

BEAUTY CREAM AND ROAD OILS SIMILAR

General Petroleum Expert Points to Advance Made Through Inventions

Tell a woman that the expensive beauty cream with which she anoints her schoolgirl complexion may be, and probably is, derived from the same crude black oil from which is obtained road oils, asphalt and machinery lubricants, and she'd indignantly protest that it was just another puritanical canard against the use of cosmetics.

But she'd be wrong. For when Colonel Drake, back in 1859, brought in America's first oil well at Titusville, Pennsylvania, he pioneered not only the subsequent revolution in transportation, but potentially gave the world many other things as well, not the least of which are many modern aids to midday's beauty and health.

Quoting no less an authority than the American Petroleum Institute, A. L. Horn, Jr., Oregon division manager for General Petroleum corporation, marketers of Mobilgas and Mobiloil, says that probably no other raw material enters so many fields of utilization as petroleum. With many petroleum products such as gasoline, fuel oil, Diesel oil and distillate, lubricants, road oil and asphalt, most people are familiar; but how many, Horn asks, realize that there are literally scores of other products which affect directly or indirectly most of the world's industries and which range from delicate beauty creams, lotions and medicines at one extreme, to ugly, dirty but extremely useful petroleum coke at the other.

In addition to those mentioned above, here are some of the things the General Petroleum official says are made from petroleum or its derivatives: roofing, waterproofing, and wallboard compounds; floorings, floorcoverings, sheathing and wrapping paper compounds, insulating products, emulsions, molding compositions, rubber products compounds, special medicaments for wounds, skin affections and for internal use; commercial solvents, beauty creams, ointments and petroleum jelly, explosives and battle gases, anesthetics; a whole series of alcohols used in the home and hospital and which are also used as solvents in the making of lacquers, soaps and essential oils; naphtha for blending, varnish and paint making and for dyes and cleaners; insecticides, candles, fruit and egg packing wax, laundry detergent and ironing wax, etchers wax and wax for cardboard, matches and paper.

NEW 'ELECTRO-PAK' BATTERIES ARRIVE

The new "Electro-Pak", an automobile storage battery of strikingly distinctive and unique new design, announced last week by The E. F. Manufactured in sizes for all popular makes of cars, the battery unit is entirely encased in a hard rubber protective cover of modern design. This is the first time this type of construction has been used on an American made battery, according to Walter Zosel, manager of the Goodrich Silverton store here.

"With all the formerly exposed metal parts of the battery completely covered, the new cover protects against dirt, acid fumes, surface moisture and metal dropping across the terminals, thus preventing short circuits and greatly reducing corrosion and power leakage, deadly enemies to battery life," Mr. Zosel said.

"The new Electro-Pak is serviced, when replacement of water is needed, without removing the protective cover. The case is sturdily built with uniform wall thickness throughout, unlike other battery case construction.

"Constructed internally of heavy, full capacity plates, many innovations to give the battery greater power and longer life have been incorporated. A series of record tests showed exceptionally low operating costs for the new product.
