James Daneri, and the latter then buried a 40-yard pass that fell into John Casserly's arms and he scampered to Stanford's 16-yard line. The pass was nearly intercepted by Robert Maents, but it slipped out of his hands into the waiting paws of Casserly.

On three more smashes, Daneri and Valley charged to the 6-yard stripe and the 12,000 fans howled for a touchdown. Only seconds were left and the Cardinals dug their cleats into the dirt and held Valley to 2 yards as the battle ended.

Franklin's Fumble
Stanford gained a big break in the first minute of play when Norman Franklin fumbled on a rushing attack, and Bobby Grayson, former Portland high school star, recovered for the Crimson squad on O.S.C.'s 19-yard stripe.

In an effort to make the best of the break, Grayson and Hamilton ploughed to a first down on the 5-yard line.

The five remaining members of the famous "iron men" machine of last year then sparked the Staters into such a fighting mood they stopped four ripping backs by Grayson 12 inches from the goal line.

In the second period Hamilton and Grayson began a drive that carried the Staters 81 yards in 30 yards to put them within six steps of pay dirt, and Moscrop leveled a place kick through the uprights for a field goal and three points.

Another attempt for a field goal in the third period was low and short as the Beavers rushed Moscrop.

Stanford was not to be denied, however, and near the close of the quarter the Indians rolled up four quick successive first downs for a total of 56 yards, and Hamilton bolted around his left end for the first touchdown from the four-yard line.

Again in the fourth quarter with three new men in the backfield—Leadbetter, Head and Anderson—the Cardinals swung into another mighty push that carried them 52 yards to a touchdown.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Important issues confronting the American Federation of Labor were submitted to critical discussion of committee today while the delegates to the organization—on a 30-hour week basis—went sightseeing.

Tomorrow 30 churches will be addressed by delegates of the A. F. of L. William Green, president of the federation, will speak before three congregations.

Reassembling Monday, the delegates will hear a speech by Francis J. Gorman, first vice president of the United Textile workers, who is scheduled to make an address. Gorman was a leader in the recent textile strike along the Atlantic coast.

The two important committees meeting today were the resolutions and adjustment committees.

A resolution condemning S. Clay Williams, NRA director and head of a large tobacco company, for his alleged hostile attitude toward recovery codes, was before the resolutions committee.

for about half an hour until very thick. Meanwhile soak the gelatin in the cold water. Prepare lemon juice and chopped nuts. Add gelatin to apple mixture and stir until dissolved. Cool slightly, then add nuts and lemon juice, stirring well. Pour into flat pans, allow to stand on ice over night. When firm, cut in squares and roll in powdered sugar. If a tablespoon of cornstarch is added to powdered sugar it helps to keep candy from getting sticky.

8 tart apples
2 cups sugar
1 1/2 cup water
1/2 cup cinnamon candies
Cook apples in water, put through sieve. Add sugar and candies. Cook until it pulls from side of pan. Cool. Put out on waxed paper. Cut in rings or cubes and roll in granulated sugar. Makes 20 to 40 pieces according to size.

LIMIT BUDGETS TO BIENNIAL, ADVISE

The biennial budget of state requirements now being prepared here should be confined to the years 1935 and 1936 and not be extended for an additional six months, regardless of the legislative act changing the fiscal year as to begin on July 1 of each year and end on June 30 of the following year, Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion handed down yesterday.

Van Winkle said he had found nothing in the statute authorizing or directing the preparation of estimates for any period of time extending beyond the biennial following the year in which the budget was prepared.

"If the legislature shall deem it advisable to extend the period of time to be covered by the biennial budget, and to make appropriations of money to cover the various state expenses during such extended time, there is nothing to prevent its doing so, but up to the present time such legislative action has not been taken," Van Winkle held.

The opinion was requested by Henry M. Hansen, state budget director.

