOUGHT

Patrons and Business Men
Called by C. of C. to
Discuss Situation

Patrons of rural routes out of Salem as well as business and professional men are invited by the chamber of commerce to meet in the chamber rooms at 8 o'clock tonight to protest against the order issued by the postoffice department, reducing rural routes out of Salem.

The effect of the order would not only cut out two routes but would cause re-arrangement of addresses on all the routes out of Salem.

For instance, the order would combine routes three and one, with mail deliveries arriving late on one, and causing almost all farmers on the routes to re-number their boxes.

Same would be true in combining routes two and eight, causing inconvenience and expense to rural patrons. Part of the names on rural route eight would go to route nine and part of route nine would be placed in route eight. And part of route three would be assigned to route four.

U. G. Boyer, county clerk, estimates that the proposed order would cause inconvenience and expense to at least 10,000 families on the nine rural routes out of Salem.

As the district around Salem is growing rapidly, especially since so many eastern people are coming into the district, the chamber of commerce is asking especially farmers to attend the meeting tonight in the chamber rooms to protest against all this change in routes.

William F. Ellis, president of the chamber, will preside at the meeting.

HARDY TO STUDY LAW AT HARVARD

Mr. and Mrs. Herbert C. Hardy will leave Salem next Tuesday for Cambridge, Mass., where Mr. Hardy will study law at Harvard university. They plan to drive to Chicago and proceed from there by train.

Mr. Hardy, who graduated from Willamette this year as a major in political science, was awarded the Sidney Thompson Fairchild scholarship at Harvard law college. He will study there for a minimum of three years. His work there begins September 24.

He was prominent in scholastic work and student affairs at Willamette. Last year he was senior scholar in political science, an honorary position duties of which consist of reading and correcting papers and assisting in instruction. During his junior year he managed the Wallulah, student year-book. He was a member of Blue Key, national service fraternity and of Sigma Tau, campus social fraternity. He was president of Sigma Tau his last year.

Hardy has been employed here during the last several years at the Atlas bookstore as a salesman. He will probably have a part time position with the Royal typewriter company in Massachusetts.

He is the son of Rev. David Hardy of the First Methodist Episcopal church at Halsey.

Marketing Act Declared Boon; Suit Is Decried

The injunction suit filed against the 1934 Oregon agricultural marketing act at Portland Wednesday "if successful, will destroy one-half of our farmers' market for butterfat," declared Max Gehihar, state director of agriculture, at the Salem Lions club luncheon Thursday. The Portland suit applied particularly to the minimum price section of the act which was arranged under this act.

Gehihar asserted certain interests desired to kill the minimum price scale so that by omitting butterfat from certain frozen sweets they could cut prices. The state agricultural department cannot regulate the butterfat content of ice cream, its objective, but does have power to set minimum prices that will make the use of butterfat profitable, Gehihar said.

Harness Racing Not Permitted At Oregon Fair

Harness horse races will not be permitted at Oregon's state fairs "until these operators clean up their business," declared Director Max Gehihar at the Salem Lions club meeting Thursday. He averred that presence of harness races was undesirable because of their alleged "crooked" races.

"Every effort to check racing crookedness is being made," Gehihar promised. "The jockeys will be kept locked up until their respective races, the horses will be kept in their paddocks and tested

for doping and the best judges available have been employed. To see that the pari-mutuel betting is conducted as honestly as possible local people will be retained in at least the key positions of the organization. Professionals will be barred as far as possible."
