Wheat, Hay Go as Barn Burns Down

MT. ANGEL, Sept. 20.—In spite of the efforts of two fire departments, fire burned to the ground the barn, granary, garage, strawstack and haystack belonging to A. Plennert, late Wednesday afternoon. Plennert's farm, the former Joe Kirach place, is situated about a mile and a half southwest of Mt. Angel. As yet no clue as to the origin of the fire is known.

The Plennerts had been absent from the place all day and had only just returned home when they saw smoke appearing from behind the barn. The Mt. Angel fire department was called and later the firemen from Silverton but a strong wind and the inflammable character of the material made it impossible to save the buildings. The chicken house was saved with difficulty. Fire even escaped into the fields but was extinguished. The car was taken out of the garage in time to save it.

The barn was filled with hay, all of which burned, as did also 550 bushels of wheat, some of which has just been purchased for seed wheat. Only a small percentage of the loss is covered by insurance, \$500 being all that was carried.
