FINAL RITES HELD FOR MRS. STAYTON

She Was Member of Early Family That Founded City Near Here

STAYTON, Oct. 12.—Mrs. Elizabeth Stayton, who died here this week, was one of the few remaining residents of early day Stayton. Born February 28, 1855, in Missouri, she crossed the plains with her parents, Charles W. and Mary Thomas in 1865. The family settled near Salem, later moving to Sublimity and to Stayton in 1868.

Crossing the plains with Charles Thomas was his brother, John, and family and after moving to Stayton the brothers opened a furniture factory here. One of the most popular pieces of furniture manufactured were what was in those days called "safes", but what later became known as cupboards. Elizabeth Thomas was united in marriage to Moses Stayton on March 16, 1872. Moses Stayton was a son of Drury Stayton, who laid out the townsite here in 1875. This townsite covered about six blocks from east to west, three blocks from north to south.

About the time of the close of the Civil war Drury Stayton started a carding mill here. John and Charles Thomas donated the land for Stayton's first school, a log building, which was torn down a few years ago.

Moses Stayton passed away in 1918. To him and Mrs. Stayton nine children were born, seven of whom survive. They are Charles, Clifford and Miss Nell Stayton of this place; Mrs. Ethel Mount, of Corvallis; Mrs. Katherine Davis, Portland; Mrs. Roxy Keith and Mrs. Lenore Staab of Salem. Also surviving are 13 grandchildren. Funeral services were held at the Baptist church Tuesday, conducted by Rev. Wolverton, of Brownsville; music was furnished by Miss Eleanor Moore and Prof. Roberts, both of Salem.

Honorary pallbearers were Dr. Beauchamp, George Brown, Frank Foster, E. Roy, John Taylor and B. Collins, of Salem. Active pallbearers were Floyd Crabtree, Charles Gehlen, William Keithley, Jacob Messier, Leo Rock and Fay Rice, Salem.

Mrs. Stayton was one of the first members received into the Stayton Baptist church.

ENROLLMENT BIG. STAYTON, Oct. 12.—The enrollment at the parochial school has increased until it was necessary to purchase new desks. 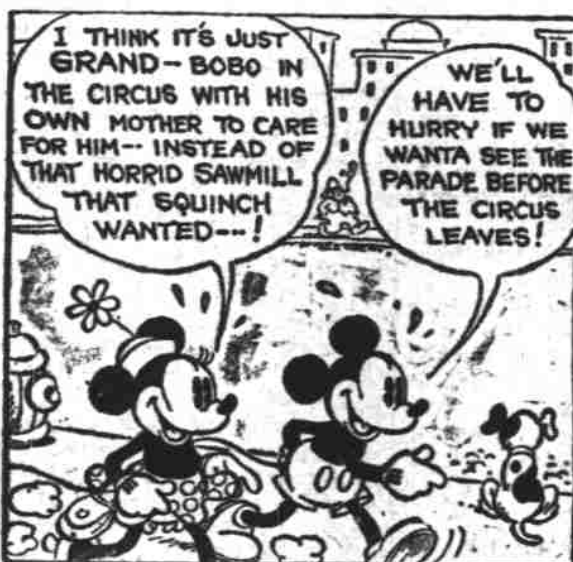

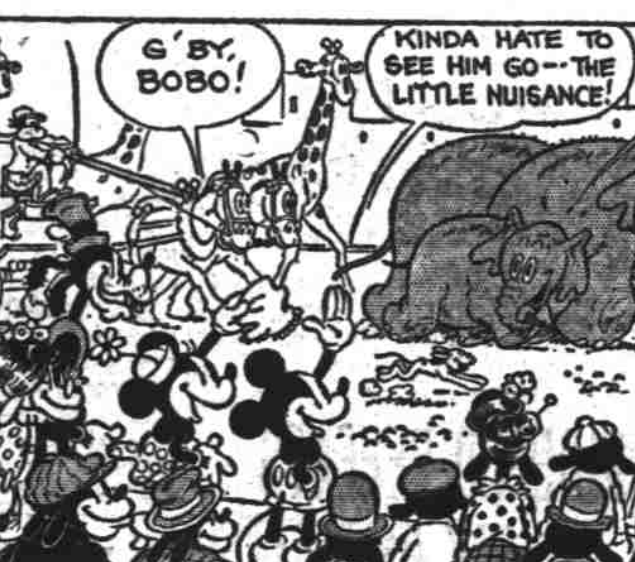
