Resolution Says All Agreed On Principle, Objection to Enforcement Lack

tration to enforce compliance;
and
"Be it further resolved, that
the lumber code authority reaf-
firms its belief that the principle
of minimum prices established by
the administrator must be main-
tained during the present emer-
gency and calls on all members
of the industry to give their ear-
nest support to the maintenance
thereof. The executive officer, the
staff and the several administra-
tive agencies are directed to use
every means to secure the fullest
measure of voluntary compliance,
and to lend every assistance
within their powers to the efforts
to enforce compliance against vi-
olators of the national recovery
administration."

The resolution was passed by a
25 to 1 vote after the authority
had previously rejected by the
same count a resolution to sus-
pend the price-fixing clause in the
code.

Grant Murphy, of Stayton, Ore.,
cast the negative ballot on the
final vote.

Kramer, Salem, who gave an in-
teresting address on public school
music and Dr. D. V. Poling, ex-
ecutive secretary, in other educa-
tional. Round table sessions in

Poling, in an inspirational ad-

up on themselves in order that
they minister to the youth might
be of the best. He urged in all
teachers a vision that "they
should be free from the narrow-
ness that cramps life."

"The teacher is and should be
the most progressive person in
the community, and this can be
only truly so when the teacher
realizes that it is necessary to re-
vitalize himself or herself by con-
tacts and recreations, he said. He

JEFFERSON COUNTY TO ASK EXEMPTION

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SCARLET FEVER IS PREVALENT, WORD

SANTIAM LEAGUE TOURNEY OPENED

SEVEN cases of scarlet fever
and two cases of typhoid have
been reported the past few days
to Dr. V. A. Douglas, county
health officer. Five of the scar-
let fever cases are in one family
at Sablinitz, and the other two
on the eastern edge of Salem
and at Talbot. The typhoid cases,
both children and both traceable
to different hop yards it is be-
lieved, are at Woodburn and Sa-
lem.

The scarlet fever cases are
more severe than those expe-
rienced here in the past five or
six years. These cases bring the
total for this year to date to
38, as compared to only 13 to
September 1 last year. The total
was 31. The entire coast section is
reporting more cases of scarlet
fever this year than for some
years, Dr. Douglas finds.

The typhoid cases are moder-
ately severe.

non-union American firemen of

night when they were attacked by
a group of 20 or 40 union
members in a restaurant.

Riot squads were called out and
quelled the disturbance in the

members were rescued.
