379 STUDENTS FOR MOLALLA

More Expected as Seasonal Work Ends; Science Most Popular

MOLALLA, Sept. 20.—The second day of school found 379 pupils registered in Molalla high school and grammar school, with many more expected to enroll as soon as field work and hop picking is over. This number is slightly lower than for the first week of school last year. Of the 90 freshmen who have signified their intentions of entering high school, only 71 were registered Tuesday. In the grade school, the first grade class of 24 were registered Tuesday. In the second grade school, the first grade class of 24 was a little larger than last year's class.

Both the grade school and high school have an additional teacher this year. For the first time in three years the high school has a full time science teacher, Wayne Bauer. Two new science courses, biology and chemistry, are being taught. According to Glenn Kirkwood, principal, the science classes are proving to be the most popular ones in the school. Of 202 students checked over, 87 are taking a college preparatory course in science.

Arrangements have not yet been completed for a school bus and this may be one reason for the low registration, according to Mr. Kirkwood. Out-of-town students received 3-4 of a cent a mile last year and this has not proved enough money to interest bus owners in the proposition of running a school bus system for upper grades. Art will be taught for the first time, under the direction of Miss Berneta Thompson. Music may be added the second semester, says Lucien Loring, the new principal. Teachers are Betty Houser, first grade and part of second; Bertha Dillon, part of second and fourth grades and all of third; Vada Howard, part of fourth and all of fifth grade; Berneta Thompson, sixth grade; Edith Baker, seventh grade, and Mr. Loring, eighth grade.

MRS. JOHN MANNING DIES; ILLNESS LONG
