Baked Ham Appelizing Dish for Recipe Entry

Baking a ham is an art which few cooks can boast of. It is not the simple flour and pop in the oven process that best and pork involves. But a carefully prepared ham roast is truly a regal dish, and when served with sweet potatoes and a tart salad it tempts the palates of the most discriminating.

Any kind of ham recipe is eligible at the Round Table this week. Even if just a little ham is called for to add flavor, the recipe will be considered in the judging. Three cash prizes totaling \$3 will be announced next Friday morning. Thursday noon is the deadline for bringing contributions to the office.

Yesterday's second prize winner called for candied cranberries. In case you don't know how to make them, here is a rule:

Candied Cranberries

1 lb. cranberries
2 cups sugar
2 cups water
Select large, firm perfect cranberries, wash and drain. Make 2 or 3 small slits in each berry with a point of a knife. Boil sugar and water together until clear. Cook syrup, add berries and bring very slowly to the boiling point. Remove from fire and let stand over night. Sauce pan should be large enough to permit all the berries to float on top of the syrup during the cooking. If berries are heated too quickly the skins will burst before they absorb the syrup. Next day drain grapes from berries and let stand over night. Allow a cool, add berries and heat slowly. Cook gently for 3 or 4 minutes and allow to stand 2 hours or more. Then cook slowly a third time for 5 minutes. Allow berries to stand in thick syrup over night. Wash once more so the syrup will be thin enough to pour easily and drain berries from the syrup. Spread on a rack covered with cheesecloth to dry. They should be bright, firm, plump and semi-transparent. Store in a tightly covered jar and use as a sweet meat or as a garnish. The syrup left over after berries are candied may be used as a pudding sauce, or in fruit punch. The method of preparing seems like a lot of work but the finished product is worth it.

Cranberry Mint Ice

1 quart cranberries
1 tablespoon gelatin
2 tablespoons cold water
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup of 2 lemons
Cook berries until they stop popping. Rub through a sieve or wire strainer. Reheat to boiling point and add gelatin which has been soaked in the 2 tablespoons of cold water. Stir until gelatin has dissolved. Then add lemon juice, sugar and peppermint. When cool put in freezer tray. Place in cold control to high point and freeze for about 1 hour. After it is frozen, turn control back to normal. Serves 6 or 8 people.

Cranberry Relish

1 lb. cranberries
1 tart apple, red ones best
1 orange
2 cups sugar
Wash cranberries, apples and oranges. Quarter and core ap-

ples but do not peel. Force all ingredients through the fine knife of a food chopper or grinder, add sugar & stir well. Chill and serve. Will be better if it stands several hours. It will keep a long time in a cool place and is good with meats or fowl.

1/2 glass cranberry jelly
Beat egg white stiff, add jelly gradually and beat until it stands alone. Pipe in high glasses, top with whipped cream and chopped nuts. Or it can be used as a pudding sauce.

Cranberry Sauce

1 pint cranberries
1 pint water
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 cup sugar
Wash and sort berries. Put on to simmer with the cold water, which should be enough to barely cover. When the first berry pops, add soda and drain off all the water quickly. Return to fire, adding just half the amount of water used the first time. Simmer until berries are tender. Measure the sauce, add 1/2 the amount of sugar. Return to the fire and remove as soon as it boils. Serve or not, as you wish, and pour into a mold, which has been dipped in cold water.

For a delicious holiday salad, add to the sauce, 1 cup cut celery, 1/2 cup cut filberts, 2 tablespoons gelatin.

This sauce is always firm, never bitter and well worth the little extra care needed for preparation.

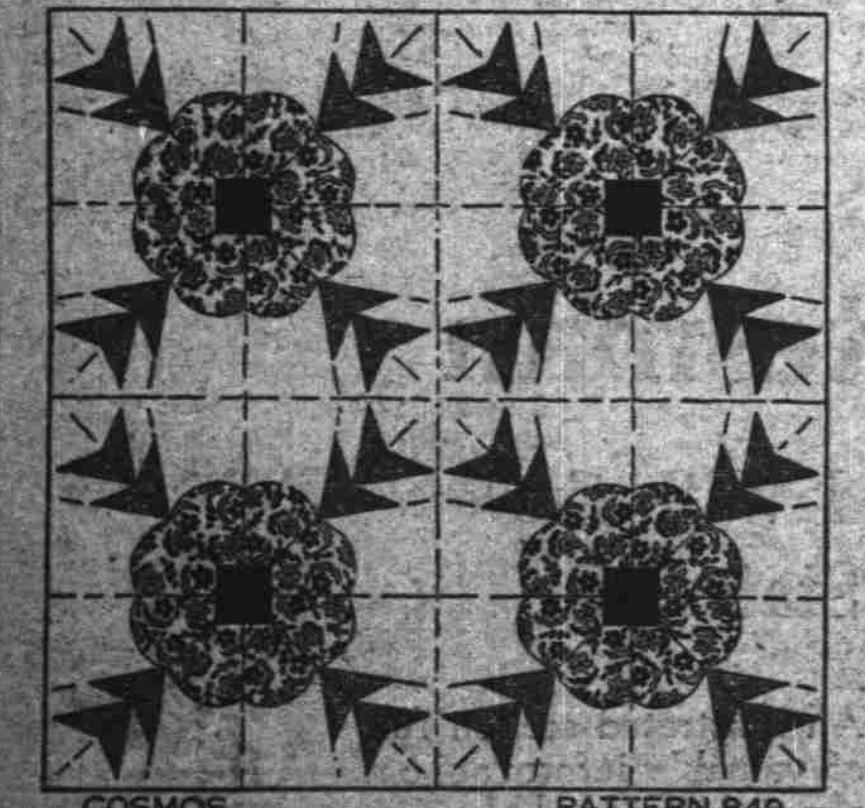
