

Valley Schools Start in Earnest Monday, September 17

STAFFS ABOUT FILLED, WORD

Vacancies in Teacher Posts Nearly Gone; Schools are Repaired

While some of the schools in the valley have been open during the past week the major portion of them have postponed beginning until Monday, September 17. Two schools, Jefferson and Bethel, will give first assignments on Friday the 14th.

Practically all teaching vacancies are reported filled and school houses are in best repair for the coming term.

Molalla Staff Increased
MOLALLA, Sept. 12.—The teaching staff of Molalla high school has been brought up to its former number by the hiring recently of Wayne Bauer to teach science and mathematics. The question of whether or not to hire an additional teacher to replace the one that the board let go last year as an economy measure has been debated by the school board all summer.

Bauer is the first graduate of Molalla high school to be hired as an instructor here. He was graduated from high school in 1924 and later attended Oregon State college, where he has completed all his term hours towards a master's degree and now has only his thesis left to write before getting his degree. Molalla high school has 10 instructors.

Woodburn Begins Sept. 17
WOODBURN, Sept. 17.—Woodburn schools will open September 17. Teachers for the coming year will be the same as last year with the addition of three new instructors who were selected to fill the vacancies of three who resigned.

J. Sidney Johnson of Bonanza, near Klamath Falls, will fill the position of instructor in vocational agriculture; Miss Muriel White of Salem has been chosen as instructor in girls' physical education and Miss Mary Louise Kistler of Portland will hold the position as primary teacher in the grade school.

All vacancies have been filled with the exception of that vacated by Miss Virginia Mason, teacher of Latin, English and expression. The board however is planning to fill this position with a man and is at present negotiating with several applicants.

Jefferson Starts Friday
JEFFERSON, Sept. 12.—The Jefferson schools will open Friday morning, September 14 for registration, and classes will start Monday morning. H. A. Haberly of Mt. Vernon, will be vocational principal, and has moved into the Looney residence on Second street vacated by the Patton family.

Miss Josephine Getchell of Eugene and Miss Esther McMinnie of Outlook, Wash., will teach in the high school.

Cleon Caldwell of Eugene will begin his second year as teacher of the seventh and eighth grades. Miss Ruth Clark of Portland will have charge of the fifth and sixth grades. Mrs. Hannah Smith of Gresham the third and fourth, and Miss Velma Peters of Monmouth will teach the first and second grade pupils.

Bethel School Set
BETHEL, Sept. 12.—The pupils of Bethel school are notified to be at the school Friday morning, September 14, at 9 o'clock to receive their assignments. This has been arranged in order to give the parents opportunity to buy the children's supplies during Saturday shopping.

The pupils will be dismissed before noon and are to be present Monday morning for regular classes.

Mrs. Carmalite Weddle will teach the Bethel school for the seventh year.

PERRYDALE, Sept. 12.—School will start Monday, September 17, with Melvin Ray as high school principal. Doris Gettman will be back as assistant high school instructor, and Kenneth Ramey for his fourth year as principal of the grades and Helen McMillan in the primary department. There will be several new pupils enter school here this year.

ELDRIDGE, Sept. 12.—School will begin Monday, Sept. 17, at Eldridge with Miss Jeanette Luper, Woodburn, teaching the upper grades and Miss Gladys Brown in charge of the primary room.

DAYTON, Sept. 12.—The Dayton union high and grades school will begin the term Monday, September 17.

A full corps of teachers has been secured and the school house and ground have been put in first class condition.

AUBURN, Sept. 12.—The local school board met at the home of the chairman, Ben H. Hawkins, Monday evening to transact business just prior to the opening of school, September 17. Plans were made for having the school house cleaned and the wood stored in preparation for this school year.

L. B. McClendon is principal, serving his third year, and Miss Mamie Bostrack will have the primary room.

ONION CROP SHORT THIS YEAR, REPORT

LABISH CENTER, Sept. 12.—With hauling of the onion crop here into storage houses nearing an end, it is apparent that the 1934 crop is almost a third short of last year's production, although no decrease in acreage was made.

During the growing season the shortage was estimated from 20 to 25 per cent. Insect pests account for the bulk of the loss. The market still remains at 90c per hundred, with 60c being offered for boilers.