Progress Rapid On Coast Spans

Work on the five Oregon coast highway bridges is progressing satisfactorily and the contractors are ahead of schedule. C. B. McCullough, state bridge engineer, reported Saturday. McCullough said that all of the bridges would be completed within two years. The bridges are being constructed under a federal loan of approximately \$5,500,000, which will be repaid from tolls and money now expended in the operating of free ferry service. Officials estimated that more than 800 men would be employed in the construction operations.

The Trojans had their best chance to score in the last minute of the first half when four passes were fired in quick succession, playing against time, from the Cougar's 35-yard line but all failed to connect.

Irvine Warburton, Southern California's midget all-American quarterback, was bottled up most of the day and was bounced around the field with considerable abandon by the hard charging Washington Staters.

The little fellow did not have enough interference in front of him to go places as he did last season.

The victory marked Washington State's first success over Southern California since 1930 when Hollingberry's team won the conference championship and played for the west in the Rose bowl at Pasadena. Last year the Trojans won 33 to 0.

One side of the cab on Ito's light truck was smashed in. Little damage was done Grant's truck and trailer and neither driver was hurt.

Contract Given On Wilson River Highway Project

The state highway commission has awarded the contract for grading approximately 3.3 miles of the Wilson River highway to Jacobson and Jensen of Portland, on a low bid of \$94,725.19. The contractors announced that actual construction operations would begin within the next two weeks.

The contract was considered at the last meeting of the highway commission held in Portland and the award was deferred pending word from the federal roads bureau in Washington.

The section of road to be graded is approximately 10 miles east of Tillamook.

the fuse pulled a small package from beneath the car.

The package was taken to a vacant lot and the fuse relighted, while Vance and detectives took cover at a safe distance. A terrific explosion followed, which police say indicated a carefully prepared nitroglycerine bomb.

Investigation revealed the garage had been entered during the night by a window and mechanism of the car tampered with in such a way it would be difficult to start the motor.

Early this year Vance received a bomb through the mail, but suspicious he handled the package carefully and discovered the bomb. Later an attempt was believed to have been made to set a bomb beneath the window of his study at home, and a man was caught on another occasion acting suspiciously near the inspector's home.

PRICE FIXING CASE HEARING PUT OVER

SEATTLE, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The government's equity suit against the Seaboard Lumber company to enforce the price fixing section of the lumber code was continued today until October 22 by Federal Judge John C. Bowen on motion of the company's counsel.

On October 23, Federal Judge E. E. Cushman in Tacoma is scheduled to hear arguments on the government's motion to make permanent temporary restraining orders prohibiting seven other lumber companies from selling below maximum code prices.

Meanwhile four west coast lumber manufacturers, Frank H. Ransom, Walter B. Nettleton, Homer Bunker and Morris H. Jones, wired Donald A. Richberg, chairman of the industrial emergency committee urging that price fixing be set aside on the ground that evasion is widespread because it is impossible to fairly fix prices "for an industry having such a complicated marketing structure." They will proceed from a lumber code authority meeting in Chicago to present their case to the NRA heads.

RED CROSS DRIVE PLANS ANNOUNCED

"We will continue to do our part," was the paraphrase of the NRA slogan given out to roll call workers for the American Red Cross by Douglas H. Moore, director of publicity from San Francisco, at a luncheon meeting Saturday afternoon at the Jennie Lind cafe.

Roll call for the local organization begins November 1 and concludes November 29, William McGilchrist, Jr., is the local chairman.

Moore cited figures of last year as encouraging indices of the increase in Red Cross membership even during times of depression. The national membership increased from 3,700,000 to 3,800,000 and in Oregon from 31,000 to 37,000.

The place of the Red Cross in social service has changed during the past year, the speaker explained, in that the federal government has moved up the "heavy artillery" to the front line trenches of relief and the Red Cross has settled back to its regular duties of relieving disaster, assisting in rural public health nursing and service to disabled war veterans.

Additional guests at the luncheon over which Judge George Rossman presided were Marjorie Marcus and E. O. Newport from Albany, and Mrs. Virgie Brady of Aumsville.

expected to appeal very soon.

