Then came the word of the assassin's shot that will tear him away from the peaceful English countryside, and toss him into the troubled politics of the European scene.

Peter celebrated his 11th birthday September 9, at Bled, Yugoslavia. He had looked forward to spending the whole day with King Alexander, in father and son intimacy, at the summer residence on a beautiful lake in Slovenia.

But Alexander was too busy with affairs of state to grant the day to the child so soon to take his throne and his burden.

When told he could not have an airplane or at least a motor-cycle for his birthday, the boy is reported to have said wistfully:

"You see, it will be so much more fun when I'm grown up. Because I can do just what I want. Like papa does—shoot and sail and fly."

Peter was not immediately informed of the shooting of his father at Marseilles. The headmaster, advised of the assassination by the Associated Press, said the task of informing the boy would be left to "some of his own people."

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cy. Explaining the background of the European situation Barnes went on to say:

"The aggressive policies of Barthou and France in building a ring around Nazi Germany have caused some disaffection in Yugoslavia. This country was one of the Little Entente long friendly to France and hostile to Germany. But Yugoslavia recognizes Italy under Mussolini as her mortal foe. She remembers the seizure of Fiume by D'Annunzio which Italy retains, and gets excited whenever Mussolini gives a war talk because they fear his ambition to make the Adriatic an Italian lake and by seizing the Dalmatian coast and making Albania a colony."

"The Italo-Yugoslavian frontier is one of the 'hottest' spots in Europe, now that the Polish corridor question has been put on ice for ten years. When Italy mustered troops on the Austrian frontier ready to intervene in Austria had the Nazi putsch which resulted in the death of Dollfus made any headway, King Alexander mobilized as counter to Italy. There has been a very definite rapprochement between France and Italy to oppose Hitler in Germany, and this growing friendship resulted in a cooling off between Yugoslavia and France."

"This was further indicated by Alexander's refusal to recognize Russia after the Franco-soviet alliance. In fact there have been some fears that the Little Entente might be drawn to support of Germany because of French affiliation with Italy and Russia. "Barthou was the chief negotiator for France in the recent diplomatic moves in Europe. He induced Britain to resume the old entente cordiale by threatening to make a military alliance with Russia. In an effort to win back Yugoslavia, Barthou recently visited Belgrade, its capital. The visit of Alexander to France was presumably a return visit, in a further effort to establish more friendly relations. Barthou's loss will therefore be an important one to France and may be felt in continental political affairs."

"Yugoslavia has an efficient army and the Serbs make good soldiers. They are ready to resist any Italian effort to annex any of their territories. In fact this situation will deserve watching." Barnes was keenly interested also in dispatches from Madrid where word came that Jay Allen's apartment had been shot up in the Spanish rebellion. Working with Allen, whose wife is now visiting her parents in Woodburn, were Edmund Taylor, of the Chicago Tribune and Leland Stowe, New York Herald-Tribune correspondent. Both Taylor and Stowe are usually stationed in Paris but have been detailed to Madrid during difficulties there. Barnes knows all three of the men.

Barnes phoned word of the shooting, which injured no one, to Mrs. Allen. She said she had a cablegram from her husband yesterday morning saying they were under consular protection. Barnes will leave Salem Thursday to return to his post in Moscow, making the trip from Portland to New York by air. Mrs. Barnes will remain with her children here for an indefinite time.

Baked Apples

6 or 8 apples
1/2 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
2 teaspoons cinnamon or less pinch salt
1 teaspoon butter
1 cup very hot water
Peel, quarter and core enough apples to fill a nine inch pie pan. Make one layer. Aluminum or granite is best as tin may turn the apples dark. Bake until soft with a little water. Then mix flour, sugar, cinnamon and salt. Add water and butter and mix well. Pour over apples and put back in oven until cooked thick. If there is any water on the apples when ready for dressing it can be used as part of the 1/2 cup. Makes 3 large servings. We like it cold with cream.

Grandma's Apple Kuchen

5 medium tart mellow apples
1/2 cup flour, coarse
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup whole milk
1/2 cup cream
dash of salt
cinnamon
Peel and core apples and slice about 1/4 of an inch thick or thinner. Sift flour, sugar and salt into bottom of an unbaked crust. Fill with apples packing firm. Pour the milk into this and the other half cup of sugar. Brush the cream over top and sprinkle with cinnamon. Bake in a moderate oven one hour or longer depending on apples. Bake to a golden brown. Very nice for luncheon served with cheese and coffee. This pie will serve six. Use a large pie tin, 9 by 1 1/2 deep.

Apple Crisp

Wash, pare, core and slice 8 tart apples. Put into greased casserole dish, sprinkle with 1/4 cup water in which 1 teaspoon of cinnamon has been mixed. Over this put 1 cup sugar, 3/4 cup flour, and 1/2 cup butter, worked until it has become crumbly. Bake at 450 degrees for about 45 minutes. Serve with whipped cream. This is much quicker and more delicious than the common apple pudding.

February 26, 1933—Found guilty.

February 27, 1933—Sentenced to the maximum penalty, three years in the state penitentiary.

March 21, 1933—Motions for new trial and for stay of sentence overruled.

May 9, 1933—Order issued extending time in the case; appeal followed.

October 4, 1933—State supreme court mandate, rejecting appeal and remanding the case to circuit court for sentence, filed with county clerk; appeal to United States supreme court followed.

March 15, 1934—United States supreme court's mandate, refusing to hear the appeal, filed with county clerk.

March 16, 1934—Writ of habeas corpus petitioned for and allowed.

March 19, 1934—Defendant's reasons for not being imprisoned heard.

March 21, 1934—Defendant remanded to custody of sheriff.

May 4, 1934—Bill of exceptions, on which appeal is based, filed.

October 9, 1934—Defendant remanded by state supreme court to custody of sheriff, following hearings.
