

# Green Salem Line Crunches; Indians Defeated 25 to 0

## JIM AND PHIL DO MARATHON

### Divide Touchdowns; Three of Them Made From Back of 20-Yard Stripe

Salem high school's "green" forward wall crunched and crushed just as convincingly as more experienced red and black lines have performed in the past, to keep the Chemawa Indians entirely out of Salem high territory Friday afternoon as Coach Hollis Huntington's squad piled up a 25 to 0 victory over the Redskins.

Due to Salem's air-tight defense and refusal to give the visitors any "breaks," Chemawa never had possession of the ball on Salem's side of the 50-yard line. Jimmy Nicholson's long punts and Salem's blocking of several Chemawa kicks, contributed further to keep the Indians deep in their own territory all times.

Salem's four touchdowns were accounted for largely by the distance-running duel of Nicholson and Phil Salstrom, and three of them came in the first period. Between the first two, Chemawa didn't touch the ball; Salem recovered own punts.

After Chemawa had taken the opening kickoff and made one first down to its own 46, the nearest it got to Salem's end of the field all afternoon, Don Coons recovered a kicked ball on the 41; Sherrill dashed to first down on the 38, Nicholson dodged his way to the 14. Then after a holding penalty had set Salem back, Nicholson ran 22 yards for the first touchdown and kicked the goal.

Following the on-side kick-off, Salstrom made a 13-yard run and Nicholson after a five-yard trial attempt, reeled off the 23 yards necessary for a second score.

The third touchdown came almost as rapidly. Nicholson returned the kickoff to Salem's 38 and a little later punted to Chemawa's 12. The Chemawa punter kicked netted only 10 yards to the 29 and Salstrom scored standing up from there.

The second period was played in Chemawa territory but there was no more scoring until the third, when a 13-yard run and drive was stopped and Nicholson missed a field goal try, another Chemawa kick was blocked and recovered on the 22-yard line. Sherrill heaved a nine-yard pass to Traglio, Nicholson made it a first down, and then on third down Salstrom took the ball on a double reverse which crossed up "Poor Lo" and skittered seven yards to the final touchdown.

With most of Coach Huntington's reserves on the field in the last quarter, Mack Conway and St. Martin of Chemawa made several good gains, St. Martin receiving a pass for a 15-yard gain, but it all happened in the Indians' end of the field.

All of Salem high's green forwards distinguished themselves at various times. Damon, M. Coons and Oglesby of the neophytes being observed most frequently with the opposing ball carrier in their grasp.

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## Orange Rolls Up 39 Points But Lets Columbia Achieve Two Touchdowns by Passes

BELL FIELD, Corvallis, Ore., Oct. 12. (AP)—Oregon State college ran wild over Columbia university of Portland, when the teams met in a non-conference game here this afternoon. The final score was 39 to 12 in favor of Oregon State.

The Beavers got off to an overwhelming three-touchdown lead before the end of the first quarter, and thereafter it was pretty much a question of just how large the score would be.

Taking the ball immediately after the kickoff, the Staters carried it straight down the field for the first touchdown. Then, while Columbia still was trying to get their defense organized, Swanson, Oregon right-half, took the kickoff and dashed 77-yards for a second touchdown. The quarter ended shortly after Jimmy Daneri, left-half substitute for the disabled Norman Franklin, broke through the center of the Columbia line and rambled down the field 56-yards for the third touchdown of the period. The Beavers made good only one of their three tries for conversion.
