

LOWRY BOUND OVER ON LARCENY COUNT

Salem Man Alleged to Have Taken Woman's \$1800 Face Grand Jurors

Preliminary hearing for Fred Lowry, Jr., accused of larceny of \$1800, was held in Woodburn justice court Thursday afternoon, with Judge Overton presiding. Lowry was bound over to the Marion county grand jury. He is at liberty on \$3500 bond.

District Attorney W. H. Trindle, who handled the prosecution at the hearing, said last night he expected to have the matter presented to the grand jury in a short time.

Briefly, the story told in the Woodburn court by state witnesses was that Lowry met the complaining witness, Mrs. Pearl Whitaker, of Harrisburg, in Salem and induced her to go with him to Albany to draw \$1797.52 of her money out of the bank there under statements that the money would be attached.

They went to Albany and she withdrew the money in \$20, \$10 and \$5 bills, witnesses replied. Whitaker, they returned early that evening to Silverton and she obtained a hotel room there. At Lowry's instance that the money was safer in the car, it was left there. He locked the door to the car in her presence. They returned to the room, where were her two girls, together.

In the morning, Mrs. Whitaker, who looked out the window and found the car gone. It was located near the Silverton street by state police, with both door and ignition unlocked by a key.

Testimony was introduced to show that Lowry, claiming to be a flat broke, borrowed money from Mrs. Whitaker to bring her and himself back to Salem on a bus. But shortly he took another bus to Silverton, there to pay the garage man with a \$10 bill. The garage man testified the car was in perfect condition, though when it was found Lowry attempted, so testimony cited, to make it appear someone had wrecked the car because of a bad leak in the radiator.

Mrs. Whitaker testified the leak, though plugged with a rag, had been in the car before.

Witnesses for the state include Captain McClain of the state police, Constable S. A. Pitney of Silverton, Mrs. Whitaker, Amy Metcalfe of the Albany bank from which the funds were withdrawn, and the garageman at Silverton.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—(P)—A definite movement of the center of apple production from the Pacific northwest to the east was predicted today by Rufus Woods, publisher of the Wenatchee, Wash., World, unless freight rates on the fruit are reduced.

"For about 14 years the Pacific northwest orchardists have been handicapped in their competition with eastern fruits because of high freight rates," Woods said. "Not only will we of the Pacific northwest fight against any increase in the rates on apples and other fruit and grain, but we intend to make a determined fight for lower tariffs."

(Continued from page 1) Have pineapple, sugar and lemon juice boiling hot. Spread over the apple filling and cover with meringue or whipped cream.

Apple Butter 3 gallons unsifted apple sauce 1 lb. brown sugar 1 pint cider vinegar (lemon) Cinnamon, allspice and cloves to taste

This amount makes about 10 quarts of apple butter when boiled down ready to seal. The recipe also takes care of the wind fall apples.

Stair-Step Salad 2 large cooking apples 1 cup cinnamon red sauce 1 cup sugar 1 cup water 1/2 pint cottage cheese, slightly salted 1/2 cup raisins 1 No. 1 can sliced pineapple (5 slices) 2 large marshmallows, cherries

Put red hot, sugar and water into pan and cook until dissolved. Peel and core apples, slice into 1-3 or 1/4 inch thicknesses and cook in syrup until tender but not soft. Let cool, remove carefully from pan and drain for about 1 minute. Arrange slices of apple on a hot plate, lay a slice of pineapple on top of each, then 1 tablespoon of cottage cheese sprinkled with paprika. Top with 1 tablespoon mayonnaise and a marshmallow cherry on each.

This makes a delicious salad with a meat course and is very suitable for a light course. It is also delightful for luncheon with salted waters spread with creamed cheese. The syrup can be reheated and sealed for later use.

PRICE FIXING CODE CLAIMED VIOLATED

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 4.—(P)—Threatened legal action to enforce price-fixing provisions of the NRA lumber code was invoked today when J. H. Chambers and son of Cottage Grove, Ore., were charged with selling below code prices.

A number of similar charges have been filed in the Forest Sound area.

The action was brought by United States District Attorney Carl C. Donaghy. Federal Judge John McNary granted a temporary restraining order enjoining J. H. Chambers and son from offering lumber or timber products for sale in violation of the minimum code prices.

A hearing to determine whether the temporary injunction shall be made permanent was set for October 11.

Donaghy stated it is likely he will proceed with suits against other alleged violators of the lumber code in the near future.
