

## WOMEN'S SCHOOL AT UNIVERSITY CLOSES

Need for Continuance Voiced by Leader; Jobs are Secured by Pupils

The FEBA school for unemployed women closes Friday to make room for returning Willamette university students at Lausanne hall. A month of corrective vocational training has been given the 60 students assembled from all over the state.

Interesting sidelights at the school have included students' offering constructive criticism of the courses and conduct of the school, a vote that clothing and personal hygiene be made compulsory subjects, and suggestion of home beauty culture as a new course.

Almost without exception the students expressed a desire for open forum discussion on economic and political topics, led by competent authorities in each field who would answer questions in an elementary way.

Through cooperation with the Y. W. C. A., several of the students have received part time employment and may after Friday qualify for full-time jobs. Another practical outcome of the month's schooling has been the discovery of women whose intellectual capacity qualifies them for FEBA scholarships to institutions of higher learning. Such pupils have not as yet been assigned but the students have qualified for them.

Mrs. Clara V. Thompson, superintendent, stated the brief tenure of the school had demonstrated clearly the vital need of a permanent residential school for single unemployed women. Such a school should offer educational advantages to enable them to once more take their place in industry, Mrs. Thompson believes.

An advisory committee consisting of Dr. Frank M. Erickson, acting president of Willamette university, chairman; Mrs. W. W. Gabriel, state relief; Mrs. Frances Jonasson, vocational department; Robert J. Maaske, state department of education; Ben T. Osborn, labor movement; Mrs. Elizabeth Gallagher, community organizations; Y. W. C. A.; and Frank E. Cooter, public employment service, have assisted in conducting the school.

Miss Margaret Smith, and the Rev. H. K. W. Perkins, who was coming out to serve as a missionary and who was to marry Miss Elvira Johnson. Mr. Perkins and Miss Johnson were married on November 21, 1837, about 10 weeks after the arrival of Mr. Perkins. Miss Margaret Smith married Dr. Wm. Bailey some time later. (Dr. Bailey came in 1835, by way of California.)

(Thus the heading above does not claim enough. James M. Bates helped build the log school house at the original Jacon mission; aided in getting the mill machinery from Fort Vancouver to the site of Salem; worked in the saw mill, and on the Lee house that was the first residence of white men on the site of Salem. Evidently, he also helped in building the Indian manual labor school that became the Oregon institute that became Willamette university, and also "the parsonage," still standing, second house on the site of Salem.)

## SOVIET INVITATION SLIGHTLY ALTERED

GENEVA, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Still divided over the wording of the invitation to be sent to Moscow, leaders of the League of Nations tonight were nevertheless determined to secure Russia's membership in the interests of world peace.

In the face of the refusal of some delegates to sign, league leaders agreed to eliminate from the original draft of the bid to Russia the assurances it contained the league's certainty that Russia has and will fulfill her international obligations.

A sincere, direct invitation should suffice, these delegates maintained, and France, Russia's chief advocate, agreed that the important thing was to get as many signatures as quickly as possible.

These signatures, it was estimated tonight, probably will number 36, but Portugal and Switzerland, observers believed, will vote no when the soviet issue is submitted to the league assembly.

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## JESKE'S ABDUCTORS ENTER GUILTY PLEA

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The kidnapping case involving the riches handing down to his chauffeur by the late Lon Chaney came to an unexpected anti-climax in superior court here today as five members of an alleged gang pleaded guilty to kidnap-robbery charges.

Two others indicted on charges of abducting John Jeske, former companion-chauffeur of "the man with a thousand faces," and Jeske's bride, declined to change their pleas to admissions of guilt while the eighth member of the alleged gang said he was undecided what course to follow.

Police asserted Jeske and his bride were kidnapped by the gang in the hope Jeske would be able to pay a large ransom out of the \$25,000 he was bequeathed in the will of Mrs. Chaney, who inherited the large estate left by her actor-husband.

## Little Enrollment Change Registered Second School Day

SILVERTON, Sept. 12.—Little change was noticed in attendance at the Silvertown schools in its second day. It was estimated that 10 per cent of the grades were absent; 30 per cent or more of the junior high school and 50 per cent of the senior high school.

## DEDICATE NIAGARA TO PEACE, IS PLAN

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y.—(AP)—Battle-scarred old Fort Niagara, its history dotted with heroic deeds of war, was dedicated to the cause of international peace September 3 to 6.

Seven years of labor at a cost of \$500,000 was climaxed in the four-day celebration intended to draw attention to the world to 117 years of peace on the United States-Canadian frontier.

Notables of England, France, Canada and the United States participated in the celebration.

President Roosevelt was invited through a relay run of 14 Indians to Washington, bearing three kernels of corn to the "Great White Father" as a symbol of their request he attend.

The Duke of York, the Earl of Bessborough, governor general of Canada; Premier Richard B. Bennett, Secretary of State Cordell Hull, five Catholic cardinals, the Bishop of Paris, and representatives of 20 French cities were included in the list of dignitaries that were invited to be present.
