Appeal Dentist Advertising Case To U. S. Courts

The decision of the Oregon supreme court upholding the constitutionality of the statute prohibiting certain advertising by dentists was appealed Thursday to the United States supreme court by attorneys for Harry Semler, Portland dentist. The suit to test the validity of the statute originally was filed by Semler against the state board of dental examiners. Semler alleged in his appeal that the statute conflicts with section one of the 14th amendment which gives equal rights to all citizens, and also that the statute delegating power of regulation to the dental board was an invasion by the legislative branch into the judicial branch.

Flag Pole Will Be Raised Here

Plans are now being made to place a 195 foot flag pole on the court house lawn where the present pole now stands, within a few days, it was stated yesterday. The action was authorized at the Monday night meeting of the local post of the American Legion. The pole was expected to be put in place by Armistice day. The note said the writer was "the kidnaper of Alice Stoll."

ized house. We do hope, however, that where a new roof is needed, a new roof will be ordered, where alterations to the kitchen are necessary, they will be contracted. The estimate of the Salem bankers that \$150,000 would be loaned local home owners during the campaign places the quota of \$200,000 on the outlying districts of Marion county and the West Salem territory. This would indicate loans of approximately \$100,000 will be made in the territory outside Salem, while a like amount will be expended from private capital.

WALNUT INDUSTRY MEETING TUESDAY

A general mass meeting of all persons interested in the walnut industry will be held at Newberg, Tuesday, October 23, at 2 o'clock at the Legion hall. Purpose of the meeting will be to oppose and reject both the federal and state codes for the walnut industry, the sponsors state. At a preliminary meeting this week attended by both independent walnut growers and members of the cooperative associations, opinion was unanimous that growers of Oregon will be ruined by the continued enforcement of these codes. Particular attention was called to the fact that growers must turn over to the Walnut Control Board 30 per cent of their marketable nuts. This feature, in the opinion of the meeting, amounts to confiscation of the property of the growers, and it is believed that an injunction will be sought to prevent further losses unless a change is made before the first of the year. It was brought up that the officers of a number of cooperative associations agreed to the Federal Marketing code without consulting the members of their organizations. It also appeared that under the Oregon statute enacted by the legislature in support of the Federal AAA codes, the grading requirements have been placed so high that Oregon walnuts have suffered severely in competition with the California product in our local market.

APPROVE PRUNE AND OTHER STATE CODES

DALLAS, Oct. 18.—Members from nine of the 11 Farmers' Union locals in Polk county attended an all-day meeting at the North Dallas school Wednesday. G. W. Potts of Jefferson, state president, and S. B. Holt of Seilo, secretary, were the principal speakers. The group went on record as favoring the continuance of the Oregon agricultural adjustment act, under which the prune code and other groups operate. This law expires in March, 1935, unless extended by the legislature. It was decided at this meeting to have the county officers visit the various locals throughout the county in order to assist in their work. A schedule worked out for these visits calls for visits at Ballston October 25; Perrydale, November 1; Mt. Pisgah, November 2; Bridgeport, November 3; Greenwood, November 6; Valley Junction, November 7; Luckinmote (Elkins), November 9; Liberty Bell, November 10.
