A \$14.71 bill submitted by E. C. Bushnell, city building inspector, for purchase of a swivel chair, provoked some merriment when it was reported "he ripped his pants on the old one" but it was held up for referral to the public buildings committee.

The council authorized the mayor and the sewerage and drainage committee to make an agreement with the county as to the city's sharing in the cost of the flood control improvement now under way in southeast Salem. It was estimated the city's portion would be \$2500, mostly for materials for construction of two diversion dams. A committee consisting of Aldermen Kuhn, Walter Fuhrer and R. E. Bontwright was named to dick over with John Gobel, who is asking \$300 for a right of way easement to permit the city to be extended across his property.

Other business transacted was as follows:

Ordinance creating a boxing commission read and referred to ordinance committee; Alderman O. A. Olson, Hendricks and O'Hara delegated to investigate possible purchase of additional land behind the east Salem station for drill and hose towers; obscene language on street station walls, Marion park, ordered torn down; at request of Salem Woman's club; agreement made with banks for payment of one-fourth of 1 per cent on city deposits; street committee authorized to purchase metal pedestrian lane markers for Court-High street intersection.

premiums, the year's operating cost to date reaches \$44,367.13, half of which went back to the public as grandstand entertainment. During the three years 1929, 1930 and 1931, the average operating cost was \$31,501.75. The figure in both cases exclude premiums and capital outlays, which indicate that this year's financial success is due to economy of operation and not to increased receipts.

Five-Point Program of Gehlhar Accomplished

In slightly over two years, the state fair has come out ahead of operating expenses by over \$70,000 and has met every phase of the five-point program established by the board of agriculture. This program included wiping out the old deficit, payment of bond installments matured, renovation of the buildings and grounds, increase fair attendance and set up a working reserve.

The 1934 fair attendance, over 150,000, doubled all past yearly records. Success of the record-breaking fair Gehlhar has attributed to the beautified grounds, the new and enlarged agricultural exhibits and the lowered admission with greater entertainment attractions, part free and the balance at nominal cost.

DILLINGER'S AIDE TO BE EXECUTED

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Under the constant scrutiny of a heavy guard, Harry Pierpont, 22, comrade in crime of the late John Dillinger, tonight awaited the hour Wednesday when he will go to his death in Ohio penitentiary's electric chair.

While he waited in "death row," Edward Miller, 28, was taken to the electrocution chamber and put to death for the slaying of a Canton, O., detective.

Preston E. Thomas, who has been warden of the penitentiary 21 years, prepared for any contingency—even a possible attempt at his own abduction—as a tangle of wires settled down over the prison walls.

The addition of new guards and tightening of prison vigilance was marked. The electrocution has been set for Wednesday, but the exact hour is left to the warden's discretion.

Precedent has established 7:30 p. m., as the hour, but Warden Thomas indicated he may select another hour.

Inductions Held by Five 'Indian' Groups at Y. M.

The five tribes of the Friendly Indian organization, Nez Perce, Apaches, Mohicans, Bear Claws and the Navajos, held their annual induction ceremony in the YMCA building last night.

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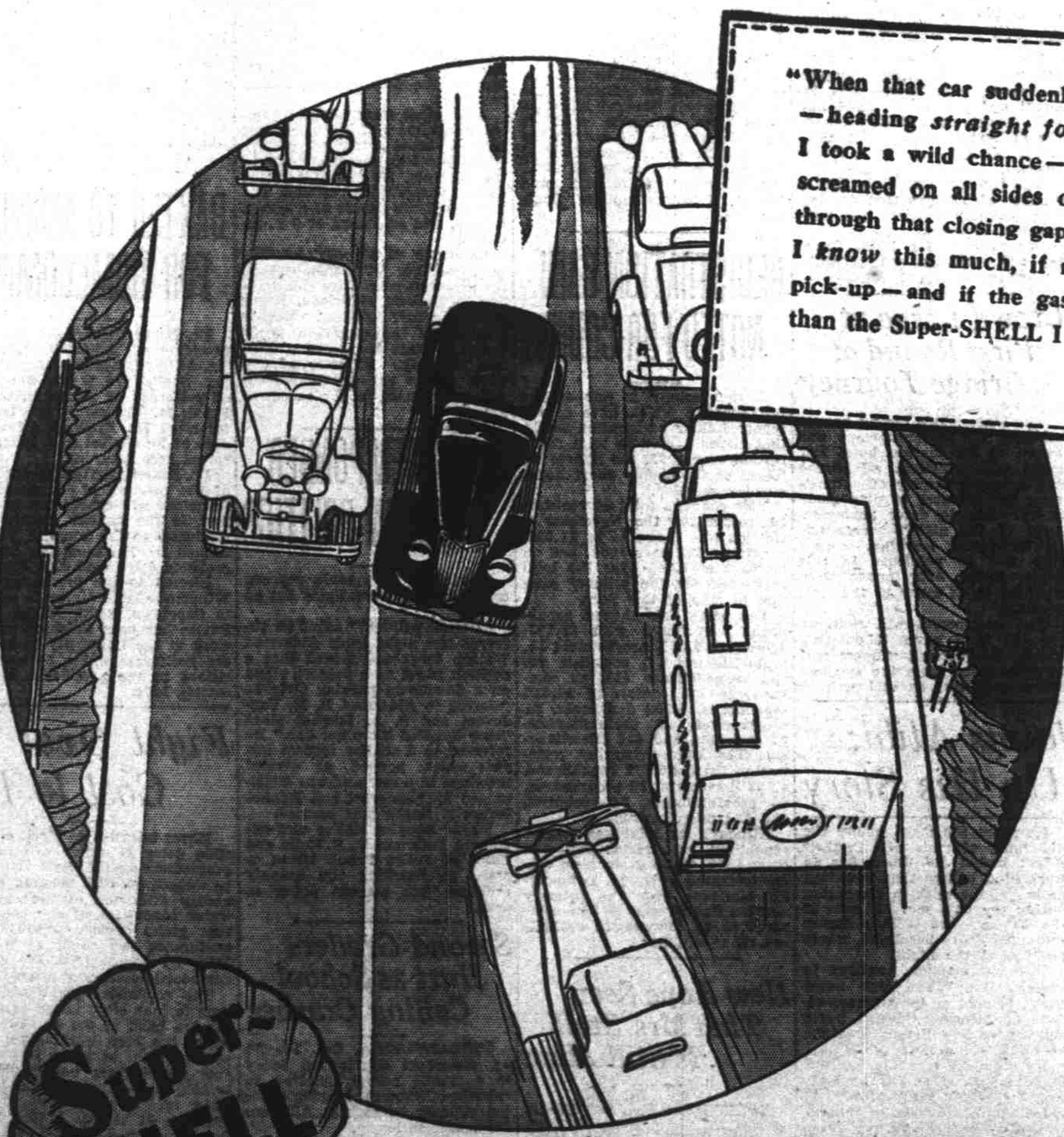