Blackwell Smith, NRA's acting general counsel, told reporters the decision indicated a "lack of understanding" of the recovery act.

"The recovery act," he said, "outlaws things that do not constitute fair competition. To contend that fixing minimum prices to prevent price cutting, one of the most dangerous forms of unfair competition, is not permissible is to contend that congress did not intend to prevent unfair competition."

One section of the recovery act—that involving the licensing provisions, which expired unused—specifically mentioned price-cutting as a form of unfair competition, Smith asserted.

He contended the establishment of "minimum" prices, as provided in the lumber code, did not actually constitute price-fixing as it apparently had been interpreted in the Memphis decision.

Smith recalled, too, that in a recent telegram to lumbermen, Donald Richberg had said in effect that although price-fixing generally was not desirable the national resource industries might constitute an exception, and should be carefully surveyed with that in mind.

"We had expected that the decision would be adverse," Smith said. "We are all doing what we can to hasten an appeal."

Smith interpreted Richberg's recent speech not as meaning that all cost and production control provisions should be removed from codes, but that the provisions which prevented "disastrous price cutting" should be left in effect, and the others removed.

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General Martin To Be Luncheon Speaker Monday

General Charles H. Martin, democratic candidate for governor, will speak at the regular chamber of commerce luncheon Monday noon. He has not announced his topic.

General Martin, who is now serving as congressman, will be the third on the list of candidates to appear on the chamber of commerce program. Others will be heard in future sessions before election.

Zoning Proposal Before Meeting Of Liquor Board

The state liquor commission will meet in Salem Monday when the so-called zoning proposal for the restriction of liquor sales will be considered.

Three zones are proposed in the tentative plan. Under these zones the sale of liquor would be prohibited in strictly residential districts, while sales in the business district would continue under the present plan.

Applications for a number of new beer licenses and recommendations that a number of licenses previously granted be revoked also will be considered.

HAUPTMANN SEEN ON LINDY ESTATE

from Hauptmann's home on which telephone numbers pertaining to the case had been written.

Whited, who formerly lived on a small farm near the Lindbergh estate, first told his story of seeing a mysterious stranger to state police on the night of the kidnapping, March 1, 1932.

When Hauptmann was arrested, the farmer was sought immediately. He was located only two days ago.

Simultaneously it was announced Colonel Lindbergh will be one of 23 witnesses before the Hunterdon county grand jury at Flemington, N. J., Monday, when Hauptmann's indictment on kidnapping and murder charges will be asked.

Whether Hauptmann will actually be brought to trial in the Bronx next week on the extortion charge remained uncertain, although District Attorney Samuel J. Foley said his case was complete except for some slight details.

"I am convinced," he said, "that the Bronx case against Hauptmann will result in conviction."

Foley previously has indicated he would adjourn the case to permit the prisoner's extradition to New Jersey on more serious charges, but he declined today to discuss this possibility.

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At Trenton, Attorney General Wilentz commented:

"I do not believe any trial in New Jersey could properly be held before November 1."

CASE AGAINST CITY LOSES BY DEFAULT

The case of Minnie D. Keeney vs. City of Salem, was ordered dismissed by Judge McMahon after failure of plaintiff to amend her complaint.

Another case dismissed was that of Alton D. Hurley against Lloyd E. Hillery.

Default decree was entered in suit of George Stephen May vs. James McCubbin, et al. Action was to quiet title to real property.

Marjorie Dickson has brought suit for divorce from Carl Dickson. They were married Nov. 17, 1932. Complaint alleges that defendant has been cruel, that he has failed to support her although he runs a beer parlor and is able to do so. She asks \$100 attorney fee, \$50 suit money, \$25 temporary alimony and \$25 a month permanent alimony.

The suit of J. E. Gansley against Southern Pacific Railway company for \$11,367 was ordered transferred to federal district court on motion of defendant.

Demurrers were filed in cases of Rose Marie Ryabari vs. Ellen L. Welch, and Prudential Insurance company vs. Grant R. and Genevieve Bonell.

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
