NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Local market was reported barely steady by the trade. The season was advancing for pullet receipts. Top quality of the larger grades were in firm demand. Local retail demand was fully steady.

General tone of the egg market was about unchanged. The season was advancing for pullet receipts. Top quality of the larger grades were in firm demand. Local retail demand was fully steady.

Fancy veal continued scarce and was firm at 11 to 11 1/2 cents as compared with last week's range of 10 1/2 to 11 cents and practical top of 11 cents. Bulls were firm at 6 cents.

Due to the somewhat confused situation in northwestern red apples, which have been slow to color but are now showing improvement in the orchards, apple prices here are very much mixed. The Portland market is somewhat dull on the greater supply and range from 50 to 90 cents for fancy and fill on Jonathans, Gravensteins, Winter Bananas, etc. Limited supplies of crab apples were moving slowly.

Tomatoes eased off slightly. The late firmness of the market gave way from 5 to 10 cents as compared with 1933. But most of the major barometers of industrial activity revealed no important pickup.

Dividend news was good. Air reduction advanced 2 points on an extra dividend of \$1.50 a share. Continental Can scored a net gain of nearly 2 points after directors had declared a stock dividend of 50 per cent, subject to approval of shareholders. The company proposed to put the new stock on a quarterly dividend basis of 60 cents.

Berry supply was short, but the demand was light. Blackberries were practically absent. A few raspberries were available.

Prices for pickling cucumbers were off five cents for the mid-week market. The week's early price range of 25 to 40 cents was restored. Supply was larger.

Celery was moving only fairly and prices were barely held at 35 cents to \$1 on late crates. Demand was moderate.
