New Course—Ralph L. A preliminary survey indicates that approximately 60 high school boys are interested in enrolling for the course. Morgan will announce within a day or two the hours during which he will meet students interested in his classes.

PLAN FOR FLOODS' CONTROL PREPARED

Project to Be Submitted to County SERA Committee Today, Announced

The vital unit of Salem's flood control project, believed by County Engineers Hadda Swart to be the correct plan of action in combating the flood waters of the Willamette river during the rainy season, is to be presented to the county relief committee today for approval as an SERA project.

The plan includes the enlarging of the Shelton ditch from the Southern Pacific tracks east to the city limits and onto the Durbin diversion dam.

Plans are being made for the use of two gasoline power shovels, owned by the city, two from the state and two from the county.

The penitentiary is expected to furnish trucks and men since the work will be of real benefit to the prison as the ditch will be straightened and the dirt taken from the excavating can be used in filling low places on prison lands.

The ditch has already been cleaned out, widened and diked through the city to the Southern Pacific tracks a block or two east of 12th street. From this point the new unit is expected to take care of all surplus water, not already provided for.

The general project has been making good progress and this link will be about the last essential work needed to handle the winter floods. The upper end of the Mill creek project has been finished with the diking of that ditch from the bridge near the penitentiary annex to the Southern Pacific tracks. The Davidson ditch is expected to be completed in about two weeks.

"Government funds now being available," said Swart, "this has been a golden opportunity. I'm confident when the plan is worked out that the flood troubles for southeastern Salem will be over. There probably wouldn't be another chance like this for 50 years and we are going to take as full advantage of it as we can. It looks now as though we will be able to get the whole project over. With at least four shovels working on the Shelton ditch that work should be hurried on through before the rains come and the project in pretty nearly finished condition to meet the test of any flood waters that come next winter."

Oregon's Losses From Fire Drop This Year, Word

Fire losses in the state of Oregon during the first six months of 1934 aggregated only \$894,041, as compared with \$1,216,487 for the same period in 1933. A. H. Averill, state fire marshal, reported Wednesday. The number of fires decreased from 2125 during the six months ending June 30, 1933, to 1782 during the corresponding period this year.

Losses paid by insurance companies during the first six months of 1934 aggregated \$597,600, as against \$1,047,828 for the same period in 1933.

During the period ending June 30, this year, the percentage of fire loss to the value of property at risk for the entire state was 3.45 per cent as compared with 4.6 per cent during the first six months of 1933.

PUPIL HEALTH EXAM PROGRAM OUTLINED

Douglas, school physician, and members of the Salem public schools physical education staff.

Last year examinations were given to pupils in the first, third, fifth, seventh and tenth grades. The present plan is to effect a gradual change to a settled schedule which will give yearly examinations to pupils in the first, fourth, seventh and tenth grades, thus assuring each pupil a complete physical examination once every three years.

School children who appear to need more frequent examinations

will be segregated, getting away from giving examinations to those pupils who do not need them every year.
